PREFACE

Let us go back in time. Let us turn the leaves of the calendar when Indian independence was merely 17 years old.

1964. The country was struggling to grapple with the brutal realities of poverty, illiteracy, superstition and unemployment. In addition to this, the repeated **influxes of the migrants** from the erstwhile East Pakistan (now **Bangladesh**) led to the incredibly rapid growth in population, primarily in and around Bengal. Concomitantly, there was a **rise in the student population** and their demand for educational institutions. It is in this period of angst and restlessness that we have the birth of the educational institution, **Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith**.

Established on 5 March 1964, Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith started its journey with the aim of catering to the expanding student population in Birati and its adjoining rural and semi-urban areas of 24 Parganas North. With the aim of making Higher Education accessible and affordable to the students coming from the lower socio-economic background, the social workers of Birati started this College under the aegis of Birati Sikkha Sansad. The College started its humble journey with ninety-five students and seven teachers, including the Principal, having provision only for Pass Course, with a limited option of subjects. The College was named after Smt. Mrinalini Devi, the mother of Sri Santosh Chandra Datta, who donated generously for the purpose.

In a **span of fifty years** Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith has evolved as a **multi-faculty** Degree **co-educational** College with Postgraduation Course in one subject. Accredited "B++" in 2005 by the NAAC Peer Team, the College has tried to maintain and further escalate the heights of academic excellence and community welfare.

The voyage of this Institute started with the affiliation from the **University of Calcutta** that continued till the academic session 2007-08. From the session **2008-09** we were brought under the umbrella of the **West Bengal State University**, Barasat, through the Govt order No. 300-Edn(U)/EH/1U-38/08, dated 26 May 2008.

The second phase of our journey is also packed with its own charm and adventures. In the new era, we introduced Undergraduate Honours course in 6 Science subjects (Computer Science, Physics, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology and Chemistry) and the Postgraduate course in Bengali. With such expansion, the College now runs Honours Courses in 20 subjects and General Courses in 20 subjects in the streams of Arts, Science, Commerce and Management.

Along with mainstream academics, we run **professional courses** as well. We have signed **three MOUs**, i) with **WEBEL** Informatics Ltd. for conducting compulsory **Computer Literacy** Programme, ii) with **IQST** for **placement** of our outgoing students and iii)with **OPSIS** for running training programme on **GIS** for the faculty and students of **different Colleges**.



The other end of our performance spectra glows with the UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme, wherein we run four units, namely, Equal Opportunity Cell, Remedial Coaching, Classes for Entry in Services and Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development Cell. With these multidimensional efforts we attempt to ensure the holistic development of our students so that they can respond to the diverse signals of the globalised society in their own way.

On the other hand, the College has been able to expand its **infrastructure** significantly with the increasing involvement of our stakeholders. A generous patronage of **Rs 20 lakhs** was provided by the **Hon'ble M.P.** for the construction of our **auditorium** and we received **Rs 3 lakhs** from the **MLA LAD** fund of the **Hon'ble President** of our Governing Body for the development of our **playground**. She has also been instrumental in securing grant of **Rs 18 lakhs** from the Department of Higher Education, **Govt. of West Bengal**.

With such patronage, the College building has now been **totally renovated** to make it environment friendly and elegant; **ICT enabled** classrooms and **computer rooms** have been constructed centrally; **enough** desktops, laptops and LCD projectors have been purchased for the use in the Departments; the introduction of the **KOHA** software and **INFLIBNET** in the Central **Library** that has been **computerized** with **new acquisitions** and **online journals** and the **laboratories** are now **enriched** with the utilization of the **UGC grants**.

We have introduced **online admission** from the session **2013-14**. The **enrolled** number of students in the session 2015-16 is around **2900**. However, we would like to express, in this context, our sheer helplessness regarding the **'entering' profile** of our students which is not quite bright, owing to their **subdued** socio-economic background. This is one of the important reasons for which **average result** of our Institution is **not** upto our **desired satisfaction**. Despite this reality many of our students perform **excellently** and some of them even secure **top positions** in the University Examinations.

Another aspect for the **growth** of our Institution is that the number of **new recruitments** for teaching and non teaching staff in the **post NAAC period** is no less than 70. Among them a significant number of teachers remain engaged in **research activity** and the College now maintains its **representation** in the **Executive Council**, **Examination Monitoring Committee** and in several **Board of Studies** of the affiliating University. Moreover, the contribution of our teaching and non-teaching staff to the overall development is marked by the **community services** of the **Women's Cell** and the **NSS unit** of the College.

It is also a matter of great **inspiration** for the stakeholders of the College that with the catalytic intervention of the Hon'ble **President** of our Governing Body, the **Government of West Bengal** has awarded us in the year 2014 a **LTS** (Long Term Settlement) of **1.87 acres** (**112 cottahs**) **of land** in two plots at Fatullapur, Nimta for the establishment of the **Second Campus** of our Institution and the Governing Body of the College has decided to introduce there **professional** courses like **LLB**, **B.Voc**, **B.Ed**, **Travel & Tourism** etc. At present, with the availability of land, the



construction of **Boys' Hostel** is also a feasible project if we can secure the essential financial support.

With the Institution expanding manifold, the need for the **second cycle of NAAC** Accreditation is sincerely felt. An accreditation, we firmly believe, is a yardstick that can help in enhancing our efficacy and efficiency as an academic institution. It is important for us to identify our **strengths and weaknesses** through the **impartial and critical eyes of NAAC**, as we embark in the second phase of our journey towards the centenary of our College. It is with this aspiration to re-evaluate ourselves and encounter the challenges with greater motivation that we move towards the second re-assessment of our College. In this colossal endeavour we are privileged to have the **unconditional support** of our honourable patrons and we are guided at every juncture by the judicious perception of our **Governing Body members**.

The IQAC of our College, with its relentless striving towards promotion of institutional excellence, has given our enterprise a radical start. Gleaming with vigour and inspiration the NAAC Steering Committee has taken up the responsibility of monitoring the College through this assessment phase. The students, the guardians and the alumni are the invaluable stakeholders of our Institution and it is their distinctive participation that contributes to the overall development of our College.

In the long stretch of **fifty years** Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith has treaded not only on a garden bestrewn with roses. The thorns pose constant **threats** to the wellbeing of the College as well. However, we are steadfast in our mission that is enshrined in our **emblem** – 'Knowledge', 'Perseverance' and 'Empowerment' – and we have resolved to forge ahead through the obstacles that come our way. Like that of the unrelenting hero, **Ulysses**, we are determined "**To strive**, **to seek**, **to find**, **and not to yield**" (*Ulysses* by Lord Alfred Tennyson).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith is one of the oldest Institutions in the district of 24 Parganas(North) and plays a pioneering role in disseminating Higher Education in the Uttar Dum Dum locality. This is a **Government-aided College, affiliated to the West Bengal State University, Barasat.** Located at the fringes of the city, Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith caters to the aspirations of students, many of them being first generation learners, coming up from the under privileged section of the society. The prime objective of the Institution, therefore, is to make Higher Education affordable and available to such students, and helping them in the process, to secure a firm foothold in the society.

Accredited in 2005 as B++ the College has celebrated more than 50 years of tireless striving for knowledge and wisdom. In this wide stretch of path travelled by the College, we have faced and crossed several obstacles with our strength and efficiency, and at the same time, have identified our weaknesses and shortcomings. The maturity that we have attained in this journey has empowered us with the ability to meet up with new challenges every day.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The mission of our College is to educate young students keeping in mind both the utilitarian scope of education and to ensure, at the same time, a holistic development of their mind and soul through quality teaching-learning process. The motto of our College is enshrined in our emblem, which upholds the values of 'Knowledge', 'Perseverance' and 'Empowerment'.

The College being affiliated to the West Bengal State University is to abide by the curriculum designed by the parent University. Some of our teachers, however, hold prestigious posts as members in the **Board of Studies** of the West Bengal State University, and thus, play a constructive role in framing the curriculum. The Principal of the College is a member of the Executive Council, West Bengal State University and plays a significant role in identifying and resolving issues related to academic curricula of the Undergraduate and the Postgraduate levels.

To implement the curricula effectively in the institution, an **Academic Calendar** is designed and is made available in the **Prospectus**. The teaching curriculum is divided into modules by each Department and is handed over to the students. The modules are imparted through regular classroom teaching, project works and field studies. **Tutorial** and extra classes are arranged separately to offer special academic assistance to the students. **Remedial classes** are conducted centrally for the academically weak students under the supervision of the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme. **A centrally designed time table** is followed in order to maximize the number of classes within a stipulated time frame. Continuous evaluative process is followed parallely in the form of class test, mid-term test, selection test in order to assess the progress of the learners.



To enrich the University curriculum and mould it to the needs of our students, the institution adopts various measures to supplement conventional classroom teaching. These include, organizing International/National/State level Seminars/Conferences/ Workshops, Special Lectures, publishing of Annual Journal, Departmental Journals and Wall Magazines, Educational Tours, Socioeconomic Surveys, and Social awareness programmes.

The Women's Cell and NSS unit of our College play a productive role in generating community orientation through **gender sensitization**, **environmental education** and **human rights** among the students. The College takes special interest in imparting **value education** to the students for their holistic development.

To ensure that the curriculum leads to employment opportunities, the College offers a Compulsory Computer Training Programme in collaboration with WEBEL Informatics Ltd., a Govt. of West Bengal undertaking. The College also offers Employment linked Vocational Training through IQST, under NULM (National Urban Livelihood Mission), Govt. of West Bengal. To enhance the scope of employability the Career Counselling Cell, under the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme, organizes career awareness programmes by inviting personnel from the industry to hold employment related workshops and campus interviews for the students. Special coaching is provided for different competitive examinations like SSC, WBCS, Central and State Government services through Entry in Services, another wing of the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme. To broaden the scope of employability a decision has been taken by the Governing Body of the College to introduce new professional courses, like LLB, Diploma courses under B.Voc (Retail Marketing, Pathology, Physiotherapy), 3-year degree course in Travel and Tourism Management, in our new Fatullapur campus.

Following the recommendations of the NAAC Peer Team, the Institution has introduced **Postgraduate Course in Bengali** in the session 2014-15. Honours course in Computer Science has commenced from 2008-09. Honours Courses in Mathematics and Physics have commenced from 2010-11, Botany and Zoology in 2011-12 and Chemistry in 2015-16. Feedback on the curriculum obtained from the stakeholders, like students, parents and alumni are regularly monitored and analysed by the IQAC to ensure continuous growth of the institution.

CRITERION II: TEACHING & LEARNING

Our College played a pioneering role in introducing **online admission** among Colleges affiliated under the West Bengal State University, in 24 Parganas North, and is successfully running the system since 2013-14. To maintain the spirit of inclusion as upheld by the UGC, the College has presently lifted the restrictions adopted by the College at the entry level of admission and follows the criteria stipulated by the affiliating University. The admission process is absolutely transparent with merit being the sole consideration. Seats are reserved for the SC/ST/OBC and Differently-abled community of students as per the directives of the Government of West Bengal. The College arranges for a **Counselling Programme** for the candidates seeking admission to help them chose subjects of viability and interest.



The Institute attempts to make the teaching-learning process both interactive and participatory so that advanced as well as slow learners can be easily identified. Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners and advanced learners are motivated further to improve their performance in the competitive academic world. **Innovative teaching aids**, like smart boards, LCD projectors, computer aided learning programmes, laptops with internet connection are available for both teachers and students. Interactive approaches, like Seminars, Workshops, Extension lectures, Power point presentations, Excursions, preparation of Wall Magazines are adopted for quality teaching-learning experience.

There are 34 substantive teachers (including the Principal), 10 Contractual whole time teachers and 15 Part-time teachers in our Institution at present. Amongst 34 substantive teachers, 22 have PhD and 1 has MPhil degree, while among the contractual and part-time teachers, 2 have PhD and 4 have MPhil degrees. There are 26 non-teaching staff, out of which 8 are technical. As part of the Staff Development Programme faculty members are regularly sent to various academic programmes. 16 teachers participated in such programmes during 2011 to 2015. A large number of faculty members are invited as resource persons, paper/poster presenters at international/national/state/College level seminars, conferences, workshops and extension lectures.

Student evaluation is carried out most diligently by the faculty members through class test, mid-term test, selection test before the students finally appear for the University Examinations. There is an Internal Examination Committee and a Centre Committee that monitor the smooth running of the examination system. Our Principal is an esteemed member of the Examination Monitoring Committee for the Undergraduate Examinations, West Bengal state University, Barasat. Recently, the results of BA/BSc/BCom Honours Examinations, 2014-15 have been declared by the West Bengal State University. We have a total of nine, twenty-one and five 1st classes in the respective Part I/II/III Examinations.

Besides seminars/workshops/exhibitions, excursions/visits, the Institution attempts to impart value education to the students through talks, films/documentaries and community services, which lead to their holistic development.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTATION AND EXTENSION

The College promotes research culture through an active **Expert Committee**, comprising of the IQAC coordinator and three other in-house Governing Body teacher-members, which intimates the faculties about various fellowships, research projects and motivates them in applying for the same. The College extends all possible infrastructural support to the teachers, like timely release of funds and adjusting the working hours of those engaged in research projects. A considerable number of teachers of this College have their identified prioritized research areas. 6 UGC sponsored Minor Research Projects have been completed between the session 2009-10 and 2011-12. Under the XIIth Plan 6 faculties have been granted **UGC Minor Research Projects** amounting to a total grant of Rs. 18.91 lakhs in the session 2014-15.



The **Annual Journal** of the College has received its prestigious **ISSN** in the session 2011-12. Our teachers have a total publication of 32 books to their credit. We have formed **Science Forum** and **Humanities and Social Science Forum** in the session 2014-15 to further imbibe a spirit of research among the faculties and a journal entitled, *Ami Naari Ami Mahiyoshi* (I am the Woman, the Illustrious Woman) is awaiting publication.

The College also organizes seminars and workshops on diverse topics with focus on capacity building and promoting research culture among the staff and students. As part of the postgraduate curriculum, the students present research papers and also submit duly supervised dissertations.

The College encourages **sensitization and training programmes** that lead to the development of the scientific and computer based knowledge among faculties and students. Seminars and workshops on diverse topics are organized where students are motivated to present research papers and make power point presentations. As part of the Bengali postgraduate curriculum, the students present research papers and also submit duly supervised dissertations. It is a matter of great pride that 3 faculties of our College act as PhD supervisors to students of various Universities.

Our Institution has a long standing tradition in **philanthropy** through an engagement with the society, conducted through the NSS unit, Women's Cell and Extension and Outreach Committee. Several blood donation camps, free of cost thalassemia screening, fire safety programme, teaching the unprivileged children of the society and cleaning of the College campus are conducted regularly. Organizing **awareness programmes on women's health** is one of the prime altruistic activities undertaken by the College. The Alumni Association of our College actively pursues tree plantation drives thus contributing to the greenery of the campus.

To ensure job opportunities among students the College has signed **3 MOUs**: (i) with WEBEL Informatics LTD, a Govt. of West Bengal undertaking, under the department of Information Technology, Govt. of West Bengal in the session 2003-04, (ii) with IQST, which is the Funded Training Partner of National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), a PPP under the Ministry of Skill Development and Enterpreneurship, Government of India, in 2015-16 and (iii) OPSIS for running training programme on GIS for the faculty and students of Geography in the session of 2015-16.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

To conduct the curricular activities of the College we have two buildings in the same campus, **Main Building** and the **Central Library Building**. The Institution has a women's hostel in the **New Building** with a capacity to accommodate around 60 girl students. However, since no response has been received from any girl student even after serving repeated notices and advertisements, the Governing Body of the College has decided to make academic use of the building, till any such response is available. The PG Bengali classes are held on the first floor of the New Building for the present, while on the ground floor there is a **Computer Lab** having 10 computers and the rest of the space is used for residential facility for research scholars and



academicians who may desire accommodation during any national/international seminar/conference organized by the College.

In the session 2014-15 the College has been granted **1.87 acres** (**112 Cottahs**) **of land in Fatullahpur**, by the Government of West Bengal, for building its second campus, where various professional and vocational courses will be introduced, keeping in mind the demands of the job market. Apart from having spacious classrooms, well-equipped laboratories, digitized Library, computer with wi-fi facility, the Institution has **2 e-classrooms** adjoining the Auditorium to provide ICT enabled teaching to the students.

To promote extra-curricular activities, the College has a **playground** for conducting outdoor sports, **two gymnasiums** for male and female students, *Mukta Mancha* (**open-air stage**) and **NSS room**. We have a **cheap-store**, a subsidized canteen and an Alumni room within the College campus.

The Central Library of the College is fully digitized. **OPAC** has been installed and EPW and many other journals are available online. The College is also a subscriber of the **INFLIBNET** facility. Every year a series of new books and journals is added to the Library. There is a total of 22872 text books and 9575 reference books in the Central Library. The **Archival section** of the Central Library has several documents of literary, historical and social importance indicating the cultural heritage of the College. In addition to these, the departments maintain their own libraries to provide additional books and journals to the students.

The Institution ensures proper maintenance of the infrastructural facilities and equipments through regular renewal of the AMC. Calibration and other precision measures for the equipments/ instruments used in the laboratories are regularly maintained.

The College has **4 water pumps** to ensure uninterrupted supply of water in the campus. We have **2 water-coolers** and **6 water-purifiers**. There are **2 pollution free generators** in the Main Building and 1 in the Hostel building/New building.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The prospectus issued to students at the time of admission contains information regarding different courses offered by the College, its aims and objectives, its administration and qualification of teaching and non-teaching staff members, rules and regulations, admission process and examination schedule. In addition, the College website www.mdmbirati.org provides relevant information to stakeholders.

Welfare schemes for students include reservation of seats as per Government rules, financial assistance/scholarships from Government and private agencies, concession on tuition fees to meritorious and needy students, special concessions for BPL students, Students' Health Home and medical insurance. In the session 2014-15 the College has given a concession amounting to Rs.1,66,765 on tuition fees to 312 students. The Students' Union and the Alumni Association also extend financial support to the needy students of the College.



The UGC sponsored Merged Scheme has been introduced in 2011 and the four programmes, Equal Opportunity Cell, Remedial Coaching, Career Counseling and Soft Skill Development and Entry in Services provide special academic support to the students. Through workshops, career awareness programmes, short certified courses on Communicative English and campus interviews the students are trained for stepping into a competitive job market.

The students of the College have bagged a number of **prizes and awards in District** and State level sports and cultural competitions. In the Youth Parliament Contest, organized by the Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs, Govt. of West Bengal our College was District Champion twice and also received individual awards for distinguished performance on the State level. A number of cultural programmes, like *Bhasa Dibosh*, *Basanto Utsab*, *Rabindra Jayanti*, *Rakhi Bandhan Utsab* are organized by the Students' Union. The College finances the students' magazine, "Dishari" published by the Students' Union. 12 Departments bring out wall magazines and 7 Departments publish their individual Annual Journals.

The College has a **Grievance Redressal Cell** and an **Anti-Ragging Cell** to address problems related to the demands and welfare of the students. There is also an **Internal Complaints Committee** to maintain a healthy atmosphere of mutual respect among the staff of the College.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The teaching and the non-teaching staff of the College are committed to make this Institution one of the educational destinations that combine academics with the scope of employability, thus imparting holistic education to the students. The Principal of the College maintains an effective liaison with the Governing Body in formulating the policy statements and action plans. The Institution is guided not only by the G.O.s issued by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal, but also by the Statute of the parent University.

Interaction with stakeholders is a continuous process thus ensuring participatory leadership. The **IQAC** seeks the feedback of both guardians and students and takes necessary steps to address their concerns. Interaction with the Alumni Association is also a vital part of including the views and suggestions of the past pupils in the running of the College.

All the multifaceted activities of the teachers are incorporated in the **Self Appraisal Report**. The Principal, too, closely monitors the participation of the teachers in both academic and administrative spheres of the College. Based on this monitoring the Principal encloses a report on the performance of the faculty with other documents required for the teacher's promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

The **Financial Subcommittee**, composed of the Governing Body members and other employees of the College **formulates financial policies** and then monitors its implementation. In each year the DPI, Government of West Bengal, appoints an **External Auditor** to look after the accounts of our Institution. The Bursar monitors regular verification of stock.



The College has an **Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)** established as per recommendation of UGC-NAAC. It was formed on 14.03.2005. This Cell monitors the teaching, research and various Departmental activities. It also makes constructive analysis of feedback regarding teaching, infrastructural facilities and other amenities of the College from the students, guardians and alumni. The internal academic audit of our institution is carried out mainly under the overall supervision of the IQAC, which operates through the **Academic Audit Committee**.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

The students and staff of the College collaborate to maintain the campus eco-friendly. Posters, placards are displayed in the College campus to enhance positive attitude towards creating healthy environment. Fluorescent tube lights are being replaced by CFL bulbs. The Building Committee of our College has suggested introducing rain water harvesting and installation of solar panels in our second campus at Fatullapur.

One of the **innovative measures** taken by the College is to turn the admission process online. In fact, Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith is one of the pioneering undergraduate Colleges in 24 parganas, North, to introduce online admission for students. To promote ICT enable teaching-learning, 2 e-classrooms have been set up. Innovation in terms of building physical and psychological strength of the students is introduced in organizing workshops on *Our Bodies, Our Selves* and *Stress on Youth*. The initiatives of the Bengali Department in Book and Painting Exhibition-cum Sale Programme have added not only to the literary and artistic heritage of the College, but have also promoted young and budding writers and painters in the larger world of creativity, who have passed out from the Department or are still studying.

One of the **best practices** of the College revolves around the activities creating **awareness on the welfare and empowerment of women**. We, in Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith, make a radical effort to uphold the cause of women, and therefore, leave no stones unturned to raise consciousness among our students about women empowerment, that will finally lead to their development and welfare. Through organization of seminars/lectures, poster presentations, screening of films and documentaries and campaigns, the students and staff of our College work in unison to promote the welfare of women.

Conservation of the environment that involves a qualitative and quantitative study of floral and faunal components is one of the best practices of our Institution, too. This practice helps in inculcating an interest and imbibes a sense of responsibility among our students towards our environment and its protection for sustainable development. The focal themes for both the UGC sponsored National Conference in 2013 and the International Seminar in 2015 revolves around the conservation of biodiversity and its world-wide impact. A medicinal plant garden has been set up within the College campus and is maintained by the Department of Botany with the help of other Bio-Science Departments.

1.1 <u>Curriculum Planning and Implementation</u>

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the Institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith is one of the oldest Institutions in the district of 24 Parganas (North) and plays a pioneering role in disseminating Higher Education in the Uttar Dum Dum locality.

The vision of the College is enshrined in our emblem which upholds the values of 'Knowledge', 'Perseverance' and 'Empowerment'. Our motto is to impart knowledge as well as to inculcate in the students the quality of perseverance that will finally empower them and make them responsible citizens of our country and the global community. We firmly believe in Cardinal Newman's central idea: "Knowledge is, not merely a means to something beyond it", it is an "end sufficient to rest in and to pursue for its own sake" (*The Idea of a University*).

Our mission, therefore, is to educate the young generation keeping in mind both the utilitarian scope of education and to ensure, at the same time, a holistic development of the mind and soul through proper assimilation of knowledge.

The prime objective of the Institution is to enlighten the first generation learners and offer them a firm foothold in the society whereby they get an opportunity to place themselves as eligible competitors in the arena of emerging national and global challenges.

In this pursuit of knowledge our biggest treasure is the value of perseverance, our indomitable desire to strive for betterment. It is only when young minds are broadened by the true light of knowledge, that they can break the narrow barriers of social prejudice and feel truly empowered.

The vision and mission of the College is made known to the faculties, students and other stakeholders through the College Prospectus and College Website. At the beginning of every session the Principal along with other teachers meet the new entrants and communicate to them the goals and objectives of our Institution.

The stakeholders are also made aware about the goals and objectives through different meetings with the students, parents and Alumni. The Students' Union and the NSS unit conduct different programmes through which the vision and mission of our Institution are communicated.

1.1.2 How does the Institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

Our Institution, Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith, is affiliated to the West Bengal State University, Barasat. The curriculum of the **Institution is guided by the syllabus that is framed by the University**. The syllabus is made available on the University website. Its hard copy can also be collected from the University. The



Institution collects the syllabus from the University and deploys the following action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum:

- **Distribution of the syllabus** as per the requirement of the students and the faculties.
- Considering the total number of available teaching days, an **Academic Calendar** is prepared every session by the Head of the Departments along with the Departmental teachers, where the syllabi of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd years Honours and General is divided into modules, showing portions allotted to each teacher within a specific time frame. This Academic Calendar is then distributed among the students.
- As per the Academic Calendar, classes are distributed among the teachers of a
 Department, maintaining a balance as far as feasible in the total number of
 Honours and General classes allotted to each teacher.
- **Tutorial classes** are arranged to offer special emphasis on certain areas of the curriculum.
- Project work, Film and Documentary show, Field study make the curriculum more enriching.
- Remedial classes are regularly arranged to help the academically weak students follow the curricula. Such classes are arranged both internally by respective Departments and also centrally under the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme for effective implementation of the curricula.
- **Interdisciplinary lectures** are arranged by internal faculties to offer knowledge to the students beyond the scope of the syllabus, thus enriching the overall curricula. For example,
 - ➤ The Department of Sociology organized a special lecture on 12 October 2012, where Dr. Suman Chakrabarty, Head, Department of Anthropology delivered a talk on *Participant Observation*.
 - ➤ The Department of Journalism and mass Communication organized an inter-disciplinary lecture on 30 January 2015 where Dr. Anjana Ghosh, Head, department of Political Science enlightened the students on *The Foreign Policy of India*.
- The Departments also arrange group discussions, interactive sessions, seminars, documentary/film shows for the benefit of the students. For example,
 - ➤ The department of Zoology organized an intra Departmental seminar on *Endangered Animals of West Bengal* on 22 December 2014 where students made power point presentations.
 - ➤ The Department of Political Science screened the Academy award winning film *An Inconvenient Truth* on 15 November 2014 and the department of English screened two films, *The Hound of the Baskervilles* and *Sheyal Debatar Rahasya* in an academic programme cum film show *entitled Offenders and Defenders: Crime Never Pays* on 11 December 2014.



- ➤ The Department of Philosophy organized a workshop cum interactive session on *Stress in Youth* on 16 January 2015.
- Internet facilities are provided to the students for effective implementation of the curriculum. For instance the College has a total of 68 computers with Wi-fi facility.
- Our Central Library is well equipped with an ample stock of Text and Reference books to meet the needs of the students. In the session 2014-15 the Central Library has purchased 700 text books and 194 reference books. EPW journals are available online. Access to INFLIBNET is also available.
- Feedback forms are given to students and Alumni and feedback is taken
 from guardians in the Guardians' Meet conducted by the departments.

 Data is collected regarding the academic atmosphere of the College including
 teaching-learning evaluation by the Departments and necessary suggestions are
 discussed in the Academic Subcommittee for further improvement.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or Institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

To implement the curricula and improve the teaching practices, the University involves the teachers in the following ways:

- Teachers of various Colleges are nominated as **members of the Board of Studies**, the body which designs the syllabus. Some of our College teachers, who are members of the Board of Studies, participate in the syllabus framing process and hence contribute to the effective planning of the curricula.
- The West Bengal State University organizes workshops from time to time to make teachers familiar with the alterations and modifications in the syllabus, thus offering them a common platform to plan the strategies in implementing the curricula.
- The University offers collaboration to the Institution for organizing UGC sponsored National/State level seminars, conferences and workshops.
 - The Departments of Botany, Zoology and Anthropology organized a UGC sponsored National Conference on 'Biodiversity: Interrelationship between Flora, Fauna and Human' on 29 and 30 September 2013 in collaboration with the Department of Anthropology, West Bengal State University.

The Science Forum and Humanities and Social Science Forum of the College in collaboration with West Bengal Council of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal organized an International Seminar on 'Environment, Science and Society: Exploring New Horizons' on 7 December 2015 on the occasion of the inauguration of its auditorium.

The Institution is also particular in extending all kinds of support to the teachers for proper implementation of the curriculum and suggests various means to improve the teaching quality of the Institution. Some of these strategies are listed below:

- Teachers are granted Duty Leave to attend Orientation, Refresher and many other short-term technical courses which furnish them with updated knowledge in their subjects. The College also ensures that the inputs gained from such courses are properly disseminated to the students through special lectures.
- The Institution encourages the faculties to offer their expert knowledge as Guest Teachers in other UG and PG Institutions. Dr. Rina Bose (Mitra), Dept. of Political Science takes UG and PG classes and Dr. Ritu Mathur (Mitra), Dept. of History takes PG classes in Rabindra Bharati University. Dr. Mitali Gangopadhyay too takes PG classes in the Dept. Of English, University of Calcutta.
- The Annual Journal, which has attained the prestigious ISSN, encourages
 the teachers to publish research oriented articles, which further imbibes the
 culture of research within the curriculum.
- Library and ICT facilities are provided to the faculties and students for the purpose of effective implementation of the curriculum.



- Our College teachers take feedback from the students on curriculum, its implementation and infrastructure to make the teaching-learning process an effective one.
- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the Institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other Statutory agency.

Apart from the significant roles played both by the affiliating University and the Institution for proper delivery of the curriculum (which is already discussed above), the Governing Body of the College takes decisions in matters related to finance and infrastructure to facilitate an effective teaching-learning process.

The plans of the Governing Body are then discussed in the Finance Committee and Building Committee, which take proper measures to implement them. For instance, the need to build ICT enabled classrooms for the recent changes in the curriculum is immediately addressed by the Governing Body.

Another significant body that needs mentioning in this context is the UGC recommended cell, IQAC. The IQAC takes active interest in the curriculum by identifying the gaps in the process of implementation and by suggesting measures to overcome them. The IQAC then makes a report and places it before the Governing Body through the Principal for proper action.

1.1.5 How does the Institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the University in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

Industry/Institute:

- The Institution has a tie-up with WEBEL Informatics LTD, a Govt.of West Bengal undertaking, under the department of Information Technology, Govt. of West Bengal since 2003-04. Through this collaboration the institute is able to impart a compulsory education of computer technology to the students. After completing the 2-year PC Application Course, each student is awarded a certificate by the WEBEL Informatics Limited, which is recognized by the Employment Exchange, Govt. of West Bengal.
- The College has signed a MOU with IQST, which is the Funded Training Partner of National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), a PPP under the Ministry of Skill Development and Enterpreneurship, Govt. of India, since 2015-16 for placement of our outgoing students.
- Another MOU with OPSIS Pvt. Ltd.has been signed for training programme on GIS for the faculty and students of the Department of Geography as part of enrichment course in the session 2015-16.



- The Career Counselling Cell, under the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme, organizes career awareness programmes by inviting personnel from the industry to hold employment related workshops and campus interviews.
 - In the academic session 2012-13 a campus interview was conducted by the Future Group (Hospitality & Retail Sector) in collaboration with HPCL and CII and job was offered to 40 students of the College.
 - From 2012-13 the Career Counselling Cell has been organizing workshops on Communicative English in collaboration with the National Institute of Management to improve the communication skill of the students in the curriculum as well as in the job market. In 2013-14 about 45 students attended the course and were largely benefitted.

Research:

Research body- The Institution has no such network with external research bodies. However, to promote research culture within the scope of the curriculum and without, the Institution has formed an **Expert Committee**. The Expert Committee, composed of the in-house Governing Body teacher members, encourages the teachers to carry out their individual research projects with external research agencies.

Teachers involved in research: Dr. Debashis Mallik has been selected for IASc-INSA-NASI(Science Academies) Summer Research Fellowship, 2015, to work with Prof. R. Murugavel, Dept. of Chemistry, IIT Mumbai. Dr. Nilay Kumar Saha has been selected for the award of Senior Academic Fellowship in 2014-15 by the Indian Council of Historical Research.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the Institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

The responsibility of designing and developing the curriculum rests mainly on the University. The College, however, makes significant contribution in the curriculum design and development.

The effectiveness of the existing courses and programmes are discussed in the **Departmental meetings** after receiving **feedback from the students** of the Department for effective evaluation of the programme.

The suggestions thus received are communicated to the Undergraduate Board of Studies (BOS) of our affiliating University, the West Bengal State University either by the Departmental heads or by our College faculty who are members of BOS formed by the WBSU.

Our respected Principal is a member of the Executive Council of WBSU.

To review the effectiveness of the existing courses and programmes, **Academic Subcommittee** meetings are held by the College and necessary changes in the curriculum are proposed and discussed among the members of the committee for proper execution of the curriculum designed by the affiliating University.

Responses of students and their parents on the desired changes in the curriculum are also obtained through (i) Students feedback (ii) Guardians feedback

Inputs from the Alumni are obtained through the Alumni feedback and are also taken into due consideration.

1.1.7 Does the Institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating University) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The College has a compulsory Computer Training course for spreading computer literacy among the students with the assistance from WEBEL Informatics Ltd. This course is developed and modified from time to time by WEBEL, itself.

Necessary efforts for preparing the curriculum have already been initiated for LLB 5-year course (after Higher Secondary), LLB 3-year course (after graduation), and other professional courses under B.Voc, like Diploma in Retail Marketing, Diploma in Pathology, Physiotherapy, Travel and Tourism, 3 year degree course in Travel and Tourism Management, have been applied for and would commence in our new Fatullapur campus.

1.1.8 How does Institution analyse / ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?



Our Institution has been imparting knowledge as per the need of the students. At the time of admission we guide our students to choose the subject(s) according to their merit and capabilities.

During the teaching-learning process, we impart knowledge through systematic class work, regular counselling, and proper evaluation to ensure high quality academic achievements. To bring out the best in students, who come from remote villages and are mostly first generation learners, is one of the most important challenges faced by the College in implementing the curriculum.

Our dedicated teachers, with cooperation of the supporting staff and an able administration, try to assist the students in every possible way. Through periodic meetings, the Departments discuss and analyze the stated objectives of the curriculum and their outcome.

Regular feedback from the stakeholders, like the students, parents and Alumni on matters of the curriculum are examined and studied by the IQAC and decisions for effective implementation are suggested.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the Institution.

The main goals and objectives of the College as mentioned in our emblem is to provide knowledge as well as to ensure a strong foothold of the students in the competitive job market. Our objective is to provide quality education at an affordable cost and help the students achieve academic and professional excellence as well. We mainly provide undergraduate courses for BA, B.Sc and B.Com both for General and Honours courses and ASPV(Major). In addition to this we have introduced Post Graduation in Bengali. We also provide a few certificate and diploma courses as mentioned below:

- Under UGC sponsored Merged Scheme, our College provides the following Training courses:
 - ➤ Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development (e.g. personality development, life skill development, managerial skills, communication skills, leadership qualities, analytical skills, etiquettes, group discussion etc.).
 - **Entry in Services** (e.g. SSC, WBCS, Entrance in Central and State Govt. services).
- ❖ The College provides the following certificate courses:
 - Certificate and Diploma Courses in computer (MS Office, IT, Software and Hardware Net Working, FA etc.) in collaboration with WEBEL Informatics Limited.




- ➤ Employment linked Vocational Training is offered by IQST, under NULM (National Urban Livelihood Mission), Govt. of West Bengal. An Orientation Programme was conducted by IQST where the graduates of 2013, 2014 and 2015 of our College have been motivated to apply for a Certified Course in Sales Associate, free of cost.
- > Certified Course on GIS for the faculty and students of the Geography Department of our College and other Colleges by OPSIS.
- Sponsored Merged Scheme, Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development.
- ❖ Several professional courses, like LLB (5-year and 3-year course), Travel and Tourism, Hospital Management, Retail Management, etc. will be introduced in our new Fatullapur campus in near future.

Though our Institution is strictly governed by the rules and regulations of the UGC and the Department of Higher Education, West Bengal, we try to maintain academic flexibility to ensure maximum benefit to the students. The academic flexibility is maintained broadly at three levels:





At the Entry Level:

The Institution offers a wide range of choice in Honours and General subjects so that a candidate may make an apt selection of subjects before taking admission. A candidate is allowed to fill in any number of forms according to his list of preferences, available online. The College arranges for a Verification Desk, composed by teachers of various departments, which provides guidance and counseling to the candidate seeking admission. The candidate is allowed to make changes in the subject combination that he/she has already selected during online filling of the forms. The objective is to allow sufficient flexibility to a candidate during the process of admission so that he/she may exercise the correct choice in their subject selection, that would further lead to their future placement and progression to higher studies.

During the Course of Study:

- Once a candidate takes admission and gets enrolled, he/she immediately comes under the purview of the norms of the College. However, the mission of our College is not to make any candidate feel crippled by imposing strictures on him/her. In order to maintain the spirit of flexibility the College may allow a student to make subject changes within a month of taking admission. A student is allowed to shift from one Honours subject to another depending on the vacancies and also on the basis of fulfilling the criterion of eligibility. Though this practice affirms freedom of academic choice, it is encouraged within the corpus of the University norms.
- Transferring students who have already enrolled themselves as General candidates in the College and would like to shift into an Honours subject of his/her preference, is allowed depending on the vacancies available.
- Since we cater to a large number of candidates who are first generation learners and often come from low socio-economic background, the fees structure of the College has been made as student friendly as possible. The College ensures adequate flexibility in the payment schedule of the students. The Institution firmly believes that academic mobility of a student, that is, his/her progression to higher studies should not be hindered due to paucity of family income. Besides providing concessions, grants, aids, stipends, the teachers of the College extend financial help to the students from a collective fund of the Teachers Council.
- Books and reference material from the Departmental Library is made available to the students even when the Central Library facility may be closed to an outgoing student.

After Exit from the College:

- Apparently an academic engagement of the student with the College comes to an end when he/she acquires a Degree (Honours/Pass that he/she was pursuing) and leaves the College in pursuit of future prospects. However, our Institution continues to offer academic guidance and support even to the pass-outs, by offering courses like Entry-in-Services, a UGC merged scheme, whereby ex-students may get coaching free of cost for appearing in different competitive examinations like School Service Commission, West Bengal Civil Service Commission, Railway Staff Selection Examination, Staff-Selection Commission Examination etc.
- Faculties involve themselves in guiding the 3rd year students on employability after they have undertaken their final University examination and are standing on their exit point from College.
 - For instance, the Departments of English, History and Sociology organized a workshop on 29 June 2015 for the 3rd year students who have appeared for their final



WBSU examinations and are on the threshold of leaving College on *Communication Consumerism and Employability: A Workshop*. The purpose of the workshop was to address the growing tendency of the students to choose marketing as their career option.

- The College sympathetically deals with those students who may fail to acquire the Degree they have been studying for. If they express dissatisfaction with their results and further insist on review or RTI, the College provides necessary support, as far as practicable.



1.2.5 Does the College provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

The College provides the following additional skill oriented programmes:

- O Compulsory Computer Training Programme in collaboration with WEBEL Informatics Limited: This enhances the computing skill of our students.
- O Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development Programme: Under UGC-sponsored merged scheme, this programme encompasses development of personality, communication skill, leadership qualities, group discussion, analytical skill and debating skill. Campus interviews arranged by this cell also enhance the scope of employability of the students.
- O Entry in Services: This is also a wing of UGC-sponsored merged scheme. Special coaching is provided for different competitive examinations like SSC, WBCS, Central and State Government services.



1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the Institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

The West Bengal State University is going to start a programme for Distance Mode of Education soon where our College has been enlisted as one of its study centre.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the Institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The College is affiliated to the West Bengal State University and the content of the syllabus is framed by the University. We always try to adopt the curriculum in such a way that it becomes compatible with our Institutional goals and objectives through the sincerity and dedication of our faculty members.

To enrich the University curriculum the Institution adopts the following measures –

- Modular distribution of the syllabus prescribed by the University for the students.
- Considering the total number of available teaching days the Academic Calendar of each department is prepared in every session by the Head of the Departments with the assistance of the Departmental teachers.
- Regular classes are well distributed in the routine according to the specialization of the teachers, as far as possible.
- Students have to appear in Class tests, Monthly tests, Mid-term tests, Selection tests round the academic session and their performance is regularly monitored.
- Our Central Library is well equipped with an ample stock of Text and Reference books and journals to meet the need of the students.
 Departmental Libraries are also maintained to help the students get subject and topic specific books.
- Tutorial classes are arranged by the departments to supplement the curriculum and also to assist the students in preparing for their examinations.
- Remedial classes conducted centrally for the academically weak students under the supervision of the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme.
- Special Extension Lectures delivered both by the internal teachers and eminent academicians from other Colleges and universities are organized by the departments for enriching the curriculum.



- **Documentary/Film shows** are screened to make the curriculum more interesting and comprehensible.
- Interdisciplinary lectures by internal faculty according to their respective specialization and need of the student are also organized by the departments.
- International, National and State level Seminars and Conferences are organized to ensure multi-dimensional approaches to the curriculum.
- Publication of wall magazines and Departmental journals offer the students a common platform for academic engagement.
- **Field study programmes and educational tours** are conducted by the departments both as part of the curriculum and also as a method of going beyond the limitations of classroom teaching.
- Social awareness programmes organized under the supervision of the NSS unit of our College make several attempts to unite the curriculum with the society at large.
- **Different cultural programmes** indirectly supplement the curriculum
- Career counselling, soft skill development programme and compulsory
 Computer training ensure that in pursuit of their curriculum, the students
 also receive professional orientation required for stepping into the
 competitive job market.
- In each academic session we collect feedback mainly from students, guardians and Alumni. This varied information is assimilated and processed to enrich our academic improvement.
- Many decisions related to the implementation of the curriculum and other academic matters are discussed in the beginning of each academic session in the Academic Subcommittee meeting and resolutions are adopted for the smooth functioning of the same.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the Institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The motto of our College is not only to impart education for the attainment of knowledge, but also to make our students well equipped for their entry into the dynamic world of employment. To ensure that the curriculum followed within the four walls of the classroom is in tune with the professional world outside, the College has signed MOUs with 3 Institutes, WEBEL Informatics Ltd, IQST and OPSIS Pvt. Ltd.

Apart from the training received from these 3 Institutes, the Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development Cell under the UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme organizes career awareness programmes by inviting personnel from the industry to



hold employment related workshops and campus interviews. Campus interviews are arranged to enhance the scope of employability.

Entry in Services Cell offers special coaching for different competitive examinations like SSC, WBCS, Central and State Government services.

We also have ASPV (Advertising Sales Promotion and Sales Management), a job oriented vocational course wherein the students acquire practical knowledge of marketing and advertising after completion of the course. We know that, the modern age is the age of marketing and advertising. More students are regularly attracted to learn and gain practical knowledge of advertising and marketing in various Institutions to take a professional degree. We therefore teach our students to be professionals by way of giving interactive lecture and practical job training. In this course, students can take a 30 days practical job experience in a reputed manufacturing/marketing/advertising organization as the 7 th paper of 100 marks in part-III. The College authority arranges and sends them to the various organizations. The name of these organizations are: Wellman Machinery Company (2011-12, 2012-13), Digital Publishing House, Exin Pvt. Limited (a house of interior and exterior decoration), Turtle limited (2013-14,2014-15), Trade India (industrial journal), Max-well Company (interior decoration), In-ex Private Limited and Vibgyor Advertising House.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the Institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith has tried to actively respond to the cross cutting issues of our society and socio-political environment of the world. We collect information, debate on those issues and disseminate these among teachers and students for their betterment. The College sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion environment etc. by organizing various academic activities, like seminars, workshops, conferences, field study, film shows and by extending certain community services.

Through the activities of the NSS unit, Women's Cell and Extension and Outreach Committee the students are sensitized about the various issues related to gender, environment, human rights, etc.

Keeping in mind that we are dealing with sensitive, immature and yet volatile teenage minds, we organize multi-faceted value enriching programmes that would help them to emerge as committed individuals of the society and further as responsible citizens of our country. Such programmes are specially designed to incorporate value system in our students that will lead to a holistic development:

O Moral and Ethical Values:

- ✓ As part of value education, College has screened inspirational movies like 'Iqbal', the story of a young boy who overcomes his handicap to achieve his dreams.
- The students are motivated by special programmes so that the moral and ethical values may be inculcated in them. For example, a workshop on community service was organized by the department of English entitled,
 - 'Teaching English: A Workshop', an attempt to combine academics with philanthropic mission.
- ✓ Community orientation programmes such as **Blood Donation Camp**, **Workshop on Womens' Health**
- ✓ Screening of Thalassemia and General health check up programmes are regularly conducted by the College.

O Employable and Life Skills:

- ✓ The Career Counselling Cell organizes programmes on Soft Skill Development, personality development, communication skills, leadership qualities, group discussions, debating at regular intervals in the Institution.
- ✓ Students are given different responsibilities to organize various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars, workshops etc.
- ✓ The students are made familiar to the parliamentary procedures and practices that provide them with all information regarding democratic governance, through programmes like the Youth Parliament and Quiz Competition organized by the Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs of the West Bengal government. In session 2008-09 the College was awarded the first prize in the district level competition in 2008-09.
- A certificate of recognition awarded to Dr.Ritu Mathur (Mitra), as Teacher-in charge of the district level team
- 3 students of the Political Science Department and 2 students of the History Department received certificates of merit
- 2 students of the Political Science Department came first in the Quiz Contest
- A certificate of High Commendation was given to student Soumya Das at the State



Level Youth Parliament competition, 2008-09.

• In Session 2010-11, our College once again received the trophy as the Best Performer in the Youth Parliament Contest at the District Level and one the students of the Political Science received the Award as the Best Opposition Leader on this occasion.

Better Career Options:

- ✓ Career Counselling is done to provide the students an overall scenario of the job market conditions to the students.
- ✓ Entry in Services programme prepare the students for State Level Competitive Examinations.

Community Orientation:

The NSS unit of our College plays a major role in taking up community orientation programme to raise social awareness among the students. Some of their programmes are as follows:

- ✓ Blood donation and Thalassemia screening (free of cost) camp: As part of generating community health awareness, the NSS unit regularly conducts a blood donation and free thalassemia screening camp within the College premises. The active volunteers of the NSS unit along with other students, teachers and non-teaching staff donate blood with the help of the State Blood Transfusion Council, West Bengal. Besides, students are screened for Thalassemia with the aid of Thalassemia Control Unit, Calcutta School of Tropical Medicine, Kolkata and maintaining adequate privacy reports are shared only with the concerned students. The last programme of Blood donation and Thalassemia screening was held on 27 February 2015.
- ✓ Fire safety awareness programme: Fire safety awareness camp was organized by the NSS unit of the College on 5September 2014 at the College campus. More than 200 participants including NSS volunteers, teachers, non-teaching staffs participated in that programme. A team of experts from the Barasat Fire Station came to deliver their valuable lectures regarding the causes of fire accidents, actions to be taken to minimize the hazard, emergency contact numbers to be dialed for help,etc. They also performed live demonstration regarding the different steps to control the fire.
- ✓ Awareness programme on AIDS and Thalassemia: An awareness programme on AIDS and Thalassemia was organized by the RED RIBBON CLUB under the banner of NSS unit in collaboration with the Students Union of the College on 26 February 2015 at the College campus through speech and poster competition among the students of our College. Dr. Gopeshawar Mukherjee, MD, PhD delivered his valuable speech on HIV/ AIDs and



Thalassemia issues in the society, where more than 200 participants including students, teachers and non-teaching staffs were present.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The College has a well knit network with the stakeholders for collecting responses on curriculum.


- The students express their opinion on curriculum through response sheets/ feedback form. For example the feedback collected from the students of the English department showed that a majority of them wanted to see cinematic versions of the texts prescribed in their syllabus. Based on this feedback English and other departments like Political Science, Sociology and History organize screening of movies relevant to the curricula.
- Every Department organizes Guardian-Teachers Meet where guardians are offered a platform to share their views in respect of the curriculum, teaching and performance of the Institution. For example most Departmental teachers reported that the guardians hoped for better exposure to their wards apart from classroom teaching. The College responded to this suggestion by making Extension/Special lectures a continuous programme in the Departments to supplement the curriculum.
- Responses on the curriculum are also collected from the Alumni through the Alumni feedback form. For example, a detailed analysis of the Alumni feedback report showed that organization of employability related workshops would help the outgoing students once they step into the competitive job market after College. Thus the departments of English, History and Sociology organized a workshop entitled 'Communication, Consumerism, Employability: A Workshop' for students who had just completed graduation from our College.
- Feedback of the teachers and students on the curriculum is discussed and analysed in the Academic Subcommittee which comprises of the Principal, in-house Governing Body Teacher Members, IQAC coordinator, Teachers Council Secretary, Head of the Departments and General Secretary, Students Union.



- Through Departmental meetings proposals for enrichment of the curriculum are made and submitted to the Academic Audit Committee. This Audit Committee, divided into 3 streams of Arts, Science and Commerce collect the proposals of the Departments according to their respective streams, make an all comprehensive report and forward it to the IQAC.
- The IQAC also plays a major role in transferring the feedback about the curriculum from the Academic Audit Committee to the Principal for proper action. The report collected from the Audit Committee is scrutinized by the IQAC and on the basis of that proposals for changes are suggested to the Principal.
- The feedback received is also communicated to the University for appropriate action through the teachers who are members of the Board of Studies in the University. However departments which do not have representatives of BOS, might also put forth their suggestions in various workshops conducted by the WBSU for the modification and enrichment of the curriculum.

1.3.6 How does the Institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

It is primarily through the IQAC that the College monitors the quality of the programmes that have been taken to enrich the curriculum. The feedback on various enrichment programmes in the form of questionnaires as received from the stake holders are analyzed by the respective departments in their meetings and the resolutions are submitted to the Academic Audit Committee, which then prepares a report and forwards it to the IQAC. The IQAC then conducts a meeting to discuss the validity of the suggestions as enclosed in the report and resolutions are taken in the form of proposals for enrichment of the curriculum and placed before the Principal for action. Once an enrichment programme is implemented, the IQAC monitors proper and timely execution of the same.





1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the Institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The responsibility for designing and developing curriculum rests mainly on WBSU. The College, however, makes significant contribution in the curriculum design and development.

- O To review the effectiveness of the existing courses and programmes feedback are received from students, parents, Alumni, peers and other stakeholders.
- O The feedback thus obtained is analysed by the Head of the Department along with the Departmental teachers in the Departmental meetings.
- O A report of the analysed feedback is **forwarded to the IQAC by various departments.**
- O The IQAC evaluates the feedback received from different departments and the key findings in the form of a draft are submitted to the Principal.
- O The Principal forwards the draft to our College representatives who are members of BOS of WBSU and they communicate our suggestions to the BOS meeting to redesign the curriculum.
- Our respected Principal is a member of the executive council of WBSU.

1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

On reviewing the existing programme new programmes are formulated for introduction of new courses after obtaining feedback from students, Alumni, parents and the academic peers.

Students--- A Proforma designed to obtain feedback on curriculum is distributed among all students.

Alumni----Regular Alumni meet gives a platform for their valuable constructive suggestions on curriculum. A feedback form is also distributed and collected during such meetings.

Parents---We organize Guardians-Teachers meeting. We obtain the curriculum feedback from guardians during such meetings.

The part related to academic matter is communicated to the University by the members of the Board of Studies in academic meetings. Our Principal being a member the highest body, the Executive Council of the affiliating University plays an active role in this regard.

Rationale for introducing new courses/programmes:

- To meet the increasing demand of the local students.
- As a result of the ever increasing population in the district (24 Parganas, North) the number of students aiming for higher education has considerably multiplied.
- Honours degree in the Science subjects listed above can open the dynamic world of the industry to the students coming from the remote areas of the district.
- Growing interest of the local students towards Science subjects.
- PG in Bengali has been started following the recommendation of the NAAC visit in 2004. Consistent meritorious results in the Honours department of Bengali also led to the introduction of the PG course.

Relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the College would like to include:

The College would like to include following courses in the future:

- The College has already applied and is awaiting approval for professional courses like, 5 year LLB course (after Higher Secondary), 3-year LLB course (after graduation), B.Voc including diploma in Retail Marketing, diploma in Pathology, Diploma in Physiotherapy, diploma in Travel and Tourism, 3 year degree course in Travel and Tourism Management to be introduced in our new Fatullapur campus.
- The Department of Commerce, Philosophy, History, Journalism and Mass Communication hope to introduce Post Graduation course.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The College administration not only believes in transparency but also concentrates on running the whole admission process with sincerity every year. The College played a pioneering role in introducing online admission and is successfully running the system since 2013-14.

At the beginning of the admission process, an **Admission Committee** is formed which includes all the in-house teacher members of the Governing Body, the Principal, Heads of the Departments (H.O.D.s), the Teachers' Council Secretary, non-teaching staff, and the General Secretary of the Students' Union of the College. All committee members are highly involved and try to complete the whole admission process smoothly and fairly. Two teachers of the College are selected as Joint Convenor(s) of the Admission Committee for one academic year in order to lead the group under the Chairpersonship of the Principal.


The Admission Committee conducts the entire admission process considering the various parameters, framing suitable criteria, following the rules and regulations of the College, the affiliating University (West Bengal State University) and also the various orders of the State Government. The committee further communicates the instructions to both the teachers and the non-teaching staff for verifying the testimonials of the students whose names appear on the admission list so that they may be admitted in the College without any hurdle. The steps adopted for conducting a flawless admission process are as follows:

- Notification of admission publicity done through Website, Notice and Prospectus.
- Online admission from form filling to form submission, the whole process
 is conducted online and the entire online system is maintained by efficient and
 skilled agency.
- Admission is done purely on the basis of merit.
- For smooth running of the admission process and making it student friendly, the College collaborates with the Axis Bank so that the students can apply from anywhere by paying necessary fees for admission.
- The norms framed are followed meticulously to make admission a free, fair and transparent process.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.



- **✓** Criteria Adopted for Admission:
- The entire admission process is conducted by the Admission Committee under strong supervision of the Principal of the College.
- The Admission Committee frames suitable criteria considering the rules and regulations stipulated by the affiliating West Bengal State University and the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal.
- Norms for reserved category are strictly followed and documents and certificates supporting their eligibility for admission are verified as per Government stipulations.
- Though University norms are strictly followed, the specific need of the students are given considerable importance, keeping their socio-cultural-economic background in mind.
- **✓** Process of admission
- First, the entire schedule of admission is duly notified on College website and also College notice board which include (a) dates of (i) issuance of application form, (ii) submission of application form, (iii) publication of merit list (iv) admission. We have started our online admission process from 2012.

System

The goal of our 'Online Admission System' is to automate the Academic Institute's admission structure and its related operation and functionality. The objective of the initiative is to provide support to the administration and candidates seeking admission by providing a faster, transparent and easy way of keeping records and using them for reference and further proceedings.

- Features of our 'Online Admission System':
 - ➤ Our automated online software system works 24 x 7: Minimizes time of processing admission forms and enables our Institute to publish the merit list in a much less time as compared to the manual way of admission.



- Avoids hectic submission process: Allows candidates / students to fill application form at their convenient time in a comfortable environment.
- No Geographical Boundary: Institute does not need take the burden of posting the application form for outstation candidates. Candidates can fill application form from anywhere, that is, from their place of convenience.
- No Long Queues: Candidates do not need to stand in long queues to get their queries answered. Candidates do not need to queue up to get application form.
- Man Power Saving: Institute does not need to assign additional security to manage huge crowd waiting for admission, and thus the institute can use man power resources in other activities.
- **Reduces Paper Work**
- ➤ Only Eligible Candidate Can Apply: Since data is filtered through the eligibility criteria, only eligible candidates can apply.
- > Accurate and Reliable
- **>** Dynamic and User Friendly Customizable Real Time Reports:
 - o Institute can monitor the ongoing process of admission
 - O Day to day summary of progress of the admission
- Special Features of our 'Online Admission System'
 - ➤ Our system has the ability to calculate the cumulative score of each candidate by maintaining the University norms.
 - > Our system is able to **generate the merit list by maintaining the reservation norms.**
 - ➤ Our system is stable enough to **perform multiple registrations at a time and can handle multiple connections**
- Procedure of our online admission process:
 - ➤ Open Online Admission (information will be available in website within two days of result publication)
 - > Application Form viewed by candidates
 - **▶** Online Admission Form registration by candidates
- Payment of Admission fee:
 - ➤ Online payment through Net Banking /debit card/credit card

OR

- ➤ Offline payment through Axis Bank (any Branch)
- ➤ Original certificates/documents are to be produced by the students during admission and fees to be paid during admission



- ➤ The merit list is prepared by considering the total marks of the best of four subjects (excluding Environmental Science) obtained by the students in the Higher Secondary level (10 + 2 level) Examinations, maintaining the reservation rules and regulations for different categories of students (ST/SC/OBC/PH). The entire merit list is prepared with the help of an updated software under the close monitoring of the Principal, Joint Convenors and other members of the Admission Committee. The prepared merit list is then checked and verified by the Departmental Heads to rule out minor errors, if any. The merit list is prepared on the basis of the intake capacity in each department, as approved by the affiliating University.
- ➤ The well prepared merit list is then uploaded on College website and also displayed on the notice board as per earlier notification, mentioning the terms and conditions of the validity of admission.
- > The students are asked to get themselves admitted showing proper documents within stipulated dates. Necessary counselling is offered to the candidate by the concerned teacher before admission.
- ➤ If seats remain vacant, subsequent merit lists are issued for admission of the students.
- ➤ It is important to mention in this regard that despite strict observance of the criteria and process of admission as per Government and University norms, the College is sensitive towards the specific need of each candidate and thus tries to maintain an academic flexibility as much as possible. For instance, if a candidate misses out the deadline for admission, the College is compassionate enough to offer a second chance to the candidate after the exhaustion of the fourth merit list. Also, candidates who have secured distinction in Sports on the District/National/International level are given due preference.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the College and provide a comparison with other Colleges of the affiliating University within the city/district.

The College at present follows the criteria as stipulated by the affiliating University. So, there is no question of comparison with other Colleges. Previously, an attempt was made to maintain cut-off marks for a few subjects, like English, Bengali, Geography etc. To maintain the spirit of inclusion as upheld by the UGC, we have at present, lifted the restrictions adopted by the



College at the entry level of admission. The process of admission, however, is strictly maintained by the consideration of merit.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the Institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Mechanism to Review the Admission Process and Students' Profile:

- The College authority sincerely reviews both the admission process and the students' profile annually. Admission Committee, along with other subcommittees like, Academic Subcommittee, Routine Committee and Academic Audit Committee are committed to review and analyse the admission process.
- After completion of the admission process, the Admission Committee with the help of non-teaching officials analyse the demand ratio for each subject. For instance, Honours in Geography is highly demanding while the demand for Economics as an Honours subject has been declining over the last few years.
- The Committee analyses the demand ratio of the Honours as well as the combination of General subjects. Any inadvertent error related to the publication of merit list is immediately analyzed and rectified.
- Detailed analysis of the students' profile is examined by the Admission Committee and causes pertaining to the rise and fall of the students' ratio in a particular subject is identified and studied.
- Areas from which candidates are applying for admission in this College are also identified.
- The socio-economic background of the students is also observed in this review.

Outcome of Review and Steps taken for Improvement:

- An attempt to make the admission process more student friendly and flawless is the constant target of the College.
- Subject combinations have been altered and new combinations framed keeping in view the viability of the subject in the academia.
- The College offers those subjects to the candidates which would help them
 to secure position in various competitive examinations, thus opening new
 avenues of the job market.
- Where poor economic background of the candidate is identified as the prime obstacle for taking admission, the College sympathetically tries to arrange for grants and concessions to reduce the burden of admission fees as far as practicable.



- Highly demanding subjects are more encouraged and the performance level
 of the students taking up such subjects are critically monitored so as to
 maintain their level of excellence.
- Departments with low demand ratio are advised to adopt suitable methods for attracting students.
- Sometimes, a less demanding General combination is dropped and a new one incorporated after taking a justified resolution in the Admission Committee meeting.
- 2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the Institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

 - The Institution reflects the **spirit of 'Unity in Diversity'** and practices holistically the State Government's **policy of 'inclusive education for all'**.
 - The College authority strictly follows the reservation policy stipulated by the State Government for different categories of students during admission which reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.
 - Help desks are set up to aid students and guardians, who are often identified as first generation learners coming from the backward sections of the society. Proper counselling regarding the choice of subjects is ensured to offer right guidance and direction to the candidates willing to take up admission.
 - The Institution actively helps disbursing stipends to students belonging
 to the SC, ST communities, which come as governmental scholarships.
 All information regarding different facilities is informed to them by
 displaying and circulating notices for time to time. In this regard, specific
 non-teaching staff is assigned duty for running the procedure smoothly.



- As per the recent State Government policy the Institution has increased the intake capacity for students to accommodate the reservation for OBC-A (10%) and OBC-B(7%).
- Seats are also reserved for the Differently-abled students, as per Government norms, though admission taken by such students is almost negligible. The Institution, however, is planning to provide infrastructural support to encourage admission of more Differently-abled students in future.



2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

- 2.2.1 How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?
 - Reservation policy of the State Government is strictly followed by the institute
 in the admission of Differently-abled students. Admission is done on the basis
 of merit among themselves. Only a negligible number of Differently-abled
 students take admission in this Institution.
 - When Differently-abled students are admitted special measures are taken for their convenience. For instance, classes are arranged for them on the ground floor
 - The Institution is planning to make necessary provisions as prescribed by the Government and University, such as scribes, book readers, computers and ramp to facilitate admission of Differently-abled students in future.
- 2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.



The Institution assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme by taking the following measures:

- The College arranges for a counsellor at the time of admission. In session 2014-15 Amrita Mondal, a lady counsellor conducted a Career Interest Inventory for students seeking admission in B.A. General course on 16 June 2015 and students seeking admission in B.A. Honours course on 26 June 2015.
- The Admission Committee regularly holds counselling of candidates, wherein discussions with applicants regarding their aptitude/interest and suggests them subjects keeping their aptitude/interest in view.
- The Admission Committee also refers students to subject experts for comprehensive advice as and when required.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the Institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.

To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students and to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice, the following strategies are drawn and developed by the College:

- Slow learners are identified by the teachers. **Tutorial and Remedial classes** are organized for them..
- Study materials are supplied. Simplified versions of books are recommended to them. Bilingual explanations are used in classroom lectures and discussions.
- Concept clarification and problem solving exercises.
- Revision of topics and special tests conducted for them.
- Special theoretical and practical classes are arranged by each department.

2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The College sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion environment etc. by organizing various academic activities, like seminars, workshops, conferences, field study, film shows and by extending certain community services too. 2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The Institution identifies special educational/learning needs of advanced learners through direct interaction and on the basis of feedback of the teacher concerned. The Institution responds to their special educational/learning needs by taking the following measures:

- Books of more advanced level are recommended to them.
- Liberal Library facilities are allowed to them. They can get any number of books issued.
- Time Table is also framed, keeping their convenience in mind.
- Special classes are arranged to remove their doubts and difficulties .
- For additional knowledge on current and latest topics they are allowed internet surfing.
- Seminars, Conferences, Workshops are organized focusing on topics related to the syllabus to further enlighten brighter students.



- Encouraging students to participate in Quiz, Debate and Problem-Solving, Decision Making Exercises.
- Encouraging students to consult other national and state libraries located in the adjacent areas of the College like Indian Statistical Institute, Cultural Research Institute, Sahitya Academy, Central-State Libraries, National Libraries.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?
 - To improve the academic performance of the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, the College strives to minimize their dropout rate through the counselling of both parents and the students.
 - More Library books are issued in order to encourage learning.
 - Free studentships and other concessions on tuition fees are made available to them.
 - Liberal concessions are given depending on their merit.
 - Books, scholarships, student welfare fund and financial assistance are provided to the needy and meritorious students based on criterion set in the Academic Subcommittee meeting.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

At the onset of every academic year, the Institution organizes and prepares the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules for all the courses offered here. The preparation and the publication of the schedule is conducted by the Academic Subcommittee consisting of the Principal, In-house teacher representatives of the Governing Body, Secretary of the Teachers Council', H.O.D.s, non teaching staff and student representatives.

- Syllabus: The Departments follow the syllabus which is prescribed by the affiliating University.
- ❖ Syllabus distribution: The Head of each department in consultation with other Departmental teachers divide the syllabi (maintaining the area of specialization and preference of each teacher as far as practicable) and allot the portions to be taught by each teacher in one academic session.



- Academic Calendar: An academic calendar is prepared by the Head of the Department along with the teachers which specifically denote the sections of the syllabi to be taught within the stipulated time frame by each teacher. A copy of the academic calendar is handed out to each student of the department for easy comprehension of the teaching plan to be followed by the department.
- ❖ Teaching Plan: The teaching plan designed in the academic calendar finds a reflection also in the Prospectus so that at the time of admission a student may get a fair idea about the syllabi and the scheduled examinations that he/she has to take within a specific timeline.
- ❖ Evaluation Policy: The evaluation policy of the affiliating University for each course (Honours, General and Vocational) is communicated to the students through the Prospectus of the institute. The current evaluation policy of the University comprises of three annual examinations (Part I, Part II and Part III) conducted at the end of each academic year. The institute has a system of internal evaluation of its own, which is conducted throughout each academic session, like mid-term test and test before the final University examination. Regular class tests are also taken by the teachers.
- Remedial Examination: There are provisions for remedial examinations for the weaker students under the consideration of respective teachers.
- ❖ Attendance: A minimum attendance of 75% is mandatory (as per University rules) to appear in the University examinations. The norm is strictly followed in the Institution.
- 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process? Functions carried out by the IQAC to improve the teaching-learning process with administrative, academic extension activities, research and Knowledge resource extension.
 - IQAC improves the teaching-learning process of the Institution by meticulous monitoring and scrutiny. It also recommends the use of various new and emerging technologies for improving the teaching-learning process. A few initiatives taken by the IQAC are as follows:
 - Promoting organization of training programmes and workshops for teachers in relevant computer-aided teaching
 - Sanctioning the use of visual aids to enhance learning process
 - Encouraging the proposals of various departments to **organize educational tours** to make teaching-learning more interesting.
 - Promoting use of Departmental Library and access to internet
 - Scrutinizing carefully the feedback forms filled in by the students, Alumni and parents so that issues related to the teaching learning environment of the College be improved.



2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Learning is made more interactive and student oriented by the dedicated faculty members of our Institution who enlighten the students about the course material and related issues and also supply the students a wider perspective about the subjects through a series of lectures. The **use of e-classrooms** has made the class more interactive. Independent learning is inspired by encouraging students to make **power-point presentations**, **project work and prepare wall magazines**.

Special lecture programmes are arranged at the Departmental level by inviting experts on the subjects from universities, Colleges and other research institutes. Students are duly encouraged to communicate and interact with the speakers to clarify their doubts as well as to acquire knowledge. Use of internet and Departmental Library is encouraged by the teachers.

Efforts have been undertaken by the College authority sincerely to improve the teaching-learning methodologies by using Participatory Learner Centric pedagogy like Project Work, Field trips, Quiz competition, contribution in College Magazine, Assignments, Computer and Web based learning etc.

2.3.4 How does the Institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Creative and Critical Interests:

The bilingual College magazine, 'Dishari', in which the Students' Union takes a keen interest comes up with materials consisting of different subjects and composed of various creative interests and is published annually.

The Institution encourages and sponsors creative flair among the students by inviting them to contribute to the College magazine, wall magazines, student and College news bulletin and Departmental journals.

Our Departmental wall magazines and journals promote the creative talents of the students.

Scientific and Philanthropic Interests:

- ✓ The scientific temperament of the College is enhanced by several activities involving the NSS unit and the Science Forum:
- The students are encouraged to participate in such events centering around subthemes like different kinds of pollutions, war and environmental issues, different sources of energy, health and pollution, global warming, etc.
- The students were made aware of the life history and the scientific contribution of Acharya Jadadish Chandra Bose, Dr. Meghnad Saha, Acharya in a Young Talent Search programme whose focal theme was 'Green Environment and Our Life'. This programme was organized by the NSS unit of the College by involving the local secondary and high secondary school students from class V to XII on 20 September 2014 at the College campus. The whole programme was divided into four events as quiz, poster, essay writing and speech competition on the great scientist and philanthropist Prafulla Chandra Ray. 13 schools along with more than 200 students actively participated in the programme.
- Exhibition of posters and models have been held to promote scientific temper among the students. Often the Science Forum and NSS play a major role in generating scientific awareness among the students.
- In order to build an atmosphere conducive to the study and research in science subjects, to help build scientific temperament in the students and to encourage students to take up science as career option, the faculty and students of the science departments of this College have recently formed a Science Forum.
 - ✓ The NSS unit of our College and also the Departmental students play an active role to involve students in philanthropic activities around the locality.
 - Some of their **philanthropic activities conducted by the NSS** are as follows:
- On the occasion of closing ceremony of our Golden Jubilee programme, the NSS unit along with its active members organized a one day programme on blood donation camp and free of cost Thalassemia screening camp on 4 March 2014 at the College campus.



- **Fire safety awareness camp** was organized by the NSS unit of the College on 5 September 2014 at the College campus.
- An awareness programme on AIDs and Thalassemia was organized by RED RIBBON CLUB under the banner of NSS unit in collaboration with Students' Union of the College on 26 February 2015 at the College campus through speech and poster competition among the students of our College.
 - The Departments also try to engage themselves in philanthropic activities in their small little ways.
- The Department of English organized a programme, 'Teaching English: A Workshop' on 15 January 2014 in its attempt to combine academics with an altruistic mission. The Departmental students donated books and stationery and taught basic English communication to the children of Siddharth Welfare Mission, a NGO supporting the cause of the deprived children in the society.
- Students of the Department of Sociology participated in the ASER projects in collaboration with PRATHAM, a NGO, from 2008 to 2011 to measure the educational status of the rural students of Bengal, studying in Secondary schools by applying a standardised index used all over India.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

We do not directly use all the facilities of e-learning but majority of our dedicated teachers as well as our students use internet facilities and e-resources to make teaching learning process more innovative and interesting. Besides normal class lectures we use the following teaching aids for the benefit of our students:

- Audio-visual aids to compliment class room teaching
- Providing computer-aided learning programmes, like power point presentations, use of simulation softwares for Digital Circuit Drawing, 8085 Microprocessor Programming
- Communicative English classes arranged by the Career Counselling Cell with the help of internet facilities
- Films/documentaries are shown regularly to complement the prescribed syllabus
- 2 e-classrooms have been set up for effective teaching.
- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?



- ✓ To open a wide horizon of knowledge to the students beyond the conventional text book learning, the following methods are undertaken:
- Organizing National and State level seminars and inviting eminent academicians to share their expertise with the students.
- Organizing Extension lectures by invited teachers from various universities and Colleges to enlighten the students on topics related to their curriculum.
- Through group-discussions, debates and project works the faculties try to imbibe an analytical and research oriented approach in the students.
- Educational tours, field works are organized not merely as part of the curriculum but also to gain first hand knowledge on the syllabi.
- Students are encouraged to make power point presentations on topics related to their subject of study.
 - ✓ The faculty, too, is striving always to acquire knowledge and thus remains updated through adopting the following measures:
- According to service rule the teachers attend Orientation and Refresher
 Courses arranged by the different universities. Such courses are designed in
 such a way so as to impart advanced and updated knowledge of the subject to
 the teachers and help them in their career advancement.
- Teachers also apply for the UGC sponsored Major/Minor Research Projects.
- Full time teachers are allowed to join **UGC sponsored Faculty Development Programme** to complete their Ph.D research.
- Teachers engage themselves in **interdisciplinary lectures**, thus broadening their scope of study.
- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?
 - Academic Support and Mentoring:

Besides regular class room teaching, the teachers offer academic guidance to the students as and when necessary, both on the formal and on the informal level.

Tutorial classes are taken to address specific queries of the students related to the syllabi. **Remedial classes** are arranged for academically weak students. Teachers also lend personal books, study materials to the financially weak students.

Teachers earnestly dedicate themselves to mentor the students under their guidance. All the students, irrespective of gender and class can approach any teacher about any educational, professional or psychological guidance.



• Counselling:

- ➤ Counselling is also a part of our academic programme. We assist approximately 50 students in selection of subjects at the time of admission on the basis of their merit and inclination.
- ➤ During the course counselling related to the syllabus, attendance, examination process is meticulously done by the teachers to help the students acquire a comprehensive idea about the curriculum.
- Students are offered career guidance through the UGC sponsored Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development Cell of our College. The function of the Career Counselling Cell in a nutshell is as follows:
- To make the students familiar with various career options through seminars
- To provide opportunities to students, as far as possible, for future placements
- To guide students in taking up professional courses that would help them in career prospects
- To address the problems of the students, related to stress anxiety, examination phobia, peer pressure and other issues.
 - The pass-outs of our College may enrol themselves in the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme course, Entry in Services, whereby they get an opportunity to prepare themselves for competitive examinations like School Service Commission, West Bengal College Service Commission. Classes are taken by in house teachers as well as specially qualified teachers who are invited to take classes on a regular basis to prepare the students for different competitive examinations.
 - To support economically weak students the College allows special concessions on tuition fees. In 2014-15 a total of 312 students, from Arts, Science and Commerce streams have been given a sum of Rs. 1,66,765 as concession on tuition fees. Financial aid is also extended by the faculty in certain cases on an informal basis. A portion of the Teachers'Council and the Students'Union Fund is used in assisting poor and needy students of the College.
 - ➤ The College deals with teenagers coming from diverse socio-economic background. The College aims towards the holistic development of the young minds and thus we address not merely the academic problems faced by the students but also try to delve into their psycho-social background that plays a huge role in shaping their personalities.



The students may also approach the **Grievance Redressal Cell** where suggestions related to academic atmosphere and other relevant issues related to their student identity are handled by the Convenors and other members of the Cell with adequate care and understanding.

For example, in the last four years, the requirements of the students that have been addressed, include:

- Installing a water cooler in the Canteen
- Installation of pollution free generator
- Computer with internet facility in the Students' Union room
- Book Bank in Students' Union room

As per the need of the students the provision of **drinking water and toilet for students** has been addressed on the first floor.

- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the Institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - ✓ Various innovative and interactive teaching methods are adopted by our able faculty members to teach the students proper application of knowledge that they acquire in the Institution. The College encourages the faculty members to complement the class lectures with various teaching methodologies, inside and outside the class-rooms. During the last 4 years, the following methods have been adopted by the Institution:
 - ❖ Power Point presentations and the use of E-learning: The teachers of all Departments use power point as a teaching aid. Moreover, the Departments of English, Anthropology, Zoology, Computer Science have started encouraging ppts by students. The conventional class room lecture method has been complemented by e-learning.

• <u>Model and Poster display</u>: Departments of Anthropology, Zoology, Botany, Physics, Chemistry, Geography etc. use models as one of the tools of teaching.

Displaying of posters on the Departmental notice board or on the walls of the department is a method that all the streams, Arts, Science and Commerce largely follow as a means of complementing text books with visuals.

The Institution organized a grand exhibition of models and posters displayed by various departments on the event of the Golden Jubilee Closing Ceremony on 4 March 2014. Smt. Chandrima Bhattacharya, President, Governing Body, inaugurated and appreciated the effort.

On the occasion of the inauguration of the Auditorium of the College and International Seminar, the Departments of Political science and History organized an exhibition of old newspapers entitled 'The Unforgettable 1940s in the Print Media'. Prof. Malayendu Saha, Vice Chairman of the West Bengal State Council of higher Education inaugurated it. It was praised by academicians and students alike.

- Socio-economic and socio-cultural surveys: Students are asked to submit reports on various projects and surveys that they undertake as part of their syllabi.
- <u>Film and Documentary shows:</u> Several faculties, like the <u>Department of English</u>, <u>Political science</u>, <u>History</u>, <u>Journalism and Mass Communication have introduced regular film and documentary shows</u> as a process of supplementing the word-text with the visual-text. A few of these shows are given below:

✓ Beside these innovative attempts, the faculties regularly follow certain conventional approaches to facilitate teaching-learning process, like the National and International Seminars/Conferences/Workshops and Extension Lecture Programmes organized by the Departments.



2.3.9 How are Library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The Library facility of our College is extremely enriched. It provides necessary books and journals to our students and teachers. We have a rich and diverse collection of books in different subjects. The College has a Central Library as well as Departmental Libraries to cater to the needs of the teachers and students alike.

 The Central Library remains open on all days except Sundays and other Government holidays. Both text books and reference books are made available to the students. The Library has an altogether separate section for Reference Books.

On 10-11 December 2015 the Central Library organized a Book Exhibition. Books of varied subjects were put on display. Books authored by the teachers were also displayed. It was a proud moment for the Librarians when their sincere efforts to promote reading and buying books were appreciated by the Principal, teachers and students.

Our digitized Central Library has 4 computers with 2mbps/10mbps/1gb: 56 abps internet band width/speed, 1 printer, and one Xerox machine for the help of the students and teachers. The presence of the INFLIBNET facility helps the students and teachers get access to various useful journals.

- Most of the Departments have their own respective Libraries where the books are issued by the Departmental teachers during the Library period. The Departmental Libraries mainly cater to the Honours students of the respective Departments while both the Honours and General students avail the Central Library resources to enrich themselves. The Librarians help the Departments to purchase new books according to the requirement of the faculty members and students.
- Books for competitive examinations are also available and issued to the students. The UGC Merged Scheme has its own Library.
- Book exhibitions have been organized during seminars/conferences so that teachers and students can select new books for the Library and keep themselves and their students updated.

A Book Bank is also maintained by the College Students' Union, where students, teachers, ex-students can donate their old books, which are then distributed to the financially needy students. If required they can borrow books from the Book Bank for a year and return them after the completion of the course.

2.3.10 Does the Institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the Institutional approaches to overcome these.

The Institution is extremely conscious about the work load in terms of the curriculum and the stipulated time allotted for its completion. In order to ensure



that the teachers complete the curriculum within the planned time frame, the Institution has incorporated the following mechanisms:

Each department has to prepare a well –planned Academic Calendar for the entire year, which is then printed and handed over to the students at the beginning of the academic session

Constant monitoring is done by the concerned authority and the Academic Audit Committee to ensure effective application of the work plans.

In spite of the above mentioned measures, the Institution at times faces a few challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar, under some unforeseen extra ordinary circumstances, like Central/State level elections, when the College campus is occupied by the Central/State Police/Troops and thus normal classes have to be suspended, or natural calamities, like flood, when the College space is used to provide shelter to the local people.

However, we have a provision of additional working days to meet such unforeseen challenges and the faculties try their best to take additional special classes, remedial classes to complete the syllabus and to help the College run smooth.

It is also undeniable that the change in the UG structure as followed by the affiliating University has affected the curriculum to some extent. The three-tier system followed in the UG level, Part I + Part II+ Part III, has indirectly reduced the number of actual teaching days, thus posing a new challenge to both teachers and students regarding the completion of the vast curriculum within a short time span.

However, it is through systematic division of the curriculum into modular patterns in the form of an all comprehensive academic calendar that the departments meet the challenge of the stipulated time.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The IQAC plays a major role in monitoring the quality of teaching-learning. The IQAC is helped by the Academic Audit Committee in this respect. Regular feedbacks are acquired from the students, teachers, parents, and also the Alumni and their suggestions are incorporated as far as practicable to enrich the teaching-learning process.

The **Evaluation process** involves regular internal assessment system, which includes **class works**, **monthly tests**, **mid-term tests and selection tests**. On the basis of such evaluation the faculties locate the slow learners and weak students and necessary steps are taken to improve them academically.

2.4 **Teacher Quality**

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the College in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its



human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The competent and qualified teachers are recruited in two ways:

- (I) Directly by the Governing Body (GB) of the College, on recommendation of the West Bengal College Service Commission (WBCSC), which is an autonomous body of Govt. of West Bengal, that recruit teachers for Government aided Colleges. The WBCSC seeks vacancy list for different subjects from the Colleges of West Bengal. The Colleges provide the vacancy list with prior approval of the Governing Body (GB) of the College. After completion of all official procedures, the WBCSC recommends the qualified candidates to be recruited by the concerned College. Then the GB appoints the recommended candidate by maintaining all stipulated rules and regulations of Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal.
 - (II) The College also recruits contractual whole time teachers (CWTT), part time teachers (PTT) and guest teachers (GT) on its own. High level of transparency for recruiting competent and qualified teachers is maintained by the College authority (GB).

With prior approval of GB, the College makes open advertisement in leading newspapers and also uploads the advertisement on institutional website mentioning the eligibility criteria for recruitment of teachers, following the norms laid down by the University Grants Commission (UGC), the affiliating university and the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal.

Candidates who fulfil the criterion are shortlisted and invited for interview. The interview panel comprises competent representatives from the affiliating university. A candidate is selected only on the basis of merit, research experiences and performance in the interview. A panel is prepared and the candidate who is first on the panel receives a call from the College and asked to join. His/her recruitment is then sanctioned by the GB.

However it must be mentioned that since 2010 -11 the service of the CWTT(vide G.O. 10-Edn(CS)/10M-31/10 dated 04.11.2011) and the service of the PTT (vide G.O.786-Edn(CS) dated 08.10.2010)has become secured until the age of retirement and the Govt.of West Bengal has taken all financial liabilities.

At present, the institution has 34 substantive teachers (including Principal), 10 Contractual Whole-time Teachers (CWTT) and 15 Part-Time Teachers (PTT) and also a few Guest Teachers as per requirement.





2.4.2 How does the Institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the Institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

In addition to utilizing the resources available, the College attempts to invite stalwarts of various fields in the capacity of guest teachers or invited lectures.

- The newly opened PG Department of Bengali has invited a few eminent academicians as Guest Teachers, like Dr. Ashok Kumar Mishra, Retired Associate Professor, Bhairab Ganguly College, Dr. Radheshyam Saha, Retired Associate Professor, Sri Chaitanya College, Habra, who excel in areas of Modern Bengali Literature. Dr. Dipankar Mallik, Assistant Professor, Vivekananda Vidyamandir, Belur and Dr. Mohini Mohan Sardar, Professor and Head, Dept.of Bengali, West Bengal State University enlighten the students on the study of Middle Ages in Bengali Literature.
- 2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the Institution in enhancing the teacher quality.
 - Staff development programmes: The Institution allows the teachers to join various Staff Development Programmes not merely to attain eligibility for promotion, but also as an effective means to enhance the knowledge of the teachers. Teachers who joined such programmes in the last four years are as follows:

- **Faculty Training programmes** are organized by the Institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning.
- Advanced learning is also inculcated by the College by organizing regularly seminars, conferences etc. sponsored by different funding agencies, like the UGC and the Higher Education Council, Govt. of West Bengal.
- Teachers are encouraged to attend workshops organized by the affiliating University: .Workshop on syllabi of various subjects are organized by the West Bengal State University on a regular basis for better handling of the changes in the curriculum. Teachers of all departments are encouraged to attend such workshops. A training course in Research Methodology in Social Science Research entitled, 'Methods of Social Inquiry' under the aegis of WBSU and Indian Council of Social Science Research was held in Labour Welfare Office, Kolkata. Four CWTTs were sent to attend this training Smt. Sampa Bhattacharya, Smt. Upakatha De, Dr. Srimoyee Gupta and Smt. Nirupa Paul.
- Programmes on Computer Training: Keeping in mind the growing need for computer assisted teaching, training of audio visual aids, smart classrooms have been organized in collaboration with WEBEL Informatics Ltd. During these programmes basic orientation training is provided to the faculty members in order to empower and enable them to use of various tools and technology for advanced teaching-learning.
- Teachers of the College are also encouraged to take initiative to learn and keep abreast of the latest developments by making presentations in other Institutions, participating in external workshops, conferences etc. The following table highlights the initiatives taken by the faculty of the College:

The College authority is very much supportive and caring in encouraging teachers in various aspects.

- Promoting the faculty members to participate Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, Training Programmes and Workshops organized by universities and other institutes
- Organizing national /international seminars on contemporary and relevant topics
- Granting authorised leave for attending and presenting papers in National/ International Seminars/ conferences organized by universities and other institutes
- Supporting to avail **UGC FIP/FDP** to the faculty for pursuing Ph.D.
- Motivating the teachers towards research development and encouraging them to send proposals for the UGC funded Minor research projects
- (Details of teachers who have availed FIP/FDP leave and granted UGC sponsored Major/Minor Research Projects are given in Criterion 3, Table no 3 (A)).
- 2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four



years. Enunciate how the Institut1ional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

The State Government has no such provision for recognizing excellence in teaching in Govt. sponsored Colleges. However some of our teachers have received several awards and recognitions in their personal, academic and extracurricular pursuits.

2.4.6 Has the Institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Our Institution has introduced a system of evaluation of the teachers by the students from the session 2003-2004. The feedback of the third year outgoing students of UG is obtained through an elaborately structured questionnaire on different aspects of the College as well as on the faculty, maintaining anonymity.

These forms are then collected and a report is made by the Academic Audit Committee, which in turn is **evaluated by the IQAC**. The IQAC finally suggests means by which the teaching-learning process of the Institution may be improved.

Performance of the teachers is also evaluated by the DPI and the University nominees at the time of their promotion under Career Advancement Scheme.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the Institution ensure that the stakeholders of the Institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

 The Prospectus of the College clearly underlines the evaluation process followed by the affiliating University as well as the internal evaluation procedures maintained by the Institution. We have a continuous system of students' evaluation through Class Tests, Midterm Tests and Selection Tests.

• Such information is provided in detail in the College Website.



- Information regarding evaluation is also delivered by the Principal at the very beginning of the academic session.
- Moreover, the teachers of the various Departments in the Institution keep on orienting the students about the evaluation process from time to time.
- The performance of the students is discussed in detail in the Departmental meetings and in the meetings of the Academic Subcommittee meeting on a regular basis.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the Institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the Institution on its own?

The West Bengal State University keeps on making evaluation reforms for the benefit of the students.

Major evaluation reform initiated is the 1+1+1 system since 2008-09.

Since 2012, importance on class performance has increased in Practical Examinations and also for most subjects, External Examiners are no longer appointed for Practical Examinations.

In addition to Selection Tests, the University has also directed the affiliated Institutions to hold Mid-Term examinations as a preliminary assessment of students since 2010-11.

The Institution has no scope to initiate any reform in the evaluation process. The Institution follows the norms set by the University regarding the evaluation process. But teachers, as member of the Board of Studies of the affiliating University take initiative regarding reform in the existing evaluation process. The Institution also conducts Class tests to evaluate the students.

2.5.3 How does the Institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the Institution on its own?

To ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University the Institution maintains regular contact with the University administration, i.e., the Controller of Examinations, Registrar, Inspector of Colleges etc. by regularly attending meetings.

Our Principal is an esteemed member of the Examination Monitoring Committee for the Undergraduate Examinations, West Bengal State University, Barasat.

Faculty members are appointed as Paper Setters, Moderators and/or Head Examiners/Examiners.

Some of the teachers as the member of the Board of Studies express and exchange views with teachers of the University and other Colleges.



The College administration implements the reforms made by the University through the Centre Committee. It keeps track of all the developments in the University evaluation procedure.

The Centre Committee works very sincerely and ensures the smooth running of the University examination system in the Institution. A Duty Chart is prepared and Invigilation duties are duly assigned to teachers and a register is meticulously maintained by the Convenors of the Centre Committee for this purpose.

The Examination Committee plays a significant role in conducting the Mid Term and Selection tests in the College.

The Class Tests/Unit Tests are conducted by the Departmental teachers in their respective Departments to evaluate the regular progress of the Departmental students.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Our approaches are based on the illustration of Robert E. Stakes – 'When the cook tastes the soup, the evaluation is formative, when the guests taste the soup, that's summative'. Thus following the pedagogical guidelines, measures for formative assessment are adopted during the development of students' achievement programmes while in summative evaluation, we assess the outcome of the programmes at the end of an operating cycle.

To be specific, different faculties of our Institution make formative assessment over the achievement of the students through regular group discussions, student presentations, class tests and the mid-term test.

The summative evaluation is made by the College at the end of every academic session through 'Test', the qualifying examination for appearing in the examinations to be conducted by the University. Summative evaluation, however, is finally done through the University examinations.

Tutorial classes and remedial classes can be organized in a better way on the basis of the outcome of formative evaluations made by our faculty members and this in turn modifies the overall achievement of our students significantly.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

Significant improvements have been made in the policies of the Academic Subcommittee to maintain rigour and transparency in the internal assessment. Some of these measures are as follows:



- 20% of marks from the four unit tests are added to the results of the Mid-Term test, so as to place added emphasis on the performance of the student in each unit test
- Along with the marks awarded to the students in the internal assessment, due
 importance is placed on the percentage of attendance as well. 75% regular
 attendance is mandatory and each faculty puts up a list displaying the
 attendance percentage of the students at regular intervals.
- Answer scripts once examined are shown to the students and any query regarding the corrections is explained to the student so as to maintain transparency.
- For the holistic development of the student, **regular Counselling** plays a major role. Academically weak students are not only offered the scope of attending tutorial and remedial classes, but are also offered counselling by the faculty members as and when required.
- Independent learning is promoted by the faculties as students are encouraged to make power point presentations, wall magazines and projects.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the College/affiliating University? How does the College ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The graduate attributes are enshrined in the vision and mission of our College. The College aims at bringing about a holistic development in the students, so that when they pass out from the College with their graduate degrees, they step out with confidence and integrity into a larger global world. The graduate attributes that we try to inculcate in our students focus on the following qualities:

Knowledge: The College not only tries to imbibe subject specific knowledge to the students at the academic level, but also ensures a proper assimilation of that knowledge, which in turn will lead to the formation of an all comprehensive awareness about the world around.

Values and Ethos: In the contemporary society a student, who is going through the crucial stages of psychological development, has to encounter a number of challenges in the form of political and religious strife, cultural and social prejudice. The Institution attempts to imbibe the core universal values like truth, honesty and righteousness among the students so as to empower them from within. Value education in the form of talks, films, documentaries is imparted to the students. Any unfair means adopted by the students to pollute the academic atmosphere of the College is handled both with strictness and compassion.

Fostering National Integrity and Universal Brotherhood: Through celebration of various events, like *Basanta Utsab, Rakhi Bandhan*, Saraswati Puja and observation of certain days of national/international importance, like Independence Day, *Bhasha Dibosh*, International Women's Day, Rabindra Jayanti and others the College fosters the values of fraternity and cooperation,



when students come together, irrespective of caste and community to form national integrity and universal brotherhood.

Employability: The Institution shows immense concern over the scope of employability that may be available to the students once they graduate from the College. The College prioritizes knowledge in ICT, soft skill development and communication, which can offer better prospect to students in the competitive job market. We offer compulsory computer training to students through WEBEL Informatics Ltd. Our merged scheme sponsored Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development Cell is instrumental in guiding students about global job markets through organising various workshops, mock interviews and placement opportunities.

Since most of our students are first generation learners and come from impoverished economic background, communication in English poses a real challenge for them. To enrich their communicative skills Career Development Cell organizes short term courses in Spoken English.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the College and University level?

- At the University level, students can apply for review of their answer scripts and if necessary, they can invoke RTI for redressing their grievances regarding evaluation.
- At the College level, the faculty members show the answer scripts to the students for their examination and discuss about their performance in the examination. The teachers of the Institution encourage the students to express their grievances freely regarding the evaluation process. Guardianteacher meeting serves as a platform for the guardians to share their grievance with the teachers on the related issue



2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

We attempt to make the students and the staff aware of learning outcomes, specific to the subject. The learning outcomes adopted are different for different subjects. For example, a student who has successfully completed his UG course in Journalism and Mass Communication, is expected to be familiar with the techniques of making documentaries, or a student passing with Honours in English should be aware of the various literary approaches of analyzing a work of literature, or, a graduate in Sociology should be prepared for sharing social groups, norms, values and beliefs.

Such learning outcomes may be abstract or concrete depending on the content and scope of a subject. These learning outcomes are embedded in the curriculum and through continuous assessment and evaluation, the students gradually improve and learn the stated outcomes.

The expected learning outcomes are discussed in the Board of Studies meeting and syllabi is framed accordingly.

Through workshops organized by various faculties the University notifies the UG teachers about the learning outcomes that are set for a particular course.

The teachers then try to give a detailed idea of the expected learning outcomes at the beginning of the session and also during the course of study through direct interaction with the students in the classroom.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the Institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.(bar graph and pie chart representation desirable)

The performance of the students is monitored through the results of the Class tests, Mid-Term tests, Selection Tests and finally through the University examinations. The result of the Class tests are communicated to the students by putting up their marks on the Departmental Notice Board.

The results of Mid-Term and Selection tests of all the Departments of the Science, Arts, Commerce and ASPV Major streams are centrally put up for the knowledge of the students by the Result Committee. This responsibility is taken up by the Result Committee with much love and care for the benefit of the students of 1st, 2nd and 3rd year students. All records are well maintained by the Convenors and the members of the Committee.




On evaluating the performance of the students in the internal examinations, weak students are identified by specific Departmental teachers and Tutorial classes are conducted to improve their understanding and performance. It enhances the confidence of the students and prepares them for the final examination.

So far as the University Examinations are concerned, results of B.A./B.Sc./B.Com/ ASPV Major Part I, Part II and Part III Examinations are handed over to the College authority by the University. The mark sheets are individually collected by the 1st, 2nd and 3rd year students respectively from the College.

The following table shows the final 3rd year University results of our students in terms of the pass percentage in the last 6 years:

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the Institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The curriculum and the teaching-learning process are structured in such a way that a student may acquire the intended leaning outcomes at the end of the course.

Along with content based class lectures various other **teaching aids like computers**, **projectors**, **cameras etc.** are used to make learning more informative and interesting.

To help the students reach the learning outcomes, the faculties arrange for special lectures, seminars, conferences, workshops where eminent academicians offer knowledge that transcends the limited information offered by the text books. Field tours conducted by various departments, like Geography, Anthropology, Sociology, Zoology and others facilitate the achievement of learning outcomes. Educational excursions are organized by Departments like History, Political Science, Bengali, English, Journalism and Mass Communication, Philosophy etc. In this way, the teaching learning process takes on a holistic dimension.

Through continuous and rigorous assessment the students are perfected and gradually step by step they move towards the attainment of the learning outcomes. The primary assessment strategy followed is internal tests and examinations.

The performance of the student is closely monitored his/her results. The academically weak learners are identified and special classes and tutorials are arranged for them so that the path leading to the learning outcomes become easy. The other assessment strategy employed by the Institution is religious maintenance of a student's attendance. Attendance record of the students is displayed on the Departmental notice board and students securing low attendance are first offered counselling and in case of no improvement, the guardians are called and the matter is discussed.

The feedback of the students also plays a major role in assessing the adequacy of the teaching learning process and the learning outcomes that it aims to generate.

Any obstacle faced in order to reach the expected learning outcome is dealt with immediacy and attempts are made to remove it at the earliest, prioritizing the welfare of the concerned student.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the Institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

In the introductory classes of any course, teachers make the new students aware of the social and economic relevance of the course. Teachers focus on how the study of the courses can be economically and socially significant by explaining the job opportunities and scope of further studies and research work in the subjects. Departments organize seminars / invited lectures to discuss the issues relating to impact of studying the subjects in the society.



2.6.5 How does the Institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The Result Subcommittee of the College plays a very important role in compiling the results of the various internal examinations, like Mid-Term Test, Selection Test. Respective teachers submit the result of in-house examination to the Result sub-committee in the form of award lists.

The Result Subcommittee not only compiles the results but also analyses them on different levels. Through graphical representation the Result Committee tries to chart the progress of each department. Each department, in particular, and College as a whole then studies the movement of the upward/downward curve of the graph and plans its goals of progression accordingly.

To overcome the barriers of learning, evaluation plays a major role. After each inhouse examination the faculties sit together with the students and their answer scripts are shown and errors are identified.

Sometimes, depending on the low performance of the student, the guardians may also be informed and their suggestions are sought in the Guardians' Meet organized by the Departments.

For better success in the University examination question banks, model answers are circulated in the class. Also, remedial classes, tutorials are arranged to facilitate learning among the slow/weak learners.

2.6.6 How does the Institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

2.6.7 Does the Institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Evaluation of a student's performance is the most significant indicator that an individual teacher uses to plan out the future improvement of the student. A student is evaluated by the teacher on the basis of his/her class response, marks scored in Class tests, Mid Term tests, Selection Tests and percentage of Class attendance.

On each of the mentioned criterion the teacher judges the performance of a student. If any student is found withdrawn and shy in his/her class response, the teacher may privately discuss the matter with the student, provide necessary counselling and try to motivate the student by involving him/her in class activities.

So far as the results of the Class tests, Mid-Term and Selection Tests are concerned, the teacher shows individual scripts to the students and helps them to identify their mistakes. Also, on the basis of the scores attained, the teacher



further tries to locate the weak learners of the class. **Tutorial and Remedial classes are arranged for such students** and special guidance is offered in the form of lending **books and reference materials** to enable the student escalate the ladder of progression.

Students who fail to secure 75% class attendance are immediately called by the faculty through a notice for explanation. The faculty initially tries to solve the matter through friendly discussion with the absentee student. However, if that does not work, his/her guardian is asked to meet the faculty and the issue may also be taken up by the Principal if it cannot be solved at the Departmental level. In short, monitoring over class attendance is strictly maintained by the Institution as a whole.

Any other relevant information regarding, Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the College like to include.

The evaluation schedule of the affiliating University at times becomes a hindrance to the plan and progress of the curriculum and outreach programmes taken up by the College. Despite such obstacles the College meets this challenge by accommodating special PG and Honours classes during the time of University examinations.

In the lean session the Departments carry on meetings where the teaching—learning methods are improved to make these more student-centric and the results of the students are analyzed.

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the Institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

The Institution does not have any recognized research centre of the affiliating University or any other agency.

However, the teachers of the College are involved in active research work which is reflected by the considerable number of UGC sponsored Minor Research Projects availed by them.

Teachers are actively involved in research projects in collaboration with external agencies.

Dr. Debasis Mallick, Assistant Professor, Department of Chemistry has been selected for IASc-INSA-NASI(Science Academies) Summer Research Fellowship-2015 to work with Prof. R. Murugavel, Prof. of Chemistry, IIT Mumbai.

He is also guiding a Ph.D student of Jadavpur University on Synthesis, Structure and Photpchronic Activity of some d^{10} metal ion complexes of Azoimidazoles

Dr. Suman Chakraborty, Assistant Professor, Dept. of Anthropology is acting as PhD Assistant Supervisor in Calcutta University.

He is guiding a Ph.D student on *Obesity and Mental Health Status among Adolescent Girls in Kolkata*.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

The College has an Expert Committee to monitor the issue of research in the College. The Expert Committee is composed of the four in-house teacher members of the Governing Body:

- Sri Dhurjati Prasad Mukhopadhyay, IQAC Coordinator
- Dr. Madhumita Chakraborty (Sarkar)
- Sri Goutam Kumar Das
- Dr. Nilay Kumar Saha

In order to promote an environment of research the Expert Committee makes a number of recommendations like:

- Providing infrastructural support to teachers involved in active research
- Make relaxations for them in their class routine
- Purchase of Library books related to their research



- Display of their research papers/journals/books in the Library
- Encourage teachers to present the findings of their research projects to the Expert Committee and students.

The large number of completed and ongoing Minor Research Projects bears testimony to the successful recommendations made by the Expert Committee.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the Institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The Institution gives permission to the teachers to undertake the UGC sponsored Faculty Improvement or Faculty Development Programme and encourages them to complete and submit their research work in the time period allowed by the UGC. Institutional support is provided to enable easy implementation of the Research Projects.

Infrastructural help provided to the Principal Investigators who has undertaken the Research Project are as follows:

- Timely release of the UGC funds by the College so far Minor Research Projects are concerned
- Relaxation of working hours for the faculty in the lean session so as to facilitate field tours, surveys, Library work
- Infrastructural support in the form of Library, laboratory, computer, internet, printing, photocopying. Example special infrastructural facilities have been provided to Dr. Debashis Mallick, Department of Chemistry and to Sri Tushar Kanti Roy, Department of Zoology, to pursue their research work and projects
- Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authority

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the Institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The major steps taken to enhance scientific environment and research culture among students are as follows:

- Extensive field work is undertaken by the Departments of Anthropology, Botany, Geography, Sociology, Zoology and students are made to submit projects on the basis of their field study.
- Encouraging students to make power point presentations in seminars. For example,
- Students from the Department of Zoology and Sociology made presentations in the International Seminar on 'Environment, Science and Culture: Exploring New Horizons' on 7 December 2015.



- The students of the Department of English made a power point presentation entitled, "Unlock the Sherlock" in an academic programme cum film show, "Offenders and Defenders: Crime Never Pays" on 11 and 12 December 2014.
- The Department of Zoology also organized an Intra-Departmental seminar on "Endangered Animals of West Bengal" where the Honours students made individual research and presented their inferences through power points on 22 December 2014.
- Research oriented journals are available to the Honours and General students in the Central Library of the Institution.
- Students are encouraged to write research oriented articles in Departmental journals.
- In laboratory based subjects, intensive laboratory work renders benefit of the student.
- In the process of making wall magazines the students learn how to collect, select, edit, analyze data and information before presenting them on charts.

Faculties actively engaged in guiding student research

- The PG Course of the Bengali Department contains a dissertation of 50 marks, which is conducted under active guidance of the Departmental teachers.
- University of Calcutta has recommended a Ph. D student to **Dr. Nilay Kumar Saha**, Associate Professor, Department of Commerce.



- Dr. Suman Chakraborty, Assistant Professor, Dept. of Anthropology is acting as PhD Assistant Supervisor in Calcutta University. He is guiding a student on Öbesity and Mental Health Status among Adolescent Girls in Kolkata
- Dr. Debashis Mallick, Department of Chemistry, is guiding a Ph.D student of Jadavpur University

Besides fundamental research, teachers are engaged in action research, by training students and conveying to them the merits of research projects. For example:

Dr. Sreemoyee Gupta has conducted various training programmes involving her students on Women empowerment in NHPC, Family Work in Visuvius, Formation of Self help Group in Bernagar Municipality and Laws of Sexual Harassment in Vidyut Unnayon Bhavan on behalf of State Productivity Council etc.

 - The faculty members are encouraged to take leave and utilize it for their research and the percentage of teachers availing such leave is on the rise. In 2004-05, 3



faculties and in 2010-11, 4 faculties have availed UGC sponsored Faculty Improvement Programme and they were granted leave for completion of their PhD research.

- It is also worth mentioning that **Dr. Anjana Ghosh**, **Dept. of Political Science** and **Dr. Debashis Mallick**, **Dept. of Chemistry were sanctioned 6 weeks study leave** by the Governing Body of the College for completing their PhD research.

No inter-disciplinary research is pursued by the faculty members so far; however, opinions and advices are sought from faculties of other Departments in pursuing a research project on an individual capacity.

 - The Institution purchases the latest equipments as per the requirements of the Departments and ensures systematic availability



and use of the same by both the faculties and the students. New equipments like ELISA Plate-Reader, Ultra Low Fridge, Solvent Rotary Evaporator, PH meter, Centrifuse Machine (RPM- 12,000 to 16,000 rpm), Colorimeter etc are new additions in the laboratory.

- For proper use of the computers in the Library, log book is regularly maintained.
- Log book is also maintained for photocopying study materials, documents related to promotions of teachers, non –teaching staff and for other official documents.
- The requirement of computer for any General class is placed by the faculty in advance to the non-teaching staff.

A well stocked and up to date Library, internet facility with wi-fi connection, printout and photocopying facilities, support provided for conducting field works and collection of data, modern instruments in the laboratory are some of the facilities made available to the students and faculties.

Promotion of research in the new and emerging areas is a priority in the Institution. The IQAC takes active interest in planning and upgrading infrastructural resources so as to encourage faculties in exploring new area of research. Some of these strategies are as follows:

- Apart from providing computers in every Department, the Institution has built its second Computer Lab in the session 2013-14, having a total of 10 computers with wi-fi connection for extensive use of the students and faculties.
- To provide free and ready access to the renowned and scholarly e-journals, INFLIBNET has been introduced in the Central Library.
- Due to postal disturbances the issues of **EPW journal** were often delayed. The Institution has now subscribed for the **online availability** of the journal along with maintaining its hard copy.

The students of Botany Honours were sent to the Taxonomy & Biosystematic Laboratory, Dept. of Botany, Bidhannagar Govt. College, for identification of flora under the supervision of Dr. Mousumi Mukherjee, Assistant Professor, of the same College, in the session 2014-15.

The Institution boasts of an enriched and upgraded Central Library which promotes research among the faculties and students. The following are the facilities available in the Library:

- The Central Library has a computerized catalogue.

- The Central Library has an exclusive collection of books and materials on Rabindranath Tagore, called 'Rabindra Charcha'.



- The Central Library has subscribed to several journals and magazines.

- Departments have Departmental Libraries and the PG department of Bengali has a separate Library of its own.



The Institution tries to inculcate among the students the moral values of generosity and benevolence and encourages them to render service to the community with sincerity and dedication. For this purpose the Institution has formed several committees and cells which maintain a relationship of proximity and commitment with the neighbouring society. The NSS Unit of the College is actively involved in serving the community. This Unit has a team of young and energetic student members who are taught to regard social service as their prime mission of life.

The Institution also has a Women's Cell and an Extension and Outreach Committee, comprising of teaching, non-teaching and student members. With the support of the College administration as well as the local administration, these bodies extend their hands to the distressed and the needy of our society. Following the basic motto, "Not Me But You", the Institution makes the best possible efforts to bring about meaningful changes in the society, thereby contributing to the process of nation building.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The Institution has an active NSS Unit headed by the Programme Officer, Dr. Debashis Mallik and 2 other teacher members, Sri Sumit Mukherjee and Dr Suman Chakraborty. Many other teachers of the College are associated with the NSS activities of the College. The Programme Officer and the teacher members ask the Departments to suggest names of students who are voluntarily interested in joining the NSS team and offer service for community welfare. The NSS Unit then plans their year-long activities and guides the students accordingly, motivating and inspiring them to play philanthropic roles that contribute to the making of a good citizen.



The Institution has a number of Committees, like Extension and Outreach Committee, Women's Cell which are actively involved in the community welfare service and make attempts to create a bond between the students, College and the neighbourhood.

The promotion of such social activities are constantly reviewed and encouraged by the IQAC.

3.6.3 How does the Institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the Institution?

The College solicits the perception of the stakeholders mainly through feedback forms. As part of the Internal Quality assessment the 3rd year students of the UG Courses fill in the questionnaire/feedback forms and rate the teaching-learning process and academic atmosphere of the department. These forms are then analyzed by the departments and the results are forwarded to the IQAC, which further studies and proposes various methods that may be implemented in order to incorporate the suggestions made by the outgoing students.

The feedback of the parents/guardians is solicited through Parents-Teachers Meeting organized by every department of the College, where teachers and parents exchange their views regarding the progress of the student.

The feedback form is also filled in by the Alumni which enables the Institution to get a proper direction with regard to the overall progress and development of the College. Regular meetings with the Alumni result into various collaborations that make various extension programmes possible.

3.6.4 How does the Institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The Institution plans and organizes its extension and outreach programmes by engaging various committees and cells, formed at the beginning of each academic session. Majority of these programmes are conducted by the NSS Unit of the College, Women's Cell and Extension and Outreach Committee. The College provides necessary financial assistance for such activities. The College ensures active involvement of the teachers and the students in such activities, which seek to promote social awareness, community feeling and also a sense of social responsibility among the students and teachers. The main objective of such programmes is to bring about a holistic development in the students so that they emerge as 'good citizens' of the country.

The following is a list of community and extension services performed by the Institution in the last four years:



Activities of the NSS unit

- Cleaning of College Campus: A programme for cleaning the College campus was organized by NSS unit of the College on 19 December, 2014 by involving 20 NSS student members in order to generate awareness on the importance of maintaining cleanliness and also to motivate them to take up more such actions in the future.
- 2. Blood Donation and Thalassemia Screening (free of cost) camp: On the occasion of the closing ceremony of the Golden Jubilee celebration of the College, the NSS unit along with its active members organized a one day programme on blood donation camp and free of cost Thalassemia screening camp on 4 March 2014 at the College campus. A total of 70 volunteers including students, teachers and non-teaching staff of the College donated blood with the help of State Blood Transfusion Council, West Bengal. Besides, students were screened for Thalassemia testing with the help of Thalassemia Control Unit, Calcutta School of Tropical Medicine, Kolkata. Further, Thalassemia screening reports have been handed over to the concerned students. As per screening report, 87 respondents were found normal, 7 respondents were HbE carrier, one respondent was β Thalassemia carrier and report of 5 respondents remained inconclusive. In addition to the awareness programme, matters related to aforesaid issue was also discussed during the day.
- 3. Fire Safety Awareness Programme: Fire safety awareness camp was organized by the NSS unit of the College on 5 September 2014 at the College campus.NSS volunteers, teachers, non-teaching staff participated in the programme. A team of experts from the Barasat Fire Station came to deliver their valuable lecture on the causes of fire, action to be taken during a fire outbreak, emergency numbers to be dialled for help, etc. They also performed live demonstration on the different steps to control the spread of fire.
- **4.** Young Talent Search Programme: A Young Talent Search Programme with the focal theme entitled 'Green Environment & Our Life' was organized by NSS unit of the College by involving the local secondary and high secondary school students from class V to XII on 20 September 2014 at the College campus. The whole programme was divided into four events viz Quiz competition, Poster making, Essay writing and Speech competition. The students were encouraged to participate in these events through presentations in various sub-theme like different types of pollution, war and environmental issues, different sources of energy, health and pollution, global warming, etc. Students delivered speech on the life history and the scientific contributions of Acharya Jadadish Chandra Bose, Dr. Meghnad Saha, Acharya Profulla Chandra Ray. 13 schools actively participated in the aforesaid programme. For encouraging the school student's participation, a prize distribution ceremony was also organized by the NSS unit on that day.



5. Awareness programme on AIDs and Thalassemia: An awareness programme on AIDS and Thalassemia was organized by RED RIBBON CLUB under the banner of NSS unit in collaboration with Students Union of the College on 26 February, 2015 at the College campus through speech and poster competition among the students of our College. 10 students participated in speech and more than 60 students participated in poster competition on the issues related to AIDs and Thalassemia. The resource person was Dr. Gopeshawar Mukherjee, MD, PhD who delivered his valuable speech on HIV/ AIDs and Thalassemia issues in the society. The participants included students, teachers and non-teaching staff.

Activities of the Women's Cell

1. The Women's Cell of our College along with the Seminar Subcommittee organized a workshop entitled, 'Women's Health: Concerns and Remedies' on 10 May 2013, where Dr. Samita Pan, MBBS, MD, (Gynecologist) discussed about the women's health issues and Prof (Retd.) Hirendranath Gupta, Dept. of Applied Psychology, University of Calcutta, offered psychological counselling to the female teachers and non-teaching staff.

2. An awareness programme entitled, 'Fight Breast Cancer: Do Not Fear It' was organized by the Women's Cell on 27 February 2015. Along with the teachers, the PG Bengali students marched on the streets of Birati carrying posters and distributing pamphlets to generate awareness among local women regarding the symptoms and cure of breast cancer. Dr. Alekhya Bhattacharya and Smt. Upakatha De talked to women coming from a wide range of professions, from entrepreneur to fish seller, and explained them the need to be more aware of the disease.

Activities of the Extension and Outreach Committee

1. Activities Involving the Welfare of Children:



- The underprivileged children of the locality are taught Language, Mathematics and basic Science by the teachers and students of the College.
- The Department of English organized a one-day workshop on 'Teaching English' on 15 January 2014, where the students used charts and pictures to teach basic English and voluntarily donated books, stationery, clothes, etc to the children of Siddharth Welfare Mission, a NGO supporting the cause of deprived children in India.
- In the session 2010-11, the students and teachers of the Department of Political Science collectively donated exercise books, others study related stationeries and also food to 20 poor and severely malnourished girl children, abandoned by their parents and are currently looked after by Mrs. Kanta Chakroborty, a Primary school teacher and a resident of south Dum Dum Municipality area, who has been felicitated by the West Bengal State Women's Commission for her relentless effort in upbringing these street girls.
- 2. Old Age Home: The students visited the old age home Godhuli, located on Kalyani by-pass to give moral support to the old people and spent time quality time with them to relieve them of their boredom and loneliness.
- 3. At the Stone Laying Ceremony of the new campus at Fatullapur, around 3000 local people attended the programme and they were enlightened about the new courses and career opportunities that would open up at the new campus. The programme ended by distributing food packets, thus sowing the seeds of mutual companionship and cooperation with the local community.
- 4. Our College has supported the Uttar Dum Dum Municipality by providing land for the installation of a water heavy duty pump through which arsenic free water is supplied to the locality since 2001.
- 3.6.5 How does the Institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The College tries to ensure social justice and empowerment of women and children through various social documentaries, field works and other extension programmes. Below is a list of such programmes undertaken by the College in the last four years:

- 1. Documentaries creating awareness on the condition of Women belonging to the low socio-economic strata of the society:
 - ✓ The Department of Journalism and Mass Communication has made several documentaries on the professions taken up by poor women as means of sustenance, exploring the various aspects of their working life and the barriers they overcome to balance family and work. Some of the recent documents made by the department are:
 - *'Chalika'*(on women van-drivers)



- *'Tana Poren'* (women weavers of Fulia belt)
- 'Kaam' (women embroidery designers of the Muslim community of Duttapukur).

These documentaries have further been screened for all the students of the College.

- ✓ The Department of Political Science in collaboration with the Department of Sociology organized a Documentary Film Show that focused on the atrocities inflicted on women. The Documentaries screened were:
- 'Saving Face', directed by Sharmeen Obaid Chimoy and Danial Junge This 2012 Academy Award winning Documentary features two Pakistani women who were acid attack survivors and also shows their struggle for recovery with the help of a British-Pakistani plastic sugeon.
- 'Child Marriage in Rajasthan' This documentary shows the problem of rampant child marriage in Rajasthan in spite of the existing laws.
- 'Izzatnagari ki Asabhya Betiyaan' directed by Nakul Singh Sawhmey (2012) was shown to the students on 7 December 2013 to create on orientation among them regarding the extra-judicial role played by the Khap Panchayats in North India, especially in Haryana.
- 'Iraq: The Women's Story' This film was made by two Iraqi women in 2006, depicting the devastating effects of American's war on the lives of Iraqi women and their children.
- The short film 'Joyee' has been produced by the Government of West Bengal and directed by Shibo Prasad Mukherjee and Nandita Roy. The film presents a fictionalized version of the true story of Bina Kalindi of Purulia District, a crusader against child marriage.
 - ✓ Research projects on various social issues by the students of the Department of Sociology, like:
 - A socio-economic study on eunuchs
 - Self Help Groups and Women empowerment
 - Stress level among the youth and suicide proneness
 - Stress and childlessness

There are 3 formal MOUs that have been signed by the College. They are as follows:

Our Institution has signed a MOU with the WEBEL Informatics Limited, a Govt of West Bengal undertaking under the Department of Information Technology in 2003 to introduce a new compulsory course for our students in computer application. On the basis of this MOU, the company offers (since 1st July 2003) a Diploma course in PC Application to our students. This training course has immensely benefitted our students, especially those who hail from rural areas, in the context of our rapidly globalising economy and the emergence of a 'digit India'.

Our Institution has recently signed a MOU with IQST, an Indo-Swiss social enterprise that provides world-class, employment—oriented skill training for Class VIII to Graduate/Postgraduate job seekers in 2015-16 This institute intends to offer the course of Sales Associate for a duration of 3 months.

The College has signed another MOU with OPSIS Pvt. Ltd. for running training programme on GIS for the faculty and students of Geography in the session 2015-16.



3.7.6 Detail on the systemic efforts of the Institution in planning, establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages/collaborations.

In implementing the **MOU**, **signed with the WEBEL Informatics** limited in 2003, the College has provided a space of about 7.26 square feet to the company for its infrastructural development. The WEBEL now offers multiple facilities trainees. These include:

- 1) A well maintained laboratory with Internet connection
- 2) Separate theory room
- 3) Library facilities
- 4) Certificate after the completion of the course
- 5) Concession to the poor and needy students

The Institute provides all necessary facilities to IQST required for orientation of our students from time to time within our campus.

OPSIS Pvt. Ltd. is also provided with computer lab and internet connection for facilitating their training in the College.

It has been recently proposed by the IQAC that in order to promote research projects in new and emerging areas, the Institution may independently grant a sum of Rs. 1 lakh to the Arts Faculty and Rs. 2 lakhs to the Science faculty. 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

All infrastructural development programmes that facilitate teaching-learning are enrouted through the IQAC of the College. The recommendations of the Cell are discussed and approved in the meetings of the Governing Body. The Institution also has a Building Committee, for planning, implementation, inspection and supervision of all kinds of civil construction and developmental works in the first and second campus of our College. Advice of the concerned Departmental Head is considered for Department specific developmental work.

Allocation of fund is approved by the **Finance Subcommittee** of the College. Tenders are invited for selection of the contractor and the lowest quotation and credibility criteria are taken into account. The IQAC and the Building Committee constantly monitor and supervise day to day activity of the work.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities

Curricular Activities:

- Classroom: The College has 68 classrooms including laboratories to facilitate teaching-learning process. The rooms are of varied sizes and Departments have been allotted specific rooms in accordance with their roll strength.
- Laboratory: There are 20 well-equipped laboratories for conducting practical classes efficiently, which also include computer laboratories.
- Library:
 - The Central Library of the College has an area of 6000sq.ft.well stocked with books, journals, and computers.
 - Another Library has been set up in the new building for exclusive use of the students enrolled to the Bengali PG Department to facilitate easy access of books and reading materials for higher studies.
 - Also, Departments have been provided with almirahs, book shelves to stock books related to their particular discipline to form a Departmental Library.
- Merged Scheme Learning Resource Room: A large spacious room has been allotted on the ground floor for conducting the UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme classes. Library facility is also available in this room particularly for the merged scheme students.
- Auditorium: A large auditorium with 300 seating capacity has been recently built primarily keeping in mind the space required to organize National/International



seminars, conferences, workshops and various cultural activities organized by the students and teachers etc.

- **E-classroom:** Adjacent to the auditorium, we have two fully equipped e-classrooms that make our teaching-learning process ICT enabled.
- Computer Training Room: Infrastructural facilities in terms of a large room for conducting theoretical and practical classes have been provided to Webel Informatics Limited who offers low cost compulsory computer training to the students of our College.
- Computer lab in the Hostel building: There are 10 computers with internet facilities for the use of students, teachers and staff.

b) Extra-curricular activities:

- **Sports and outdoor games:** The College has a well developed playground covering an area of 28,800 sq ft.40 (approx.) of land surrounded by walls for conducting outdoor sports and games.
- Gymnasium: The Institution has two fully equipped gymnasiums-one for boys and one for girls. The Institution has appointed two instructors on ad-hoc basis, one male, and one female respectively for effective use of the Gymnasiums.
- NSS: The Institution has a very active NSS unit motivating our students in social responsibility by conducting various projects and



awareness programmes to develop their leadership capabilities. The NSS room has been allotted for conducting meetings and for storing the various aids, like aprons, caps, badges, banners etc.

- Cheap Store: A small room is allotted to make texts, reference books, exercise books, stationery available to the students at a subsidized rate.
- Alumni room: A room has been provided to the Alumni Association within the College campus to help the ex students to carry out their activities.
- Open Stage (Mukta Mancha): This space is used for staging the cultural activities and other programmes of the College
- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution/campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The Institution is composed of 20 Departments including Science, Arts, Commerce and Management and Vocational Streams, for both General and Honours courses. Adequate infrastructure has been built up over the years to support the teaching learning process.

With the ever increasing student strength, the infrastructure is also expanding. We have 8 spacious rooms accommodating nearly 300 students and 15 rooms for smaller classes. A few large rooms have been temporarily partitioned by dividers to accommodate more than one class, as per the need of the departments.

During the session 2015-16 we have added 2 e-classrooms and 1 auditorium to cater to the growing need of the students. We have also started the construction of toilets and washrooms using the vacant space available between two buildings so as to offer better sanitary facilities to our students. We frame our class routine in such a manner that during busy sessions we utilize full capacity of available infrastructure to accommodate nearly 3500 students in our College.

In the adjacent Hostel Building/New building we have started the **PG course** in Bengali. We are further planning to introduce LLB course and other professional courses in the new spacious Second Campus at Fatullapur, once the building is ready for use. A new Computer Lab with 10 new computers is set up in our hostel building/new building for the use of teachers and students alike. 4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The Institution takes special care of the problems of those students who have some physical disabilities. The number of physically disabled students taking admission in our College is very limited. However, keeping their special needs in mind, the classes of such students are allotted mostly on the ground floor to ensure easy and free mobility for them. Other PH friendly infrastructural support is under consideration of the Institution. UGC sponsored remedial coaching cell also takes appropriate measures to meet their requirements, if approached by such students.


4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

- Hostel facility- The Institution has a Women's Hostel, which is also reffered to as the New Building with a covered area of about 19, 149 sq.ft. to accommodate around 60 girl students. However, since no response has been received from any girl student even after serving repeated notices and advertisements among students, the Governing Body of the College has decided for the time being to utilise the building for academic purpose. At present, the building is used temporarily for conducting Post graduate classes in Bengali, ASPV Major (vocational) classes, Computer training programmes and UGC sponsored classes for Entry in Services.
- Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga centre, etc. The Institution has a girl's gymnasium in the main building and a female instructor has been appointed on adhoc basis for looking after the girl's gymnasium.
- Computer facility including access to internet in hostel-The Women's Hostel/New Building of the institution has a Computer Lab in which 10 computers are maintained with internet connectivity.
- Facilities for medical emergencies-The Institution has a medical unit in which first aid box is maintained for emergencies .One doctor visits weekly



for free medical check up. We have arrangements with the Municipality Hospital and the local nursing home Bindubasini for medical emergencies.

- Library facility in the Women's Hostel/New Building- The Women's Hostel/New Building of the Institution has a Library in which about 5000 books are maintained. Two librarians are responsible for management of this Library.
- Internet and Wi-Fi facilities The Hostel building/New Building has a Computer Lab with 10 computers having internet facilities. The College has installed Wi-Fi facility in the hostel campus.
- Recreational Facility- Since our Women's Hostel/New Building is adjacent to our Main Building, recreational facilities in terms of Common Room and Gymnasiums may be availed any time.
- Security- Our Hostel building/New building is fully secured from any kind of external hazards. The institution maintains round the clock security service by two security personnel hired on contract basis.
- Available residential facility for staff and occupancy, constant supply of safe drinking water – The Women's Hostel/New building has residential facility fot the caretaking staff and and it has sufficient constant and safe water supply. Water purifier and water cooler machine have been installed there.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The institution has a **Health Care unit**. First-aid box is maintained for emergency use. Regular health counselling and Health awareness programme, like awareness on Thalassemia and AIDS, Blood donation etc., and Health



checkups are done free of cost both for students and staff. We have a tie up with the Birati Municipality Hospital and a local nursing home, Bindubasini for emergent situation.

The College is included in the Universal membership of the Student's Health Home Scheme maintained by the State Government. In case of illness students can avail themselves of the facilities like consultation with general physicians as well as specialist doctors in Eye, ENT, Medicine, Skin, Orthopaedics, Psychiatry, Gynaecology, Cardiology etc. at absolutely free of cost.

Students can get medicines and undergo diagnostic procedures like X-Ray, ECG, EEG, Physiotherapy, Pathology test, Spectacles, Minor surgery (OPD), Injection, Tooth extraction etc. at nominal charges (as low as Rs.2/-)

Every student of the College has been covered under Safety Insurance scheme that provides insurance to students in case of accidents, death etc. against an annual payment of Rs.10/- only

- 4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.
 - The Institution has an IQAC as per NAAC guidelines. A separate room is allotted for conducting the activities of the cell properly.
 - The Institution has a **Grievance Redressed cell**. A box for collecting grievances is maintained on the first floor. It should be noted that no such reports complaining of physical and mental harassments have been filed during the past few years.
 - The College has an active Women's Cell. At present the Cell has Dr. Alekhya Bhattacharya and Dr. Srimoyee Gupta as Joint Convenors. The cell has conducted several programmes on issues related to women's issues, thus creating awareness among students, faculty, non-teaching staff within the campus and women of the locality as well.
 - Placement unit/Counselling and Career guidance: The Institution directly
 does not have any placement unit, but our teachers from their personal
 network assist the students and a Career and Counselling and Soft Skill
 Development cell has been set up under UGC Merged Scheme.
 Workshops, Career Awareness Programmes, Courses in Communicative
 English, Campus Interviews conducted by the cell take place in the Merged
 Scheme Learning Resource Room.
 - **Health Unit:** The institution has a Health Unit. **First aid box** is maintained for emergency. Different programmes on **health awareness**, **health checkups** are done.



- Canteen: The Institution has a canteen of about 600 sq.ft. It is well furnished with chairs and dining tables. Food is supplied to students at subsidized rate. Water purifier and water cooler machines are installed. The canteen is run by an outside agency. The Institution has a Canteen Committee convened by teachers to look after and monitor the service provided by the canteen. Quality of food and price list is checked from time to time.
- Recreational spaces for staff and student: The Institution has 2 Common rooms (one for boys and one for girls). Besides, the Institution also allotted a room for Students Union. The said common rooms and Students' Union rooms are spacious enough. The Institution has also developed one 'Mukta mancha- an open air theatre' for staging entertainment programmes for students and staff.
- Auditorium: The institution has an A.C. auditorium of about 6000 square feet, with a capacity of 300 seats. It is used for national and international seminars, conferences and cultural programmes. It is well furnished and well decorated.
- Safe drinking water facility: The institution has sufficient supply of safe drinking water facility for students as well as for staff. Six water purifiers (Aquaguard) have been installed for supply of safe drinking water.

- Library committee has initiated various measures to make the Library, students' user friendly
 - ✓ A well organized digitalized updated Library catalogue is maintained in the Library for searching of books and journals.
 - ✓ Partial open-access system is maintained. Books are arranged subject wise in shelves and almirahs so that they can easily locate the books they need.
 - ✓ Librarians and other Library staffs help the students to get not only the specific books they seek as per requisition but also other books related to their syllabus.
 - ✓ The Library is open for long hours from 11am to 5pm so that that the student can get the maximum benefit of the Library service.
 - ✓ **Students can avail the reading room facility** throughout the entire working hours of the Library.
 - ✓ 1st and 2nd year students (Honours & General) can borrow 2 books whereas 3rd year students can borrow 3 books at a time for a fortnight and they can renew the books twice.
 - ✓ Students can avail computer facility with internet in the Library premise.
 - ✓ Question papers of the College and University are maintained subject wise and year wise in the Library for students' assistance.
 - ✓ Career guidance books are displayed in a separate rack so that students can get help for their future employment.
 - ✓ The College has taken initiative to make the Library automated.
 - ✓ Daily newspapers and employment weekly are subscribed in the Library for readers.
 - ✓ Latest Publications of the Departmental teachers are displayed in display rack and this is much helpful for the students.
 - ✓ **Journals are procured by the Library on a regular basis** for the benefit of the students as well as teachers.

 tender.



In the present digital era, it is impossible to run daily activities without computers and communication networks like the World Wide Web. Every Department, Teacher's room, Student's Union room, Office, Cash section and Library etc. have been provided with desktops and/or laptops, printers, internet connection and projectors.

The Computer Lab of the Hostel Building/New building houses 10 machines with internet facility, that is available for use by students, faculty and staff for myriad purposes.

Wi-Fi connectivity is available throughout the campus for connecting to the internet.

Up gradation activities like purchasing new memory chips, replacing faulty components, adding new nodes to LAN etc. are done on a regular basis by our AMC partner.

The Institute is planning on connecting office computer via LAN so that data, files and printers may be shared.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

The Institution has a total of 52 desktop computers, 16 laptops, 16 printers, 7 LCD projectors with LAN and Wi-Fi facilities which provide ICT enabled teaching. Generally the students use computers and their accessories in their own departments. Moreover, the ICT facilities are also available the Library, students'union room as well as the computer lab of the Hostel building/New building for reading, downloading and printing of study materials. Recently the institution has made provisions for two e-learning rooms adjacent to the auditorium.

Besides using the Departmental laptops, the teaching faculties make use of the computers installed in the staff room and in the Library for updating themselves and for individual research work

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching - learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

Power point presentations are made by the students under the guidance of their respective Departmental teachers.

For example, the **Department of Zoology** had organized a students' power point presentation on '*Endangered Animals of India*'.

The **Department of English** organized an academic programme cum film show on 11 and 12 December 2014, entitled 'Offenders and Defenders: Crime Never Pays', where the students and the teachers made power point presentations on topics of Literature and Sociology.

The students of the **Department of Sociology** in partial fulfillment of their B.A. degree present dissertation papers with help of computer technology.

The students of the **Department of History** use the computer facilities to **download information and pictures to make their wall magazine**, 'Historia'.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the College?

The Institution ensures proper maintenance of the infrastructural facilities by calling tender and appointing competent authority for regular repair and upkeep. The institution also maintains proper AMC for the purpose.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

The following measures are taken by different Departments to ensure calibration and precision measures of equipments/instruments:

Physics - Twice a year calibration is done for equipment like balances.

Computer Science - The annual maintenance of the computers are done and softwares are downloaded and formatted in their latest versions.

Chemistry- Checking of expiry date of all chemical reagents is done properly and regularly.

Anthropology - The human bone specimens are regularly checked for any fungal growth and if detected, proper treatment is done. In case of other instruments related to anthropometric measurements (anthropometric rod, weighing machine, blood pressure machine etc.) annual maintenance is properly done.

Zoology - Museum specimens (mainly wet specimens) are regularly checked to find out whether the level of preservative material is adequate. For microscopes and other equipments annual maintenance is done properly.



Calibration is done for equipments like pH meter, Digital weighing balance, Rotary microtome, Stage micrometer, Occular micrometer.

Botany – 4% Formalin is used as a preservative for plant specimens and its level is checked twice a year. Calibration is done for equipments like Colorimeter, pH meter and Incubator.

Geography – Instruments like Dunty Level, Air Photo, and Satellite Imagery are regularly maintained for determining correct results. Also Barometer, Thermometer, Hygrometer are annually checked.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the College would like to include.

Water Pump – In addition to local Municipal water connection the College installed 2 additional water pumps in the main building and 2 in the Hostel Building/New building in a secured location to ensure uninterrupted supply of water in the campus.

Power Distribution Panel - The entire electric circuit of the College is maintained in a manner that power load is properly distributed and Voltage fluctuation is controlled. Certain Departments have local stabilizers.

Generator – There are 2 pollution free generators in the main building and 1 in the Hostel building/New building. One 30 KVA and another 20 KVA provide generator facility round the clock in the main building, while another 30 KVA generator has been installed in the new building. There is a separate area where the generators have been installed.

College Students' Aid Fund: As most of the students are from economically poor background the College authorities provide concession in tuition fees to B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. 1st, 2nd and 3rd year students in every academic session without fail. Up to 10% concession in tuition fees is allowed for a maximum of 9 months to regular, needy, meritorious and BPL students. SC/ST students also get financial assistance from various government schemes.

<u>Hariprasad Das Memorial Fund</u>: This fund is utilised for concession in tuition fees to the deserving children of non teaching staff of the College.



5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

- ✓ Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections
 - o Financial assistance is provided to meritorious but needy students from the College Aid fund. The assistance is in the form of concession from monthly tuition fees. Students can claim concession if they satisfy conditions like regular (at least 60%) attendance, presence in all class tests/tutorials during the academic session, low monthly income of family etc.
- **✓** Students with physical disabilities
 - Seat reservation as per government norms
- **✓** Overseas students
 - o Special accommodation and one window admission service
- **✓** Medical assistance to students:
 - The College is included in the Universal membership scheme of the Student's Health Home.
 - In case of illness students can avail themselves of the facilities like consultation with General Physicians as well as Specialist Doctors in Eye, ENT, Medicine, Skin, Orthopaedics, Psychiatry, Gynaecology, Cardiology etc. at absolutely free of cost.
 - Students can get medicines and undergo diagnostic procedures like X-Ray, ECG, EEG, Physiotherapy, Pathology test, Spectacles, Minor surgery (OPD), Injection, Tooth extraction etc. at nominal charges (as low as Rs.2/-)



Every student of the College has been covered under Safety
 Insurance scheme that provides insurance to students in case of accidents, death etc. against an annual payment of Rs.10/- only

✓ Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

The College in collaboration with UGC has introduced the 'UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme' for students of the College as well as adjoining area. One of the key services provided by this scheme is coaching for various competitive exams like SSC, WBCS, SLET, NET through expert faculty. Enrolled students are provided with Library support and various learning materials.

✓ Skill development

Since a huge number of students of this College hail from rural or semi-urban areas, learning English and having technical knowledge helps in increasing their employability. Accordingly, they are given lessons in communicative English while basic computer literacy is offered by the Webel Informatics Limited, a unit of the Government of West Bengal. The UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme offers Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development programme.

✓ Support for "slow learners"

 Another benefit of the UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme is Remedial Coaching classes for slow learners. Students can catch up with their counterparts through tutorials and remedial classes outside class hours by in house and external educators.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

- ✓ The College encourages and facilitates entrepreneurial skills among the students. Spoken English classes organized by the Career Counselling Cell of the Merged Scheme and compulsory Computer training are part of this effort.
- ✓ The Career Counselling Cell has organised various programmes
- ✓ We have set up Assistance booth in association with Self Help and Self Employment Group, Government of West Bengal

- O The students of the College are encouraged to participate in **sports**, in the District/State/National/International level and the College has to her credit a number of prizes and recognitions.
- O The College also has the facility of **two gymnasiums**, **one female**, **the other male**, to encourage the practice of physical fitness among students.

Organizing cultural competition/programme

- O The Students' Union in cooperation with the College administration organizes annual cultural competition and awards, prizes and certificates to promote interest among the students to participate in such programmes. A host of events like singing, dancing, debate, recitation, drawing, quiz etc are organized and faculties judge the performers on the basis of their performative excellence.
- O Certain important dates and occasions are observed in the College through cultural programmes. For instance, students perform on the occasions of Rabindra Jayanti, Basonto Utsav, Rakhi Bandhan, Bhasha Dibosh, Saraswati Puja, Bijoya Sammilan, and many others. The Freshers' Welcome of the College organized by the Students' Union involves a medley of cultural events performed both by the College students and professional artists of repute.

O College provides free sports uniform, sports kits, lunch, and travel expenses to participants.

Additional academic support

O Students missing out their classes due to events can catch up with their lessons by taking help of the Departmental teachers as well as by attending remedial coaching classes organized by the UGC Sonsored Merged scheme

Flexibility in examination

O The students are evaluated on a regular basis by means of Unit Tests, Mid-Term Tests, Test Examinations. Hence a student who fails to appear in any of the tests due to participation in co-curricular activities can avail themselves of the chance to make up his grade in another test.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials.




- College provides free sports uniform, sports kits, lunch, and travel expenses to participants.

The Entry in Services programme was envisaged to provide quality education to the students who aspire to get entry in Government Services through competitive examinations. It started with differently designed courses to get examinations conducted by the Public Service Commission & the Staff Selection Committee. West Bengal Civil Services Examination (Preliminary) was the focus of all such examinations and was the most keenly sought after courses of all. The intake of students in the initial years is enumerated below:

The courses for the academic year of 2014–15 have been rescheduled in the month of October – November due to the WBSU Examinations.



The students are selected through a selection process based both on marks secured by the students in their 3 year B.A. examination and viva-voce.

Pushpita Ranjan Bhattacharya, Principal, Bijoygarh Jyotish Roy College had inaugurated the programme in July 2011.

In tune with the vision of the UGC, the courses were meant to cater primarily to the students of the socially and economically deprived classes of society. Most of the students belonged to the scheduled castes, tribes and the minority community, though we also tried hard to accommodate the students of the general community as well as those who have shown an impressive performance in the interview during the selection process. Students so far have been able to crack WBCS (Prelims), SBI (Clerkship) Exam and the West Bengal Police Recruitment Service Examinations.

We are in continual search of renovating our programmes in tune with the changing factors of recruitment examinations and consequently changing needs of the students. We have brought in our faculty professionals of proven competence from administrative service, such as Sri Sukanta Saha WBCS Executive, who have motivated the students immensely to similarly pursue their goals and achieve success in life. We have also purchased books, journals and daily newspapers for their betterment and books are regularly being lent to the students. The staff and the faculty of our College remain committed to the UGC led programmes, which is slowly ushering in new strides in social education.

At the time of admissions enlisted students are offered Academic Counselling by the subject teachers.

Apart from this, the students can freely approach any teacher for guidance and support. Owing to cordial relationship among the students and teachers, the students can freely consult any teacher for guidance related to personal matters. Parent-teacher meetings are arranged from time to time to enable teachers to know the family conditions of the student and offer counselling to both students and their parents if needed.

Career Counselling and Soft Skill Development Cell maintains regualar contact with Corporate houses.

The College had set up a Vishakha Cell in April 2013. But it was dissolved following the passing of the Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal Act, 2013 by the Union Parliament. Under the guidelines of this new Act an **Internal Complaints Committee** has been constituted in the College in January, 2014. Two senior teachers, Dr. Madhumita Chakraborty (Sarkar) and Dr. Anjana Ghosh are Joint Convenors of this committee. The members of the cell sit from time to time to discuss issues related to the protection of women in the working place and also distribute the guidelines of the cell to female teachers and non-teaching staff of the College. The committee has recently screened the film '*Bhawander*' on 24.07.2015 to create awareness about gender equality in the working place.

The College authority, teachers and students together strive to maintain a healthy atmosphere where each and every one is treated with respect. We are proud to state that there has been no case of sexual harassment on the campus so far.



5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- Special support is provided to the weak students through the Remedial Coaching Cell an intrinsic part of the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme, first introduced in College in 2011.
- The cell caters to the academic requirements of the Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe and economically backward students free of cost.
- Students who lack the proper atmosphere of study at home or are weak in studies have high chances of not passing the University examinations. Again the students who are compelled to take up jobs to meet the financial needs of their family and are likely drop outs identify their remedial coaching needs in consultation with the Departmental teachers.
- The Co-ordinator arranges for classes after or before normal College hours and also on Sundays and other holidays in the College premises.
 Classes are taken by both in-house and outside College teachers.

5.3.3 How does the College seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

- The out-going 3rd year Honours and General students fill in detailed feedback forms on the nature of classes, syllabus, examinatons, College infrastructure etc.
- Feedback is also sought from the Alumni Association
- Issues related to academic matters are discussed and policies are formed by the Academic Subcommittee at different meetings. Necessary steps are taken by the Admission Committee, Library Committee,



Examination Subcommittee in keeping with the needs and demands of the students as far as feasible.

- Students' feedback on co-curricular and cultural activities is taken into account by other related committees like the **Library Committee**, **Cultural Sub Committee** etc. formed by the Teachers' Council in consultation with the Principal.
- Policies formulated by the Governing Body of the College regarding improving the performance and quality of the Institution are duly implemented by the Principal.
- 5.3.4 How does the College involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, College magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.
 - The College finances the Annual Journal, the students' magazine, 'Dishari' published by the Students' Council, proceedings of seminars/workshops held in the College as well as the journals, wall magazines brought out by the students of the Departments. The main objective here is to stimulate young minds and enrich their knowledge in different fields.
 - The Principal, senior teachers and the faculty of each Department personally encourage the students to contribute to the same so that they can apply the knowledge they have acquired in a creative manner. This ensures all-round development of their personality and instils confidence in them.
- 5.3.5 Does the College have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.
 - ➤ The College has a **Students' Union**
 - Selection: Members of class representative for all classes are elected by the general students within 31 January for each academic year. Elected members from Students' Council are chosen as the Class Representatives.
 - ➤ Constitution: The Union Council is formed as per the constitution approved by the Governing Body of the College. The process of students' election, declaration of the result, collection of fund and all other related matters are included in our constitution.
 - Funding: The amount of money collected from the students as students' union fee constitutes the main source of finance of the students' activities. In case of any deficit or additional expenses student activities are further financed from the General Fund of the College approved by the Finance Committee and Governing Body.



Activities: The main objective of the activities of the Students' Council is to promote brotherhood and fellow feeling among the students.

The Students' Union is the link between the administration and the students.

The students celebrate Rabindra Jayanti, Baishey Srabon, Saraswati Puja, and organize Freshers' Welcome. Other activities include organization of dance and singing competitions, debate and quiz competitions, sports, blood donation camps, health check ups.

The students maintain a book bank for poor students.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The Governing Body of the College and all committees related to different academic bodies like the Academic Sub-Committee, Admission Committee etc. have students representatives who express the view, opinions and grievances of the students.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

The teachers and current students of the various Departments in the Arts, Science and Commerce streams maintain direct contact with the ex-students through social networking sites like Facebook, what's app.

The Alumni are invited to College functions like the Golden Jubilee celebrations (2013-2014) and are encouraged to share their experiences for the development of the Institution. In a programme, entitled, "Down the Memory Lane" the retired teachers and non-teaching staff of the College were felicitated and they narrated their personal experiences on an open platform, in the Opening Ceremony of our Golden Jubilee Celebrations. They also contribute to the College through their publications in our College Souvenir and in Departmental journals.

Any other relevant information regarding Student Support and Progression which the College would like to include

- ✓ Students are taught to contribute to the society and take care of their environment through NSS activities like spreading the awareness through procession in the locality during the Golden Jubilee celebration of the College (*Prabhat Pheri*), tree plantation, blood donation camp, thalassemia screening, fire-fighting strategies, cleaning of hostel building, health checkup camps, youth talent contest and so on.
- ✓ In order to cater to the special requirements of female students seminars are held and programmes related to womens' issues are highlighted.



- ✓ In keeping with the motto 'health is wealth' the College has undertaken different health welfare schemes. The College boasts of a state of the art gym for male and female students and a huge playground.
- ✓ Online admission system has been introduced by the College to ensure transparency in the admission system.
- ✓ The Institution has a Central Library as well as Departmental libraries where books are readily available to the students.
- ✓ There has been a persistent increase in the number of students in the Arts and Science streams. The College also has a consistently good academic result with the percentage of failures and drop outs declining. Students in many Departments have secured first class marks and there are also a few rank holders in the University.
- ✓ The College is easily accessible to the students by train, bus and autorickshaw.
- ✓ As it is important to encourage bright students, many of whom are first generation learners, awards and cash prizes are handed over to them by dignitaries at special award functions.



- ✓ Regular students, with highest percentage of attendace from Arts, Science and Commerce streams are duly awarded to arrest the trend of dropping out and class bunking among the students.
- ✓ The Institution organizes debates, extempore speech and other programmes to promote public speaking and build up confidence in the students so that they can express their opinions without fear of failure or ridicule.
- ✓ The College understands that **value education** is an intrinsic part of the learning process and the principles of honesty, punctuality, self-discipline, righteousness are instilled by the Principal and teachers in the students.
- ✓ The College has plans for designing a special 'earn and learn' scheme to discourage drop outs and develop soft skills and entrepreneurial skills



among the students so that they can start earning immediately after leaving their alma mater.

Above all, the Institution strives to create and maintain a proper atmosphere for the all-round development of the personality of its students, to ensure equal opportunity to each of its students irrespective of financial status, caste, creed or gender, so that students who do not belong to the creamy layer of the society can hold their own in life and leave College as free thinking, responsible citizens of the country, no less equipped than their more privileged counterparts.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The vision of the College is enshrined in our emblem which upholds the values of 'Knowledge', 'Perseverance' and 'Empowerment'. We intend to impart knowledge, develop competence, inculcate human values and generate social and environmental awareness. Our motto is to combine Higher Education with the new and emerging trends of employability so as to build our students into premier citizens of the country.

The mission of the College is to make education **affordable**, utilitarian, value-oriented, participatory and **enjoyable**. Since our College caters to students who mostly come from low socio-economic background and are **first generation learners**, our prime focus is on the personality development of each student. Our teaching methods include **capacity building programmes** like seminars, workshops, special lectures, projects, field works, etc.

Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith ensures that the vision and mission of the Institution are in tune with the Higher Education policies of the State by introducing **vocational** education and skill development programmes for the underprivileged section of the society.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Management, Principal and faculty work in conjunction to formulate and implement its **quality policy** and plans for assurance and sustenance of quality in Higher Education. The Principal, the academic and administrative Head of the Institution, is the Secretary of the **Governing Body** and proposes strategies for **academic growth** within the purview of the University and Government regulations.

The teachers, too, participate actively in policy making and application through the **four representatives** in the Governing Body. Important **committees** formed by the Governing Body like the Academic Subcommittee, the Finance Subcommittee and the Building Subcommittee play significant roles in policy making. The Head of the Institution communicates the curriculum and teaching-learning based policy decisions to the faculties primarily in the meetings of the **IQAC**, the Academic Subcommittee or in other committees, like Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Seminar Committee, etc.

The Principal bears the ultimate responsibility for the smooth running of the College. The role of the Principal of the College is **multi-dimensional**. He prepares the agenda for Governing Body meetings. He places before the body,



academic and administrative matters requiring the body's approval and he is responsible for executing its decisions and maintains all sorts of **correspondence** with the Governing Body.

The College has constituted different **committees** with **teachers**, **student representative** and members of the **non-teaching staff**, which play an important role in the execution and implementation of policies framed by the Governing Body.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

➤ The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission

Inspired by the Institutional mission, the Principal of the College maintains an effective liaison with the Governing Body in formulating the policy statements and action plans. The Institution is guided not only by the G.O.s issued by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal, but also by the Statute of the parent University. The proposals on policy matters that are raised by the Principal in the Governing Body and following the G.O. and the Statute actions and plans are chalked out.

> Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

The action plans are both chalked out and approved in the Governing Body and the Principal then takes proper measures of execution. The **IQAC** and various **subcommittees** and cells of the College undertake the responsibility of executing the action plans that leads to the welfare of the College.

Interaction with stake holders

Interaction with stakeholders is a **continuous** process which involves dynamic exchanges between the guardians and the teachers at the Departmental level. The Principal also mediates at such meetings as and when necessary. Keeping



the **parents** updated about their wards' progress is an essential component of the teaching learning process and this is taken care of at such meetings.

The Principal and **faculty** members regularly interact with the **students** who are the most important stakeholders. The **IQAC** seeks the feedback of both guardians and students and takes necessary steps to address their concerns. Interaction with the **Alumni** Association is also a vital part of including the views and suggestions of the past pupils in the running of the College.

> Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stake holders

Need analysis is enabled by **mutual** interaction between various stakeholders. The **feedback** forms are filled in by the outgoing 3rd year students, the guardians and the Alumni under the supervision of the IQAC and help the Institution in assessing the needs of the stakeholders. The Principal intervenes at every level of such interaction between stakeholders whenever necessary.

> Reinforcing the culture of excellence

Participatory leadership is ensured at every level to promote the culture of excellence. A fair representation of all faculties – Humanities, Science and Commerce is kept in mind while constituting committees for various aspects of College functioning.

The Academic Audit Committee has 2 members from each stream. The faculty keeps itself abreast of **recent** trends in teaching, learning and evaluation and their specialized area of interest through various Career Advancement Courses, like Orientation, Refresher and other short term training programmes, thereby reinforcing a culture of excellence.

Training programmes / Orientation meetings are also organized periodically for the non teaching staff and the improvements are monitored. Students are encouraged by declaration of **prizes** for meritorious and able prospects.

> Champion organizational change

The Principal **invites proposals** for new programmes. Changes in the existing rules and regulations of the College are brought about after a thorough discussion with the **IQAC** and other committees, and then proposals are made on the basis of such discussions. These proposals are placed before the **Governing Body** for another round of suggestions and discussions. Thereafter, policies are made to adopt the required changes.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The College has a clear and well defined system to monitor the effective implementation of the policies made in the Governing Body. The College ensures that the desired objectives are being achieved through the IQAC. Various



committees such as the Academic subcommittee, Examination committee, Centre committee, Routine committee, Admission committee etc. are formed in the meeting of the **Teachers' Council** under the chairmanship of the Principal to facilitate efficient and smooth functioning of the College.

The Convenors and the members of the various **committees** are assigned their specific duties in the meeting of the Teachers' Council. The guidelines defining the roles and responsibilities of the committees are communicated to the members. The committees carry out their respective functions efficiently.

Feedbacks on various aspects of the functioning of the College are obtained from students, parents, alumni to evaluate the efficacy of policy decisions.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The **President** and management at the highest level is in **constant** touch with the Head of the Institution and gives **enlightened** leadership to the Principal for the smooth functioning of the College. The President of our College, Smt. Chandrima Bhattacharya, MLA and Hon'ble MOS, Govt of West Bengal and Ld. Advocate of Calcutta High Court takes **personal interest** in the result of the students and suggests measures to improve them.

The **strength** of academic leadership of our **Governing Body** may be perceived by its rich **composition**. Apart from our Principal, four Teacher representatives, two non teaching representatives and one student representative, we have in our Governing Body one Ld. Advocate from Calcutta High Court and one Senior Professor as the Government nominees and one Principal and two Assistant Professors as the University nominees. The members of the Governing Body meet **frequently** to discuss the issues pertaining to College development, administration, appointments and infrastructural needs and student discipline.

The role and responsibilities of the staff are communicated to them for effective functioning of the College. Meetings with the **faculty** are held as and when necessary in the interest of the institution. The members of the Governing Body are easily **accessible** for any guidance required for the improvement of the College.

The Teachers' Council Secretary (TCS) is the representative of the teaching faculty. The TCS prepares the list of committees and cells in direct consultation with the Principal. The IQAC Coordinator is responsible for monitoring and advising for quality enhancement and sustenance of the Institution. He works in coordination with the Principal and the TCS. The Heads of different departments look into the smooth functioning of their respective departments. The other faculty members are all part of various committees and work for the betterment of the Institution.

6.1. 6 How does the College groom leadership at various levels?



The **supportive** Governing Body encourages the involvement of the staffs in the development of the College. The faculties are involved in the developmental activities as member of no less than **20** committees. These committees are formed with a **judicious mix** of junior teachers and senior teachers so that the younger members of the faculty may imbibe the ethos and work culture of the College and get groomed for leadership.

The blending is made vibrant by including representatives from the staff and the students. The members with **potential** are entrusted with important responsibilities. Such an arrangement is conducive to institutional harmony and effective growth of the College.

6.1.7 How does the College delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

- The Principal with the support of the Head of the Departments participate in decision making which creates a democratic atmosphere.
- **Periodical** meetings of different Departments are held to improve the quality of its educational provision.
- **Conveners** of various committees plan and monitor projects undertaken to achieve the targets in the stipulated time.
- Administrative powers and responsibilities are delegated to the teachers. The Principal allows the faculty members to take initiatives on various issues.
- Autonomy in conducting class tests, tutorials, maintenance of Departmental libraries (Lending books to the students) are maintained.
- > Special lecture programmes are funded by the Institution, however, the autonomy enjoyed by the department lies in choosing the resource person, topic, mode of expenditure, etc.
- Academic calendar is **independently** designed and formulated by the Department.
- Decentralised governance is ensured in the office by extending operational autonomy to the non teaching staff through the active leadership of the Head Clerk, clerks and the senior members of the staff.
- Union Council of Students is also delegated enough autonomy within their constitutional obligations.

6.1.8 Does the College promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.



Yes, the College promotes a culture of participative management as all **stakeholders** are involved in the decision making process. There exists an **active involvement** of the teachers in the functioning of the College which leads to transparency and increases efficiency. The Principal takes decision in a **fair** manner after having consulted the Governing Body, IQAC, Teachers' Council and any other stakeholders involved.

Teachers play a significant role in implementing the decisions of the Principal. Cooperation of the **Students' Council** is sought wherever necessary. The planning and decision making in financial matters rests with the Financial Committee, where the advices of the **Bursar** play significant role. Appropriate financial allocations on priority basis are made for various schemes, related to the growth and welfare of the College. **Teamwork** culture thus created develops an environment for **institutional loyalty** and the willingness to walk together an extra mile.

6.2 <u>Strategy Development and Deployment.</u>

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The policy of the Institution as encapsulated in its **mission** is to empower our students with **holistic** education thereby creating individuals who would be able to make their position in the society. This policy is developed by the **collective** efforts of all the stakeholders. It is driven by the **enthusiasm** and **hard work** of all concerned. It is reviewed through the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) which records the quality enhancement and sustenance measures for every year.

The Principal ensures that the mission of the College is inculcated in the minds of all the members of the Institute and measures are taken to implement it. The IQAC prepares perspective plans and policies based on the quality policy and activities proposed by various departments for the calendar year. This action plan is submitted to the management for approval and implementation. The management monitors and reviews the plans/projects implemented by holding formal and informal dialogues with the staff from time to time.

For the achievement of **all-round** academic development, teachers are encouraged to organize as well as participate in seminars, conferences, workshops and Refresher and Orientation courses and keep their knowledge and skills **up-to-date** necessary for the proper functioning of the institute. The College has provided **separate** Departmental rooms to each department as per availability and also provided necessary equipments with the **latest** communication technology and gadgets to ensure quality enhancement. In order to encourage organization of various academic programmes such as seminars, special lectures the College has endeavoured to construct an **auditorium**.



6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The College is propelled by a **visionary** management which has well-defined goals and perspective plans for developmental work. The perspective plan is drawn on the basis of short term and long term goals in different aspects of the functioning of the institute such as teaching and learning, research and development, community engagement, human resource planning, and industry interaction.

New Honours courses and **PG** course in Bengali have been started and are running successfully. **E-classrooms** have also been set up. The IQAC intimates the teachers about various **research** projects. To serve community welfare, the **NSS** Unit of our College is taking up new projects regularly. Building plan for our new **Fatullapur campus** is on its way and the Governing Body has already planned introducing certain **professional courses** in this campus.


6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The Principal is the Head of the Institution who takes all the **major** decisions in consultation with the **IQAC** Coordinator and the **Secretary** of the Teachers' Council. The Teachers' Council regulates various academic issues and helps in the administrative activities of the College through different **committees** and subcommittees like Admission, Examination, Result, Routine, Seminar, Library, Journal, Cultural, Games, Green Campus, Prospectus, Grievance Redressal, Anti-Ragging, Internal Complaint, Women's Cell and RTI Cell to mention a few.

All these committees comprising of **Joint Convenors** and members from faculty, staff and students perform their respective duties. Academic decisions concerning the Departments are taken by the **Heads** of the respective Departments jointly with their faculty members. Administrative measures in the office are implemented through the coordinated efforts of the **Head Clerk**, **Accountant**, **Cashier** and other members of the non teaching staff.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

- Teaching & Learning
- Research & Development
- Community engagement
- Human resource management
- Industry interaction
- Teaching & Learning

The detailed description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution are as follows:

• Teaching & Learning

At the beginning of every academic session the routine committee prepares a master routine for all the Departments of the College and ensures to schedule both Honours and General subject classes as per the norms stipulated by the University Grants Commission. Individual Departments then prepare Departmental routines following the master routine and submit it to the Routine Committee for the approval of the Principal. The Departments strictly follow the approved routine schedule.

Each **Head** of the Department in his/her turn interacts with the other teachers of the Department to plan the **modules**, laboratory classes, syllabus distribution. Academic performance of the students in the College and University examinations is analysed in the Departmental meetings. The **weak** points of students are identified and **remedial** measures are suggested. The teachers also try to find out ways for helping out the slow learners and encouraging the advanced learners.



Furthermore, each department keeps a **record** of the syllabus covered and progress reports are submitted to the IQAC. The students are **allowed** to see their evaluated scripts on a convenient date. By this procedure **transparency** in the examination and evaluation system is maintained.

Conferences, seminars, workshops and special lectures are organized round the year by the Departments and the **Seminar Subcommittee** in order to enrich the curriculum.

A compulsory Computer Training Course in collaboration with WEBEL, NSS activities, Outreach and Extension Programmes and Value education provide a holistic education to the students.

Research & Development

Research activities are encouraged in the Institute **both** among the teachers and the students. An **Expert Committee** has been formed to encourage the teachers to undertake Minor Research Projects and other projects. The teachers are encouraged to attend seminars and symposia, workshops throughout India and **abroad** and participate in Orientation and **Refresher** Courses conducted by the Academic Staff College.

The students of **postgraduate** Department of Bengali prepare research papers and dissertations as part of their syllabus.

• Community engagement

All students of the College are encouraged to participate in the activities of the NSS and also to act on their own initiative in order to **bridge** the gulf between the privileged and under-privileged members of the community.

Students of the College work with NGOs, like "Pratham" and CINI for the promotion of education among economically under-privileged students in schools. The NSS Programme Officers have been awarded twice for activities. Community programmes have been conducted by the Womens' Cell in the neighbourhood. (Please see Criterion III (3.6.4) for more details).

• Human resource management

The teaching faculty works in various committees and sub committees and participates in the cultural activities of the College. They are also engaged in research and publication. The College encourages them to follow their academic and cultural interests. The non-teaching staff is involved in the smooth functioning of the official activities. The students of the College participate in community work under the NSS unit of the College. The Students' Union organizes Freshers' Welcome and Cultural Programmes and thereby they pursue effortlessly their multifaceted interests along with academics.

• Industry interaction

The Career Counselling Cell, under the UGC sponsored Merged Scheme, organizes career awareness programmes by inviting personnel from the industry to



hold employment related **workshops** and campus interviews. In the academic session 2012-13 a **campus interview** was conducted by the **Future Group** (Hospitality & Retail Sector) in collaboration with **HPCL** and **CII** and job was offered to **40** students of the College.

The students of ASPV (Advertising & Sales Promotion - Vocational) are also given industrial exposure as part of their training in various companies.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The management and Head of the Institution are always in **interactive** mode with each other. The Head of the Institution gets the **feedback** from various stakeholders, like teachers, students, parents, alumni with regard to the teaching quality, curriculum, extra-curricular activities and infrastructural requirements and communicates it to the members of the Governing Body.

The Head of the Institution ensures **collection** of information through the following:

- Formal feedback from the **outgoing** 3rd year students of each Department.
- Reports from various Committees and Subcommittees through the IQAC
- Feedback from the Departments on Parents-Teachers meetings
- Feedback from the Alumni

Important informations are uploaded in the **website** of the College. Salient activities are also elaborated by the Principal in the **meetings** of the Governing Body and in the **public meets** on several occasions.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management encourages and supports involvement of the staff for improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes by having **staff representatives** in the Governing Body as well as in different committees of the College and thereby motivating them to play an **important** role in planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of institutional functioning.

Recently they are taking a **strong** initiative for organising a programme on photo exhibition and free screening of documentary films in collaboration with the Dept of Journalism & Mass Communication and the Cultural committee of our College. The Employees' **Welfare** Committee of the College looks into the problems of **individual** employee and necessary measures are taken to solve the problems.

Status of Implementation: SSR preparation started.

Status of Implementation: LLB 5-year course (after Higher Secondary),
LLB 3-year course (after graduation), and other professional courses under
B.Voc, like Diploma in Retail Marketing, Diploma in Pathology,
Physiotherapy, Travel and Tourism, 3 year Degree course in Travel and
Tourism Management, have been applied for and would commence in our new campus at Fatullapur.

• A Selection Committee be formed with the following esteemed members of our Governing Body to fill up the posts of one Accountant and one clerk (LD) as per the Memo No. 727-Edn(CS)/4E-17/06 dated 3rd September,2014 as issued by the Deputy Secretary, Higher Education Dept. Status of Implementation: NTS appointed.

Status of Implementation: Seven teachers have been promoted following Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

• Resolved that the **mutilated** books that are of no utility in the Library be disposed of at the earliest as scrap materials and Principal be directed to take necessary measures in this regard.

Status of Implementation: Books have been weeded out.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Our institution enjoys certain autonomy in terms of syllabus framing, etc. so far as the **PG course** in Bengali is concerned. All other UG courses are run by the norms fixed by the affiliating University.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution wants to provide the best facilities and quality education to the students and takes keen interest in fulfilling the needs of the stakeholders. If any problem arises related to the interest of the students, it is first addressed at the Departmental level by the **Head**.

The College also maintains a **Grievance Redressal cell** for the stakeholders. Based on the nature of grievances, the grievances are properly attended, analyzed and appropriate measures are settled. The final decision is taken by the Principal in consultation with the concerned wing. As per the Government guidelines we have also set up an **Internal Complaint Committee**. During the last couple of years we did not receive any grave complaint from any section of our Institution.

The faculty members maintain a very **cordial** relationship with the parents of the students. The suggestions of the parents are recorded and sincere effort is made to address the issues. The parents are also encouraged to meet the Principal with problems related to their wards and seek prompt redressal. A Students' **Feedback form** and an Alumni Feedback form are issued and subsequently analyzed by the IQAC to understand the nature of the grievances of the students for promoting better stakeholder relationship.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

We received a notice from the District Court (Case No. TS -386/2015) on 17 March 2015 stating that the widow of the grandson of one gentleman (from whom the College had purchased 100 cottahs of land in 1964) has claimed possession




over some segment (10 cottahs) of the land, which is a part of our playground for over 50 years. To the opinion of our advocate, the case is baseless and bears no merit. However, being a case of Civil Court it would require some hearing by the Ld. Judge and thus, we would have to handle the paraphernalia for some time.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Feedbacks are collected at the end of **each** academic year and analyzed by the **IQAC**. A questionnaire is used to get feedback from the **outgoing** students. That questionnaire is based on learning process, infrastructure and student support system of the College. This process has resulted in changes and betterment in curricular aspects, infrastructural facilities and student support services. The following is the **report** of the Students' Feedback in the session 2014-15:

- i. About 80% of the students feel satisfied and ranked the overall College environment as "Very good and good".
- ii. The percentage of satisfaction is more than 85% in case of academic environment.
- iii. In Science subjects, about 70% students expressed their views as "Very good and good" with regard to the timelines of practical classes and laboratory facilities.
- iv. Majority of the students expressed their views as "Very good and good" for cooperation received from the Students' Union specifically in terms of financial aid and encouragement for joining extension programmes.
- v. Students, through their feedbacks, have voiced their requirement for better canteen and toilet facilities, which has already been **renovated** entirely.





6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The institution ensures the professional development of its teaching staff by

- Encouraging faculty members to participate, act as **chairpersons**/resource persons in National and International Seminars and Conferences.
- Sanctioning Duty Leave to teachers for attending Orientation Course, Refresher Course and other short-term courses or workshops organized by the Academic Staff Colleges of various Universities for the enrichment of the faculty.
- Motivating teachers to complete their PhDs by availing leave under Faculty Improvement Programme
- Inspiring faculties to take up Research Projects and increase research publications.
- Providing **trainings** to faculties, like handling e-classrooms or using projectors etc.

To meet the arising need of the day, the Non teaching staffs are given **Computer training** for preparation of salary bill, keeping accounts, compiling students' data and various other functions of the office. Such training is usually offered within the College by **WEBEL**.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

- The Institution encourages **organization** of international and national seminars, workshops, conferences and special lecture programmes for the enlightenment of the faculty and the students.
- **Improved** Library facility with **online access** to e-books and e-journals helps the faculty to pursue his/her area of research.
- The Expert Committee motivates the faculty to involve themselves in active research by giving them information related to the availability of projects and funds.
- The Institution sanctions **duty leave** to the faculty for attending Seminars, Refresher Course, Orientation Course and other short-term courses.
- The faculty is motivated to act as resource persons, chairpersons in seminars/conferences to keep them **updated** about the recent advancement in their respective fields.



6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- The students' **feedback** form, based on NAAC recommendations to help the institutions assess the teachers' performance, is seriously carried out under the supervision of the IQAC.
- The annual **self appraisal** of the teacher is conducted by issuing a self assessment appraisal proforma by the Academic Audit Committee, which helps the faculty in filling the form and forwarding it to the IQAC.
- The IQAC evaluates the self appraisal report of the teachers and send it to the Principal
- The Principal closely monitors the participation of the teachers in both academic and administrative spheres of the College. Based on this monitoring the Principal has to enclose a **report** on the performance of the faculty with other documents required for the teacher's promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

Duly filled in performance appraisal report is submitted to the Academic Audit Committee, which then forwards it to the IQAC, which again is handed over to the Principal for further review and assessment. The performance appraisal is finally sent to the DPI Office when the teacher is applying for his/her promotion under CAS.

At the time of **confirmation** of service due weightage is given to the performance appraisal report by the Governing Body.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The institution is very much concerned about the welfare of its staffs and faculty members. The initiatives taken by the institution are:

- Motivating the teachers to avail 2+1 year **study leave** with full salary to pursue PhD Degree under the UGC Faculty Improvement Programme. Since 2004, 7 teachers have availed this leave.
- Granting Special Study Leave to Teachers. In the last 4 years, Dr. Anjana Ghosh and Dr. Debasish Mallick were granted 6 weeks Study Leave by the Governing Body.



- 12 teachers have been given **Duty leave** for attending Refresher Course and 5 teachers for attending Orientation Course and 8 teachers for attending short term courses since 2010-11.
- Facility of Group Insurance for substantive teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The Hariprasad Das Memorial Fund is utilised for giving concession in tuition fees to the deserving **children** of non teaching staff of the College.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Since our Institution is a Government Aided College it **cannot** attract or recruit an eminent faculty on its own. However the institute has taken a number of measures for the development and enrichment of its own faculty:

- The **Postgraduate** Department of Bengali can **invite** senior retired academicians to act as Guest teachers and deliver special lectures, so that the students may benefit from their area of specialization.
 - The Department has invited Dr. Ashok Kumar Mishra, Retired Associate Professor, Bhairab Ganguly College and Dr. Radheshyam Saha, Retired Associate Professor, Sri Chaitanya College, Habra, who excel in the areas of Modern Bengali Literature. Dr. Dipankar Mallik, Assistant Professor, Vivekananda Vidyamandir, Belur and Dr. Mohini Mohan Sardar, Professor and Head, Dept.of Bengali, West Bengal State University enlighten the students on the study of Middle Ages in Bengali Literature.
- Under the UGC Merged Scheme, Entry in Services Cell and Career Counseling Cell invite eminent teachers and academicians whose expertise helps the students in various ways.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The Financial Subcommittee, composed of the Governing Body members and other employees of the College formulates financial policies and then monitors its implementation. The **Finance Subcommittee** is aided in its mode of operation by recommendations from the Building Committee, P.F. Committee and the Bursar, thus regulating the entire Accounts Department.

The Building Committee identifies the capital and expenditure for expansion and repairing and hence recommends funds on budgetary basis. There is an Internal Audit Committee to monitor day to day financial matters and in each year the DPI, Government of West Bengal, appoints External Auditor to look after the accounts of our Institution. The Principal with the help of the Bursar issues tenders and receives quotation as per the prevailing Government rules and all



purchases are made on **lowest** quotation basis, **credibility** of supplier and **quality** of goods. The **Bursar** monitors regular verification of stock.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal audit work is done by the **Bursar**, with the help of the Finance Subcommittee as per the directives given by his Governing Body.

External audit is done by the external auditor appointed by the **D.P.I**, Government of West Bengal. Our audit report is **completely free** from any adverse remarks. No conditions or objections were imposed by the auditor last year. Only **suggestions** were incorporated. We have already completed the audit work for the financial year **2014-15** and it has been approved by the Governing Body and submitted to the DPI, Government of West Bengal, for necessary action.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

- a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?
- The College has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) established as per recommendation of UGC-NAAC. It was formed on 14.03.2005. The Cell comprises of the Principal, senior faculty members, external members and non-teaching staff, student representative as per the UGC-NAAC guidelines.
- The Cell monitors the teaching, research and various Departmental activities of each Department. Feedback regarding teaching, infrastructural facilities and other amenities of the College are collected from the students by this Cell.
- The IQAC keeps **vigilance** over the yearly progress of the Departments with regard to teaching-learning, result and attendance of the students.
- The Students'/Guardians/ Alumni **Feedback** is conducted under the supervision of this Cell.
- The IQAC extends assistance and help to teachers applying for their **promotion** under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).



- The Cell is responsible for regular submission of Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) to NAAC. The AQARs of the last four years has been uploaded.
- b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The following proposals of the IQAC have been approved and implemented:

- Online admission of the students from the session 2012-13
- Introduction of UGC sponsored merged scheme in 2010-11
- Expansion of curriculum by introducing new Honours courses in six Science subjects, like Computer Science, Physics, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology and Chemistry during 2008-2015
- Introduction of M.A. in Bengali in 2014-15
- Expansion of infrastructure: In the session 2014-15 the College has been granted 1.87 acre (112 Cottahs) of land in Fatullahpur, as Long Term Settlement (LTS) for 99 years by the Government of West Bengal, for building its second campus, where various professional and vocational courses will be introduced by keeping in mind the demands of the job market.
- As part of promoting research, **4 Teachers** have availed Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP) between 2006 and 2008 and **11 Teachers** have been granted Minor Research Project funded by the UGC between 2009 and 2014
- Organizing UGC sponsored International/ National Conference/ seminars :
 2 International Seminars and 2 National Conferences were organized:
 - ✓ On 6 and 7 March 2009 the departments of History and Journalism and Mass Communication organized a UGC sponsored International Conference entitled "Perspectives of the Press: 19th century to the Present"
 - ✓ On 11 and 12 December 2009 the department of Political Science organized a National Seminar on "Women in Panchayats and Urban Local Bodies in West Bengal" with financial assistance from the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal.
 - ✓ On 29 and 30 September 2013 the departments of Anthropology, Botany and Zoology organized a UGC sponsored National Conference on "Biodiversity: Interrelationship between Flora, Fauna and Human" in collaboration with the department of Anthropology, West Bengal State University.
 - ✓ On 7 December 2015 the Science Forum and the Humanities and Social Science Forum organized an International Seminar on "Environment,



Science and Society: Exploring New Horizons" in collaboration with the West Bengal State Council of Higher Education.

- Organizing Golden Jubilee Celebrations of the College through a year long programme and activity

- One of the most significant contributions of the external members of the present IQAC has been to assist the College in all possible ways of organizing successfully its Golden Jubilee (1964-2014), the grand celebration of which continued through a year long programme of 2013-14

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

Students are the primary stakeholders towards whom all efforts of the IQAC are targeted. Their **feedback** is treated with utmost seriousness and quality improvement measures are taken. The College Alumni Association actively participates in the College activities. Their expertise is sought in various matters, like curriculum, teaching-learning, community welfare, scope of employability, which contribute to the overall development of the Institution. The Alumni Feedback is conducted under the supervision of the IQAC.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The composition of the IQAC involves the **Bursar**, as an individual from administration, two senior female **HODs** and two senior male HODs and also one non-teaching member of the College. Besides, the IQAC also has in its composition two members of the Governing Body, one member of the **Alumni** Association and a **student** representative, who is the General Secretary of the Students' Union.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Our College has a dual provision of academic and administrative audit.

The Academic Audit comprises of the following activities:



- Regular vigilance of attendance of both students and teachers. According to
 the norms of the West Bengal State University, the students are supposed to
 maintain 75% of class attendance for appearing in the University
 Examinations. Leave records of the substantive teachers are diligently
 maintained by the Employees' Welfare Committee
- Student **performance** is judged through regular class tests, monthly tests, Mid-term Tests, Selection Tests and they are credited through merit.
- Students' Feedback form related to academics, administration, and environment are scrutinized from time to time under the supervision of the IQAC. Also, Guardians are included in this process of apprising the teachers and the institution through Guardian-Teachers Meet organized by each faculty once a year.
- The College Central Library is well stocked with books and journals as per the requirements of the students and teachers. From time to time audit of the Library books are carried out.
- Academic audit measures are followed by each faculty by conducting at least three Departmental meetings in an academic year

The Administrative Audit comprises of the following activities:

- **Internal** audit is done by the **Bursar** of the College in consultation with the finance committee.
- External audit is done by an external auditor, appointed by the DPI, Government of West Bengal. After the preparation of the audit report, the same is approved by the Governing Body and then finally sent to the DPI, Government of West Bengal for final action.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

• The Institution offers training to the teaching staff to enhance their efficacy and quality. Recently, the workshop on "Course and Prospects of GIS with QGIS" was organized by the OPSIS Pvt. Ltd. for the faculties of the Geography Department from 3 June 2015 to 7 July 2015.

- Computer training and training on how to conduct an ICT enabled classroom are also imparted to the teachers for upliftment of their teaching quality.
- The College often sends its teachers to various **training** institutes for acquiring greater skill and knowledge that would further help in the better functioning of the institution and their respective career advancement. Teachers are given **duty leave** to attend Orientation (a month long training course) and Refresher (21 day long subject based training) Courses organized by the different universities within and outside the State.
- Additionally, teachers are also sent to institutes for specialized training of shorter duration.
 - ✓ Dr. Niloy Kumar Saha, Associate Professor, Dept of Commerce, attended a training course on "Audit of Private Partnership" in the Regional Training Institute, Kolkata, from 06.02.12 to 09. 02.12.
 - ✓ A training course in **Research Methodology** in Social Science Research entitled, "Methods of Social Inquiry" under the aegis of WBSU and Indian Council of Social Science Research was held in Labour Welfare Office, Kolkata. **Four CWTTs** were sent to attend this training Smt. Sampa Bhattacharya, Smt. Upakatha De, Dr. Srimoyee Gupta and Smt. Nirupa Paul.
 - ✓ The non-teaching staff of the College is given computer training through **WEBEL** in order to help them run the office work with more efficiency.
- 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The **internal** academic audit of our institution is carried out mainly under the overall supervision of the **IQAC**, which operates through the **Academic Audit Committee**. However a **parallel** system of auditing is **externally** followed by the



West Bengal State University, which is the affiliating body of the College. The University subject expert/s along with the Nominee of the D.P.I., Government of West Bengal scrutinizes the academic performance of a teacher at the time of promotion under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

In a similar manner, at the time of introducing **new** Honours /PG course, the academic audit is carried out by external agencies, like the West Bengal State Council of Higher Education, and the West Bengal State University, the affiliating University.

Both academic and administrative audit are carried out by the D.P.I., Government of West Bengal through the Need Based **Performance Appraisal** Scheme.

The report of these academic audits, their recommendations and suggestions are carefully studied and analyzed by the IQAC.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities?

The mechanisms employed by the IQAC, which monitors internal quality assurance is **entirely** in keeping with the requirements and recommendations suggested by the external regulatory bodies, like the State Council of Higher Education, and the D.P.I., Government of West Bengal and West Bengal State University, the affiliating University. The IQAC closely **adheres to** the rules and regulations issued by the Department of Higher Education, which in turn become a part of the University Statute.

In keeping with the recommendations of the quality assurance agency NAAC, several measures have been adopted. Postgraduate course in Bengali has been introduced in order to enrich the curriculum. Increased use of ICT in classrooms and digitization of the Central Library have also been done. The College also has a Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, RTI Cell and Internal Complaints Committee under the directives of the West Bengal State University, in tune with the UGC regulations and the Government norms.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The continuous teaching-learning process of the College is closely monitored by the Academic Audit Committee under the overall supervision of the IQAC.

Structure of the Academic Audit Committee is as follows:

2 faculty members from each stream, Arts, Science and Commerce

Methodologies of Operation:

Academic Audit Committee operates on **two** levels: a) audit of the **student** performance b) audit of the **teacher** performance



- a) Audit of the student performance:
- The admission procedure of the students is carried out strictly conforming to the University guidelines. With the help of the Admission Subcommittee, Academic Audit Committee maintains a record of statistical figures, charting the rise and the fall in admission of each subject in every academic year. The reasons of such variability in the figures are then studied and forwarded to the IQAC for action
- The Academic Audit Committee closely monitors **student attendance** and their academic performance. Students failing to maintain 75% class attendance are required to **explain** their inability by producing letters from the parents or medical certificates, if the absence is due to some illness. Poor academic performances are immediately dealt with counseling, tutorial and remedial coaching.
- **b)** Audit of the teacher performance:
- Feedback forms are filled in by the students to extend their participation in judging the quality of the teaching-learning process. The entire process of receiving Students' Feedback is carried out under the monitoring of IQAC.
- Academic audit of a teacher has become more important with the introduction of CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) in which the concerned teacher's performance appraisal is a requirement to fulfil the requisite promotional criteria.

Outcome of Academic audit:

- Better assessment of the students' and teachers' performance
- Helping IQAC to take more **progressive** decisions related to the quality enhancement of students and teachers
- Interpersonal relationship between students and teachers is further improved.
- 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders? Any other relevant information regarding Governance Leadership and Management which the College would like to include.

There are several **platforms** through which quality assurance policies are disseminated to the stakeholders.

- ✓ Internally, the IQAC communicates its decisions to the faculties, non-teaching staff and students through various Subcommittees, like Academic Subcommittee, Admission Subcommittee, Centre Committee, Routine and Result Subcommittee, Women's Cell, NSS etc.
- ✓ External communication is made through Guardians-Teachers Meet, Alumni Association, Annual meet, website, banners, flex, advertisements on newspapers, TV channels and other social media.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The institute has not conducted an internal Green Audit System as yet, but several programmes to create a **green campus** have already been executed.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

In our attempt to make the campus eco-friendly, we are trying to make the campus clean and green by adopting the following measures:

- The students are sensitised to protect the environment. They are also motivated to use bio-degradable materials inside the campus.
- **Posters, placards** are displayed in the College campus to enhance positive attitude towards creating healthy environment.
- Fluorescent tube lights are being replaced by CFL bulbs.
- The NSS Unit of our College with the help of our Students' Union organizes poster competitions, display of models and science exhibitions involving all the students of nearby schools to create awareness about science and environment through these programmes. On 20 September 2014 "Young Talent Hunt" programme was organized and the focal topic for speech, essay writing, quiz and poster competition was Green Environment and Our Life.
- Our Building Committee has suggested introducing rain water harvesting in our second campus at Fatullapur.
- Decision has been made to install solar panels in the second campus at
 Fatullapur at the very outset to promote the use of unconventional source of
 energy on a large scale.
- We are planning to introduce **server database** for record keeping that will enable us to minimise the use of paper.
- Tree plantation drives are organized regularly by the NSS Unit by involving students with the help of the Forest Department, Government of West Bengal. An awareness programme on "Health and Environment: Social Awareness and Development" was organised by the NSS Unit and Green Campus Unit of the College in association with Students' Union and Alumni Association on 24 August 2015, where Dr. B.R. Satpati, Director of Public Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of West Bengal and Sri Nitai Kumar Saha, Divisional Forest Officer, Forest Department, 24 Paraganas (North) planted trees along with staff and students.
- Seminars, conferences, special lectures are organized by various departments to create environmental awareness:



- ✓ 2-day UGC sponsored National Conference on "Biodiversity: Interrelationship between Flora, Fauna and Human" was organized by the Departments of Botany, Zoology and Anthropology in collaboration with the Department of Anthropology, West Bengal State University on 29 and 30 September 2013.
- ✓ International Seminar on "Environment, Science and Society: Exploring New Horizons" by the Science Forum and Humanities and Social Science Forum of the College in collaboration with the West Bengal State Council of Higher Education on 7 December 2015.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

- Our introduction of on-line admission process in 2011-12 session is a pioneering attempt at the undergraduate College level in the district of 24 Parganas (North).
- The College has introduced the INFLIBNET in the Central Library so as to
 promote an easier access to the national and international journals for
 enhancing the research interests of the faculty and students.
- The College has **2** e-classrooms adjacent to the auditorium that promote ICT enabled teaching-learning process.
- Building physical and psychological strength of the students:
 - ✓ To encourage **self-defence in women**, the Career Counselling Cell in coordination with the Tallash Society arranged for a one-day workshop on 08.02. **2014**, to familiarize the girl students with the



- basic principles of self-defence by promoting their physical and mental strength.
- ✓ To reduce stress in students, a stress management workshop entitled, "Stress in Youth" was organised by the Department of Philosophy on 16.01.2015.
- Screening of Documentaries/ Short Films on various literary, socio-political
 and environmental issues is one of the useful means of complementing the
 syllabi with film-text, which is long being practiced by the Departments of
 Political Science, History, Sociology and English.
- Organizing Book Exhibition-cum-Sale Programme with the published books and journals, authored/edited by the past students and the present teachers of the Department of Bengali created a literary sensation in the College on 13 & 14 March 2015. This innovative practice of the Department encouraged the budding writers, whose roots are firmly attached to the College.
- The Library Committee organized a Book Exhibition-cum-Sale where Publishers and Distributors displayed books of different subjects on 10 and 11 December 2015 keeping in mind the myriad interest of the students. The published books of the faculties were also displayed in the Exhibition.

- The PG Department of Bengali organized a **Painting Exhibition** of their current students to commemorate the eminent painter Chintamoni Kar on 29 and 30 September 2015.
- The Students' Union maintains a Book Bank for poor and needy students.



7.2 BEST PRACTICES

7.2.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the College.

Best Practice - I

Title of the practice: Promotion of awareness on issues related to the welfare and empowerment of women

Goals:

- To generate awareness among the students on the various kinds of discrimination and violence faced by women in society, family and at workplace.
- To recognize the **strength** of women and their contribution to economy, politics, society.
- To make students, staff and the local inhabitants aware of the **health problems** encountered by women.

The Context:

Across the globe women continue to **suffer** from violence and discrimination. This is especially true for developing countries like India. Almost every day the newspapers carry reports of incidents like bride-burning, female infanticide, sexual violence, acid-attack etc.

The history of Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith is unfortunately scarred with one such incident where a **girl student** of the Geography Department had been a pathetic and helpless **victim** of a heinous murder in **2002**. The life of Jahanara Khatoon, a poverty stricken girl from the remote village of Deganga was terminated abruptly and **mercilessly** when she became a target of ruthless violence in her own home for denying the marriage proposal of a boy. The College deeply mourns the loss of Jahanara and all such innocent victims of violence and torture, whose lives have **withered** even **before blooming**.

As an Institution of learning and knowledge, we firmly believe that **women** are entitled to a **dignified** life that is free both from fear and oppression. The **voices of women** need to be heard and taken note of, not overlooked or ignored. As Malala Yousafzai, the Nobel Peace Prize winner of 2014 puts it: "I raise up my voice—not so I can shout, but so that those without a voice can be heard. We cannot succeed when half of us are held back."

Located on the fringes of the city and catering to students coming mostly from the rural areas with low socio-economic background, our College realizes that in order to stand for women's **empowerment**, the need to generate awareness among the



students is of prime importance. In our mission to uphold the dignity and power of women, we attempt to **enlighten**, first, our students, and then secondly, try to **reach** out to the community at large.

The Practice: The Departments and the various committees of the College, through numerous **round-the-year activities**, promote awareness and draw attention towards women's issues. Details are as follows:

Observing International Women's Day

- The Department of Political Science religiously observes the International Women's Day on 8 March every year to uphold the cause of women. In order to promote gender sensitization among the students, the Department celebrates this day with special lectures delivered by the teachers of the Department. Worth mentioning is the Department's release of the bi-lingual wall magazine *Prayas* (An Attempt) on the theme of missing girls in India.
- The Department of Journalism and Mass Communication also published their wall magazine, *Anupama* (The Unique Woman) on 8 March 2012 and celebrated the day by having it inaugurated by our Group D elderly female staff, Smt. Puspa Rani Singh, thus championing the cause of equality among women of all socio-economic classes.
- The Department of Bengali published a special issue of their wall magazine, *Sabuj Nakshatra* (Green Planet) celebrating the spirit of woman on 8 March 2015 under the exclusive theme, "*Je Naari Bichitro Beshe*" or "The Woman in Different Roles".

Special Lecture Programmes/Seminars/Workshops

 A National Seminar on "Women in Panchayats and Urban Local Bodies in West Bengal" was organized by the Department of Political Science with financial assistance from the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal on 11 and 12 December 2009 to assess the role of women belonging to the various strata of society in the administration and politics.

The major goal of this National Seminar was to examine and review both the success and the limitations of the women representatives at the local level, particularly in the background of the ongoing national debate on women's reservation in the State Assemblies and in the Union Parliament.

• The Department of Philosophy organized a special Lecture Programme, entitled, "Feminist Philosophy: Opening the Pandora's Box" on 2 September 2009, where Dr. Atreyee Mukherjee from the West Bengal State University enlightened the students on the ideas of liberal and radical feminism.



• A Workshop entitled, "Women's Health: Concerns and Remedies" was organized by the Women's Cell in association with the Seminar Subcommittee of the College on 10 May 2013 with a purpose to focus on both the physiological and psychological health issues of a woman.

Dr. Samita Pan, MBBS, MD, (Gynecologist) made us aware of the menopausal symptoms and manifestations that a woman should be able to identify and further resolve with medical help. Prof (Retd.) Hirendranath Gupta, Dept. of Applied Psychology, University of Calcutta, attempted to offer psychological counseling to the female teachers and the non-teaching staff of the College.

Female teachers from other Colleges also participated in this workshop. The aim of this workshop was to **prioritize** women and their often neglected health problems and thus encouraged the female participants to be conscious of their health and to generate the same consciousness in the society they inhabit.

• The Career Counseling Cell under the UGC Merged Scheme organized a one-day workshop on the "Self Defense of Women" in collaboration with TALLASH Society. Ms. Ayesha Sinha was the resource person for the workshop. The objectives of the workshop were: (a) to familiarize the girl students with the basic principles of self defence while promoting physical fitness and physical conditioning (b) to teach the students through real life experience simulations and (c) to provide physical self defence training along with mental training as well.

Exhibitions/Projects/Journals

One of the most successful **students' projects** on the empowerment of women is undertaken by the Department of Political Science of our College. Since 2010-'11. The Department has been engaged in a project entitled, "Women's Political Participation and Empowerment: A Worldview", that seeks to examine the various patterns of women's political participation, leading to women's political empowerment, in different parts of the world, through their wall magazine, *Prayas* (An Attempt).

The major goals of this project are: (a) to examine the nature and scope of the Women's **Suffrage** Movement in the West (b) to study women's empowerment against the background of traditional **patriarchal** societies and (c) to **compare** and contrast the diversity of women's empowerment in the developed and the developing countries.

Apart from enriching the students' curriculum, this project has largely enlightened the students about the position of women in global politics. Through their tireless supervision and guidance the teachers of the Department



attempt to familiarize the young students about the woman's prolonged struggle for **emancipation** and independence.

- The students of the Department of Sociology have also engaged themselves in several **project works** related to the Self Help groups and women empowerment, stress and **childlessness**, types of marriage and transformations and **challenges** related to it. These projects, many of which require field studies and collection of data, not only help our students to comprehend their syllabus better, but also add to the broadening of their perceptions about the socio-cultural position of women in India.
- The Closing Ceremony of the Golden Jubilee Celebrations of our College witnessed a grand **exhibition** entitled, "**Empowerment of Women**" on 4 and 5 March 2014, where all the Departments came forward with charts, posters and models that highlighted women, her role and her contribution in the society, from diverse perspectives.

The exhibition was **inaugurated** by Smt. Chandrima Bhattacharya, **President** of our Governing Body, who was formerly a member of the **Women's Commission** and presently a Minister of the State. One of the outstanding models displayed by the students of the Philosophy Department was "*Swayamsiddha*", an attempt to show the oppression of women in a patriarchal society and to condemn that **oppression** as illegitimate and unjust. The Philosophy Department also made poster presentations under the captions: "**Laws for Women Empowerment**" and "**Stop Violence on Women**". Noteworthy, too, were the charts prepared by the English Department, which focused on the **Women Noble laureates of Literature** and celebrated the significance of "*Kanyashree Prakalpa*", a financial aid given by the Govt. of West Bengal to promote education among young girls.

Film/Documentary Shows

• The Department of Political Science has screened a number of documentaries on women. On 7 December 2013 the documentary *Izzatnagari ki Asabhya Betiyaan*, directed by Nakul Singh Sawhmey (2012) was shown to the students, to create an orientation among them regarding the extra-judicial role played by the Khap Panchayats in North India, especially in Haryana.

This endeavour of the Political Science Department to use cinema as a means to generate awareness in students led to the screening of a few more documentaries, like *Saving Face*, directed by Sharmeen Obaid Chimoy and Danial Junge, that features **two Pakistani women** who were **acid attack** survivors and also shows their struggle for recovery with the help of a British-Pakistani plastic surgeon.

The documentary, *Child Marriage in Rajasthan* showed the problem of rampant child marriage in spite of the existing laws. *Iraq: The Women's*



Story depicted the devastating effects of American's war on the lives of Iraqi women and their children.

• It is not merely through screening, but also through making documentaries that our College upholds the cause of women. The Department of Journalism and Mass Communication has made several documentaries on the professions taken up by poor women as means of sustenance, exploring the various aspects of their working life and the barriers they overcome to balance family and work. Some of the recent documentaries made by the department are:

"Chalika" (on women van-drivers), "Tana Poren" (women weavers of Fulia belt) and "Kaam" (women embroidery designers of the Muslim community of Duttapukur).

These documentaries have further been screened for all the students and staff of the College.

Campaign:

At Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith, we do not stop merely with the enlightenment of our students, but our purpose of upholding the cause of women's empowerment is motivated by a more serious **didactic** purpose. We aim to spread consciousness not only within the four walls of the campus, but also generate awareness among the local inhabitants, the general mass who constitute the bulk of the society.

With this objective, a **campaign** entitled, "**Fight Breast Cancer: Do Not Fear It**" was organized by the Women's Cell on 27.02.2015. Along with the teachers, the **PG** Bengali students marched on the streets of Birati carrying posters and distributing pamphlets to generate awareness among local women regarding the symptoms and cure of breast cancer. Dr. Alekhya Bhattacharya and Smt. Upakatha De talked to women coming from a wide range of professions, from **entrepreneur to fish seller**, and explained them the need to be more aware of the disease.

Evidence of Success

The huge participation of the students in the seminars, workshops, campaigns bear testimony to their **overwhelming response**. In the "Self Defense for Women" workshop conducted by the Career Counseling Cell, more than **35** girl students voluntarily took part in the training. The enthusiastic response of the students, while conducting field study for making their projects and documentaries, shows how unconditionally they **support** the cause of women.

During the campaign "Fight Breast Cancer: Do not Feat It" the students not only marched through the streets of Birati carrying posters and distributing pamphlets, but also tried their best to inculcate health awareness among local women with a gusto. One of the most spontaneous responses of the students can often be seen in how the eyes of a few well up with tears when they watch the **atrocities** meted out to women in the films and documentaries screened for generating awareness.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

One of the major problems encountered was the **socio-cultural** background of the students. Most of our students come from extreme remote villages, whose family members are languishing in the **darkness** of poverty, illiteracy and superstition. The students hardly receive any cooperation from such families and that becomes a serious **deterrent** in their active involvement in the seminars, workshops or field studies. Often the faculties have to take up the responsibility of first **counseling** the family of the students and then involve the students in such awareness generating activities.

Sometimes it becomes difficult for the students, especially the 3rd years, to participate in such programmes, despite their willingness. The **vast syllabus** that



has to be completed within a short stipulated time frame and the examination schedules are responsible for this.

The fund required for organizing such activities is granted by the College authority. However, **huge financial resources** are required to organize these programmes on a bigger scale. We require more technical help and greater allocation of funds to make such activities more effective. The introduction of a **Women's Studies Forum/** Centre may further encourage the promotion of women's empowerment in our College.

Best Practice – 2

<u>Title</u> of the practice: Conservation of the Environment and setting up of Medicinal Plant Garden

Goals:

Our environment is valuable and it is time to be conscious about its status. It is the motto of our College to be a part of the environmental conservation through small initiatives that will contribute to the making of a green universe. Our objectives are as follows:

- Organizing seminars/conferences/special lectures to create **awareness** and make us more responsible towards environment
- Conservation of wild, ornamental, rare and endangered species
- Tree plantation projects to make our campus green
- Establishment of medicinal plant garden which is beneficial for generating responsiveness among students
- Popularising the values of medicinal plants among the students.

The Context:

Degrading biodiversity is one of the main problems we are facing worldwide. The **sustenance** of every species is dependent on the existence of other species. Thus, the consequence of disappearance of one is the threat on viability of the other. Preserving **biodiversity** is the key factor to attain sustainable development. Biodiversity is largely dependent on **interrelationship** between flora and fauna. To preserve biodiversity proper understanding of the interrelationships between flora and fauna is essential.

Further, serious **environmental issues** like global warming, excessive carbon emission etc are present concerns that are raising life threatening problems. Recognizing the seriousness of the environmental concerns, our College, on the eve of Golden Jubilee, took the oath of **preserving the environment** for future, as it is essential for maintaining the ecological equilibrium.



The Practice:

The Departments have come together and have taken a pledge to work towards the common good of **conserving the ecology**. Since the Golden Jubilee, all the disparate activities that were organized by the Departments for so long to protect the environment, have been given a fresh and new focus and were channelized to generate maximum awareness among the students. Some of the activities introduced are as follows:

Wall Magazine/ Poster Presentation/Models

- It dates back to the year 2008 when the Geography Department thought of building consciousness amongst the students and faculty members with regard to the environment. The Department started the wall magazine, "Man and Environment", which was inaugurated by the respected Principal of our College.
- On the eve of Golden Jubilee celebration of our College, the Botany Department started a wall magazine entitled "Greenscope". Invited articles from the Departmental students were published in this wall magazine after thorough editing by the faculty members of the department. The first issue of "Greenscope" was inaugurated by Prof. Kausik Gupta, Honourable Vice Chancellor, West Bengal State University, Barasat on 4 March 2013. Dr. Apurba Bandyopadhyay, our Principal, had also put his signature on this issue.
- The students of the Geography Department took **pledge** to conserve and increase awareness in this regard by making models in the Closing Ceremony of our Golden Jubilee Celebrations that highlighted on the natural and social **hazards** like incidents of Tsunami, Aila and Cloud Bursting incidents in Kedarnath. Their models received praises from the delegates and eminent resource persons, who visited the Exhibition on 4 March 2014.

Recently, the model that depicted the Kedarnath cloud burst event won 1st position at the District Level Model Competition, 2015. The students in the course of the display explained to the judges how human interference with nature in the name of development is disrupting environmental sustainability and subsequently threatening human lives.

• The students of the Zoology Department also presented in the Closing Ceremony of our Golden Jubilee Celebrations **posters and models** on issues of contemporary environmental concern such as "Carbon Footprint", "Waste Water Management", "Effects of Toxic Agents on Urination" etc. The students were made to work in a group of 5 under the guidance of the faculty members and explained their models and charts before the visitors.

Seminars/Conferences/Workshops:

• In the Golden Jubilee Year the Departments of Anthropology, Botany and Zoology organized a UGC sponsored National Conference on "Biodiversity: Interrelationship between Flora, Fauna and Human" in collaboration with The Department of Anthropology, WBSU on 29 and 30 September 2013. The whole conference was divided into four academic sessions: Floral diversity, Indigenous knowledge of Human, Faunal diversity and Sustainability and Healthy Ecosystem.

The conference attracted participants from **all over** the country. The keynote speaker was Prof. S.K.Barik from the North Eastern Hill University, **Shillong**. Among other eminent speakers we had Dr. M Prasad, National Bureau of Plant Genome Research, **New Delhi**, Prof. Mitasree Mitra, Dean, Pt. Ravisankar Shukla University, Raipur, **Chattisgarh**, Sri V.K.Yadav, Chief Conservator of Forest.

The total no. of participants was 225, which included students, teachers (both College and university), research scholars, non-teaching staffs and volunteers. 39 papers were orally presented and 18 posters were displayed in poster session. An abstract volume with 100 abstracts and post conference proceedings with 38 full papers, having the prestigious ISBN were published.

The huge success of the National Conference led to the formation of two important forums in the College: Science Forum and Humanities and Social Science Forum. It is the enthusiasm of these two forums that led to an International Seminar on environment, inspired with the motive of spreading consciousness in the society.



In collaboration with the West Bengal State Council of Higher Education the Science Forum and the Humanities and Social Science Forum organized an **International Seminar**, entitled "**Environment**, **Science and Society: Exploring New Horizons**" on 7 December 2015.

Dr. Takashiro Akitsu, Department of Chemistry, **Tokyo** University of Science, was the keynote speaker who enlightened the audience on his research findings on "Hybrid Materials of Chiral Metal Complexes of DSSC". Other eminent academicians who delivered their lectures in this conference were Dr. Sanjay Kumar, Dept. of Physics, **Jadavpur University**, Prof. Ramanuj Ganguly, Dept. of Sociology, **West Bengal State University**, Dr. Sabyasachi Bhattacharya, Agricultural and Ecological Research Unit, **Indian Statistical Institute** and Prof. Sunando Bandyopadhyay, Dept. of Geography, **University of Calcutta**.

The resource persons explored the **new perspectives** that have completely changed the concept of ecological conservation in the 21st Century. They highlighted not only on scientific innovations but also **role** played by politics and society in their implementation.

Field Study

A number of Field Studies and subsequent **projects** based on that study have been conducted to engage our students directly with the practice of conserving the environment. Worth mentioning is the Field Works undertaken by the Department of Zoology, like "**Effect of Urbanization** on Arrival/Departure Pattern of Migratory Bird" at Bakkhali, West Bengal (23.12.20014) and "Studying the



Effect of Mangrove Reduction on Life and Behaviour of Fiddler-crab" at Satragachi Bird Sanctuary (20.02.2015 to 23.02.2015).

To offer deeper understanding of the environmental concerns to our students the Departments of Botany, Anthropology and Geography have conducted several field studies on local **environmental problems**, like soil degradation, over grazing, biodiversity loss, etc.

Documentation of fauna

Birds and butterflies are highly diversified animals in our locality. Yearly documentation is very essential to know the **diversity and density** of animals in the locality as well as to know the conservational level of certain species. Students of the Department of Zoology document the fauna, such as **birds** and **butterflies**, throughout the year. During this process the students note down their habitat, behaviour, and other parameters with the help of the teachers. At the end of each year they submit their **project report** to the Department.

Documentary/Film Screening

- The Academy Award winning film "An Inconvenient Truth" that depicts the terrible impact of climate change in the society was screened by the Department of Political Science on 15 November 2014.
- All Bio-Science Departments joined together to screen the film "Challenges of Life: Animal Behaviour" in order to offer an exposure to the students about the diverse ways animal behaviour can be studied from an ecological perspective.

Eco-friendly gestures and activities

- The Department of Geography thought radically, and moved beyond delivering lectures by concentrating on practical ways of saving our environment. The Department sought to involve their students to make this mission of saving our mother earth through small gestures like the following:
 - ✓ **Use minimum papers** for preparing practical notebooks.
 - ✓ Minimize and eventually **eliminate the use of plastic bags** in and around the Geography Department by all the concerned students as well as the faculty.
 - ✓ **Economic use of water** during the field survey is instructed (like use less water while bathing in the hilly areas of Sikkim and Doars, where potable water is inadequate)
 - Further, the students are encouraged to practice modes of stabilisation of water cycle maintenance and replenishment of soil fertility, pollination and cross fertilization of crops etc. Most of the students hailing from either the suburbs or completely **rural** background understand the **environmental forces** readily and are infact enthusiastic in working to conserve their environment scientifically.



- The NSS Unit of our College organized a Young Talent Search Programme with the focal theme entitled "Green Environment & Our Life" by involving the local secondary and high secondary school students from class V to XII on 20 September 2014 in the College campus. The whole programme was divided into four events viz Quiz competition, Poster making, Essay writing and Speech competition.
 - The students were encouraged to participate in these events through presentations in various **sub-themes** like different types of pollution, war and environmental issues, different sources of energy, health and pollution, global warming, etc. Students delivered **speech** on the life history and the scientific contributions of *Acharya Jadadish Chandra Bose*, *Dr. Meghnad Saha*, *Acharya Profulla Chandra Ray*. **13 schools** actively participated in the programme. For encouraging the student participation in conserving the environment, a **prize distribution** ceremony was also organized by the NSS Unit on the same day.
- Tree plantation drives are regularly undertaken by the NSS Unit to maintain the green health of our campus. In this endeavour the Unit is assisted by the Green Campus Committee, Students'Union and the Alumni Association.

Medicinal Plant Garden

A medicinal plant garden has been established within the College campus where some plant species, like the Murraya exotica L., Herpestes monnieria (L.) Kunth, Rauvolfia serpentina (L) Benth., Rauvolfia tetraphylla L., Kaempferia galanga L., Rhoeo discolor L. are maintained.

Medicinal plants have the ability to defend against attack from predators. At least 122 compounds used in modern medicines are derived from 'ethnomedical' plant sources. The use of herbs to treat disease is as old as human history itself. The establishment of this specialized garden is beneficial for generating attention and responsiveness among the students and to teach them the medicinal use of herbs. This garden is maintained by the Department of Botany with devoted assistance from other Bio-Science Departments.

Evidence of Success

The students of Mrinalini Datta Mahavidyapith are not only taught to be sensitive towards the environment, but they engage themselves, in their small ways, to protect the environment and spread **consciousness** in the society. The students have come up with the brilliant idea of **not felicitating** the dignitaries or guests with **natural flowers** plucked from the trees. In the recently organized International Seminar on "Environment, Science and Society: Exploring New Horizons" they made the **flower bouquets** themselves, which were beautiful exercises in **origami**. This little effort shows that the students are not merely studying the Compulsory Subject, Environmental Science out of compulsion, but



are also trying to contribute to this huge responsibility of maintaining an **ecological balance** in the universe.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Lack of enough resources including **skilled labour** and **fund** to develop and maintain the medicinal plant garden in a large scale is a problem faced by the College. Also, the dedication of the students sometimes keeps wavering due to the domestic restrictions and other **academic pressures**.

Post NAAC Initiatives

The Visit of NAAC Peer team in this College during 17 and 18 December 2004 was an important landmark in the history of our Institutional activities. It was really an encouraging experience for the stakeholders of our College to observe the way the NAAC Peer Team inspired them to uphold the glory of this seat of learning. Since inception, the main objective of our College has been to achieve academic excellence for the first generation learners by providing them with higher education at affordable cost. The Peer Team appreciated our vision as well as our efforts to achieve the goal and emphasized over certain strengths of this Institution which, according to them were:

- 1. Dedication and commitment of our teaching and non teaching staff.
- 2. Effective leadership and good human relationship resulting in efficient team work.
- 3. Maintenance of strict discipline.

With such words of motivation we modulated further the processes by which we transformed our visions into essential academic practices and thereby we have introduced several post NAAC initiatives on the basis of the following suggestions of the Peer Team:

- 1. Student support services, like placement cell, career guidance cell, and students counseling cells need to be started.
- 2. Library needs to be further improved and the process of issuing books should be revised so that students can borrow more books easily.
- 3. Reading room facility needs improvement.
- 4. All the Laboratories are to be further improved.
- 5. More Audio visual aids should be used in the classroom teaching.
- 6. Alumni Association needs to be made more active.
- 7. Playgrounds need to be properly maintained.
- 8. All the existing vacancies may be filled up and the Departments be augmented with regular teaching staff.
- 9. More self-financing courses, which are appropriate to the region be introduced.
- 10. PG Courses on Bengali and Political Science may be introduced to help the students to acquire higher degrees in these subjects.
- 11. The College should have a development fund created out of Government Grants, income from self-financing courses (the process has been initiated with the introduction of B.B.A.), contributions from alumni and other sources. A committee under the supervision of the Principal may monitor this fund.



- 12. The faculty needs to be encouraged to take up more sponsored projects to augment the facilities of the departments.
- 13. Computers in the departments may be provided.
- 14. A workshop and a centre for instrumentation ought to be established for the science Department
- 15. Hostel facility for boys may also be provided.
- 16. Professional development programmes for non-teaching staffs may be introduced.
- 17. Separate adequate departmental budget may be allocated.
- 18. Internet facility in the faculty-room may be provided.
- 19. Smaller sections as per U.G.C. norms may be made.

Keeping in view the above recommendations of the last NAAC Peer Team we have adopted several significant measures to achieve holistic development of our College. We would like to illustrate the measures under the following Post NAAC initiatives:

Extension of Infrastructure

- i. The College has enhanced its covered area by at least 20,000 sq.ft.
- ii. The two storied New Building for women's hostel with a covered area of 13,000 sq ft is now ready for use.
- iii. We have built an acoustically equipped Auditorium with seating capacity of 300 persons by covering 5000 sq ft.
- iv. Two ICT enabled classrooms with an area of 1000 sq ft have been added.
- v. Construction of another shed covers nearly 1000 sq.ft.
- vi. A boundary wall has been erected around the playground and the land with an area of 30,000 sq.ft. has been properly developed to make it worthy of sports.
- vii. We have built a room for the Alumni Association to enhance their involvement and activity of our ex-students.
- viii. Toilets for the boys and girls have been completely renovated with marbles, tiles and new fixtures. New toilets and drinking water kiosks have been constructed on the 1st and 2nd floor. A special toilet has been constructed for the benefit of the students with disability.
 - ix. Dressing rooms for the lady teachers and the girl students have been constructed.
 - x. Water purifier machines have been installed in the canteen and in the hostel building.



- xi. The open stage, the yard and the ground floor corridors have been covered with good quality marbles and tiles.
- xii. The College building has been renovated and painted with proper care to enhance the aesthetic appeal of the educational shrine.
- xiii. As a mark of appreciation for our dedicated journey over the last 50 years, the Govt. of West Bengal has awarded us a free of cost Long Term Settlement (LTS) of 1.87 acre of land in two plots at Fatullapur, Nimta for the development of our second campus. The Governing Body of our College has planned to introduce LL.B courses and B.Voc courses in the 1st plot whereas PG and B.Ed courses in the 2nd plot.
- xiv. We have purchased three generators, two with 30KVA and one with 20 KVA capacity to provide uninterrupted supply of electricity during teaching-learning activity.
- xv. A Central Computer Laboratory has been constructed with no less than 10 computers with internet connections.
- xvi. Wi Fi facility has been introduced in the Office, Students' Union room, Teachers' room, Library and in all Science laboratories. The entire College will be Wi-Fi enabled in near future in collaboration with the Reliance company. Installation of CCTV is under consideration.

Extension of Courses

- i. During the last seven years we have introduced six Honours Courses in Science Subjects (Computer Science, Physics, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Chemistry).
- ii. Post Graduate Course in Bengali is successfully running from the academic session 2014-15.
- iii. Under the UGC Sponsored Merged Scheme, we now run four units; namely, Remedial Coaching, Entry in Services, Career Counseling Cell and Equal Opportunity Cell.
- iv. Along with the aforesaid courses we have focused on the improved curriculum of the compulsory Computer Literacy Programme that we run in collaboration with the WEBEL for enhancing the employability of our students.

Extension of Learning Resources

i. Following the recommendations of IQAC, white boards have been fixed in all the classrooms to facilitate the job of our teachers. Audio visual aids are provided as per the requirements of teaching-learning activity.



- ii. Classes are taken in smaller sections wherever necessary. For example, we provide two sections for the General Classes in Political Science, History and Education.
- iii. Computers (either desktops or laptops) have been provided in all Departments.
- iv. All laboratories have been renovated in view of the introduction of new Honours Courses. Additional rooms have been provided, new equipments have been purchased, ICT arrangements (with computers, laptops, LCD projectors) have been installed. The College has spent Rs.25 lakhs (app) for upgradation and expansion of the existing laboratories during the span of Financial year 2010-'11 to 2014-'15.
- v. Certain modifications have also been made in the laboratories to promote research work of the faculties.
- vi. By utilizing the UGC grants we have purchased camera, photocopy machine, editing and GIS softwares for the use of the students during their field works and project works in different subjects.

Upgradation of the Library

454

With gradual expansion of our College in terms of new courses, faculties and students, the Central as well as Departmental Libraries have been upgraded by procuring additional books and journals to make the number of collections to be not less than 32,447 and additional expenditure incurred is nearly Rs.5,11,606 during the span of Financial year 2010-'11 to 2014-'15.

- i. We are now subscribing online journals through INFLIBNET, one of the leading Electronic Resource Management package for e-journals.
- ii. The entire collection of books has been digitized with KOHA software to provide OPAC facility to the library users.
- iii. For P.G. students separate library facilities have been provided.
- iv. Library is now kept open with improved lending facilities even if the classes remain suspended.
- v. Library Committee has resolved to expand the reading room facility to the local residents beyond working hours and this plan will materialize in near future.
- vi. Reading room facility has been extended significantly.
- vii. Internet, Wi-Fi, reprography and printing facilities have been provided.
- viii. At present we provide in the library federated searching tools to search articles in multiple databases, Library Website and In-house access to e-publication.
 - ix. A separate shelf is maintained to display the publications of our faculty.



Development of Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

- i. Online admission has been introduced on the basis of merit from the session 2012-13 to ensure transparency.
- ii. At present Audio visual aids and ICT tools are used to supplement the chalk and talk method.
- iii. Teaching learning materials, such as academic calendar, modular distribution of syllabus, question bank and model answers are supplied to the students.
- iv. Special lectures, workshops, seminars, debate, quiz, group discussions and exhibitions are arranged on regular basis.
- v. We encourage field visits, project works and interdisciplinary classes to make the learning process more effective and interesting.
- vi. Special classes are taken by the Departments and remedial classes are arranged through the UGC sponsored merged scheme for the benefit of slow learners.
- vii. To make the process of evaluation more student friendly, we organize throughout the year class tests, unit tests, midterm tests and the selection test before the University examinations. Result Analysis is done at each stage of evaluation.
- viii. The Institution adopts multipronged measures to strengthen its feedback mechanism. Students' feedback is collected. Parent Teachers' meeting and Alumni meet are organized on regular basis. Suggestions are discussed in the meeting of Academic Subcommittee and necessary measures are initiated through the IQAC of the College.
 - ix. Prize, medal, cash prize and financial concessions are awarded to inspire the advanced learners.

Motivating Students' Participation

- i. Students are now feeling proud with their playground wherein they can practice games like football, cricket, volleyball and organize various sports activities.
- ii. The gymnasiums for the boys and girls have been thoroughly renovated with additional multigym equipments and instruments.
- iii. Students' Union has been provided all kind of supports (sports kits, refreshment, transport etc) with which they are able to
 - Organize intra College tournaments for indoor games and outdoor games.



- Description Days and Occasions like Bhasha Dibosh (International Language Movement Day), International Human Rights Day, International Women's Day, Rabindra Jayanti, etc.
- > participate in state level Youth Parliament competition and win champion's trophy
- win runners-up or champion's trophy in University tournaments of table tennis, chess, cricket etc.
- iv. The Faculties extend counseling at all possible levels, academic, psychological, moral, to all students of the Departments. Moreover, as part of our UGC sponsored merged scheme we maintain a Career Counseling and Soft Skill Development Cell that organizes workshops, Spoken English classes and employability programmes.
- v. We have signed MOU with WEBEL, OPSIS and IQST for conducting certificate courses. WEBEL and IQST are also to arrange placement camps for the outgoing students.
- vi. Apart from providing financial assistance to the needy and meritorious students from the College fund, significant contributions are also made by the Teachers' Council and the Students' Union. entrusted
- vii. We help the students to secure more scholarships as per Central and State Government rules (e.g, post matric scholarship for SC, ST students, Kanyashree grant for girl students and many others).

Promoting Strength and Quality of the Institution

- iii. Training programmes for Non teaching staff are organized regularly in collaboration with WEBEL to develop their perception over the office automation and accounting softwares.
- iv. Additional subcommittees have been formed to monitor the teaching-learning atmosphere of the College much more effectively. Some of these are: Women's Cell, Internal Complaints Committee, RTI cell, Anti- Ragging Committee etc.
- v. Apart from receiving UGC grants, we have secured financial grant of Rs 18 Lakhs from the State Government through Performance based appraisal scheme. Moreover, we have been patronized with MPLAD grant of Rs 20 lakhs for the construction of our Auditorium and MLALAD grant of Rs 3 lakhs for the development of our playground.

Strengthening Outreach Activities

- i. The NSS unit of our College has undertaken several community services like
 - > Organization of blood donation and thalassemia screening camp
 - **Demonstration of fire safety awareness**
 - > Tree plantation in collaboration with District Forest Office and local NGO.
 - > Talent Hunt and environmental awareness programme with school students of the locality.
- ii. Different Departments, like that of English, Sociology, Political Science, Journalism and Mass Communication, Zoology, of the College also participated in the outreach activities either as a part of their project work or in the form of co-curricular programmes.



- iii. The College also performs many other extension services. Some of the efforts are:
 - ➤ Collaboration with North DumDum Municipality for supplying arsenic free drinking water in the locality.
 - > We have constructed a *pukka* drain through which the public sewage now flows into the main drain, thus extending our support to the Municipality in preventing environmental pollution.
 - ➤ Inclusion of unemployed youths from the locality in the classes for Entry in Services under UGC sponsored merged scheme.
 - ➤ Allowing local NGO's to utilize the College building for organizing their programmes after working hours.

It should be mentioned, however, that although the College has adopted a lot of development programmes much beyond the suggestions of NAAC Peer Team, some of their recommendations could not be addressed. Those are:

- We could not initiate the introduction of PG in Political Science due to the weak numerical strength of the faculty. Nevertheless, we have secured the university affiliation for PG in Commerce which will be introduced soon.
- Workshop and Centre for Instrumentation for Science have not yet been developed due to lack of fund and competence.
- Due to non availability of suitable land no initiative for Boys' Hostel could be undertaken as yet. However, very recently, with the invaluable initiative from the President of our Governing Body, the College has received a long term lease of 1.87 acre of land wherein the recommended project may be realized with the availability of necessary fund.

In spite of certain limitations, we were able to impress the locality with our achievements during the Golden Jubilee celebration of our College in 2013-14 and we would also strive to continue our dedicated service for the next fifty years or more for the upliftment of the citizens who largely originate from the retarded socio-economic background.












2nd floor plan
